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## Notices of Motion

- 85** The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's significant investment in the Tasmania Prison Service (TPS) in both staff and infrastructure is building a stronger, future-focussed corrections system for Tasmania.
  - (2) Future notes the 2018-19 State Budget includes:—
    - (a) \$70 million for the new Southern Remand Facility that will house in excess of 150 remandees;
    - (b) \$45 million (of a \$150 million project) for stage one of the much needed new northern prison;
    - (c) \$9.3 million for shared facilities at the Risdon Prison site;
    - (d) \$17.2 million for alternative sentencing options; and
    - (e) \$16 million in additional operational funding for the TPS.
  - (3) Acknowledges the Hodgman Liberal Government's comprehensive law and order agenda includes legislation to remove the outdated practice of granting remission, a practice that can see prisoners receive up to three months off their sentence.
  - (4) Condemns the Labor Party for their continued failure to develop policy in this critically important portfolio.
  - (5) Calls on Labor to get behind the Government's comprehensive plans for law and order and investment in our corrections system in both people and infrastructure. (29 August 2018)
- 86** The Minister for Environment to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Government is committed to working with all levels of government, the waste industry and the wider community to improve waste management in Tasmania.
  - (2) Further notes that the Government recently convened a round table to discuss the issue of waste management with key stakeholders from local government and the industry. It was agreed at the round table to develop a Tasmanian Waste Action Plan in collaboration with all levels of government, the waste and recycling industry and the broader community.
  - (3) Acknowledges that the Government has already acted on its most pressing waste issues by providing grants for controlled waste and tyre processing facilities, making changes to the regulation of waste tyre stockpiling and assisting with the rollout of national product stewardship schemes for e-waste, paint, batteries and packaging.
  - (4) Recognises that the Government has also made a