Notices of Motion

- 77** Ms White to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises the professionalism of the state's health workers who provide care to Tasmanians every day in a health system under enormous pressure.
 - (2) Agrees that their ideas, insight and experience are invaluable to driving changes that result in better outcomes for patients.
 - (3) Calls on the Minister for Health, Hon. Michael Ferguson MP to personally convene roundtable meetings with medical staff around the state so that he can hear their concerns first hand. (28 August 2018)
- 79** The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
- (1) Acknowledges the Government's commitment to addressing the issue of sexual violence.
 - (2) Notes that the Government has provided additional funding to the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions to allow for the establishment of a new Family Violence and Sexual Assault Unit.
 - (3) Further notes that this Unit has allowed for the Office of Director of Public Prosecutions and the Witness Assistance Service to engage with victims at an earlier stage.
 - (4) Recognises that early engagement with victims reduces the rate of withdrawals, meaning more offenders are being held to account.
 - (5) Commends the staff in this Unit for the important and difficult work they are undertaking. (28 August 2018)
- 80** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Congratulates students and staff at Prospect High School on the opening of an \$8.5 million renovation.
 - (2) Recognises the mature approach by students during the major renovation process, as they welcomed trades men and women who worked to deliver new:—
 - (a) Art and Drama classrooms;
 - (b) communal spaces;
 - (c) student change rooms;
 - (d) weights area; and
 - (e) staff room and administration facilities.
 - (3) Further recognises the quality video production designed by students to document the renovation process.
 - (4) Notes the upgrade to Prospect High is part of the biggest investment in Tasmanian school infrastructure in more than 20 years.

- (5) Further recognises that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to providing access to modern learning facilities for Tasmanian students to complete education through to year 12.
- (6) Further recognises the Government's Capital Works upgrades to state schools which, as well as providing improved learning environment for students, is driving economic growth and creating jobs across Tasmania. (28 August 2018)

81 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the release of the 2018 Tamar Estuary and Esk Rivers report card, the first since the signing of the Launceston City Deal.
- (2) Recognises the hard work of NRM North operations manager Amanda Locatelli for her ongoing commitment to the health of the Tamar River.
- (3) Further notes that the Tamar Estuary and Esk Rivers support a wide range of industries in northern Tasmania, from agriculture, forestry and fisheries, to heavy industry and tourism, and is valued by the community as one of the focal points for Launceston and for many recreational activities such as rowing, fishing, and boating.
- (4) Acknowledges that improving the health of the Tamar Estuary is essential, and this is why the state and federal governments have committed \$94.6 million to carry out key actions identified by the Tamar Estuary Management Taskforce over the next five years.
- (5) Further notes the long-term work on improving the Estuary's catchment and the combined Launceston sewerage and stormwater system will reduce the pathogen load entering the upper reaches of the Tamar.
- (6) Further recognises that this Government is committed to continuing the close co-operation between all tiers of government and our TEER partners to progress the management strategies identified by the Tamar Estuary Management Taskforce, leading to sustained on-going improvements in the health of the Tamar Estuary. 82 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the tremendous success of the inaugural Tassie Scallop Fiesta held in Bridport 2-5 August 2018.
- (2) Notes the Northeast community's support that ensured this winter festival achieved in the way it did.
- (3) Further notes the diverse range of events throughout the weekend including scallop splitting competitions, cooking demonstrations, live music and kayak ballet.
- (4) Congratulates Tony Scott, Len Gillett and their team of organisers for having the vision to create such a festival in a traditionally slower period for the local economy.
- (5) Further recognises the hard work of Tasmanian scallop fishers who brave the conditions to bring the scallops to port and build on Tasmania's strong brand.
- (6) Further notes that the seafood industry is a strong part of Bridport's heritage and means a great deal to regional Tasmania generally, providing employment and economic growth.
- (7) Looks forwards to the 2019 Tassie Scallop Fiesta to again celebrate the importance of the scallop industry to Bridport. (28 August 2018)

83 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes and commends the innovative and community inclusive approach TasNetworks applied to their joint Australian Renewable Energy Agency and University Consortium - Bruny Island solar and battery project - with the collaborative input of The University of Tasmania, the University of Sydney, The Australian National University and Reposit Power.
- (2) Commends TasNetworks for receiving the Energy Project of the Year Award from the Electric Energy Society of Australia in April 2018.
- (3) Acknowledges TasNetworks for receiving the Business Community Engagement Award from the Clean Energy Council at the Australian Clean Energy Summit in July 2018.
- (4) Further commends TasNetworks for receiving the Engineering Australia's Tasmanian Engineering Excellence Award in August 2018, and for becoming a

finalist in the 2018 Australian Engineering Excellence Awards, soon to be announced in September.

- (5) Further notes the ingenuity of the project with 34 Bruny Island homes turned into 'mini-power stations' with the combination of rooftop solar panels, battery storage and energy management software that allowed households to actively trade and store the electricity their homes produced, and avoid TasNetworks starting up the back-up Bruny Island diesel generator during a major network peak.
- (6) Further notes TasNetworks' inclusive approach, working closely with the local community and the University of Tasmania to make the project a success.
- (7) Further notes the Tasmanian Government's enthusiastic support for this type of innovative community energy project.
- (8) Further acknowledges that the TasNetwork project assists the Hodgman Liberal Government's objective to become 100 per cent self-sufficient in renewable generation by 2022. (28 August 2018)

"I now invite Members to join me in reciting the Lord's Prayer or to stand in silence and pray or reflect on their responsibilities to the people of the Tasmania."

following which, the Speaker shall recite the following Prayers:—

"Almighty God We humbly ask you to grant your blessing upon this Parliament. Lead our deliberations and make them succeed for your glory and the true welfare of the people of Tasmania.

"Our Father, who art in heaven hallowed be thy name thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil for thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever Amen". The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's significant investment in the Tasmania Prison Service (TPS) in both staff and infrastructure is building a stronger, future-focussed corrections system for Tasmania.
- (2) Future notes the 2018-19 State Budget includes:—
 - (a) \$70 million for the new Southern Remand Facility that will house in excess of 150 remandees;
 - (b) \$45 million (of a \$150 million project) for stage one of the much needed new northern prison;
 - (c) \$9.3 million for shared facilities at the Risdon Prison site;
 - (d) \$17.2 million for alternative sentencing options; and
 - (e) \$16 million in additional operational funding for the TPS.
- (3) Acknowledges the Hodgman Liberal Government's comprehensive law and order agenda includes legislation to remove the outdated practice of granting remission, a practice that can see prisoners receive up to three months off their sentence.
- (4) Condemns the Labor Party for their continued failure to develop policy in this critically important portfolio.

- (5) Calls on Labor to get behind the Government's comprehensive plans for law and order and investment in our corrections system in both people and infrastructure. (29 August 2018)

86 The Minister for Environment to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Government is committed to working with all levels of government, the waste industry and the wider community to improve waste management in Tasmania.
- (2) Further notes that the Government recently convened a round table to discuss the issue of waste management with key stakeholders from local government and the industry. It was agreed at the round table to develop a Tasmanian Waste Action Plan in collaboration with all levels of government, the waste and recycling industry and the broader community.
- (3) Acknowledges that the Government has already acted on its most pressing waste issues by providing grants for controlled waste and tyre processing facilities, making changes to the regulation of waste tyre stockpiling and assisting with the rollout of national product stewardship schemes for e-waste, paint, batteries and packaging.
- (4) Recognises that the Government has also made a number of further commitments to waste management, in particular tackling littering and dumping through Community Service Orders, improved reporting and enforcement of littering and dumping, working with local government to increase recycling capacity and the release of a report that considers the potential of a Container Refund Scheme (CRS) for the State.
- (5) Agrees that waste and recycling initiatives, such as a CRS or banning of particular products may have a role to play, but they should all be considered through the context of a Waste Action Strategy. (29 August 2018)

87 Ms *White* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has released average weekly wage statistics, showing that Tasmanians earn the lowest average wage of any state or territory.
- (2) Acknowledges that the average Tasmanian worker earns \$10,000 less per year than the average Australian worker.
- (3) Further notes the ABS statistics showed the gap between average wages paid to Tasmanian public sector workers and their counterparts on the mainland has increased from 24% to 27% since the election of the Liberal Government in 2014.
- (4) Further notes the Liberal Government's 2% wage cap policy is at odds with the Department of Treasury and Finance's 2.25% CPI prediction, meaning Tasmanian public sector workers can expect a real wage cut.
- (5) Over the past four years, average public sector wage growth in Tasmania has been the second lowest of any Australian jurisdiction.
- (6) Calls on the Government to scrap its 2% wage cap policy and negotiate in good faith with our hard working public sector workers. (29 August 2018)
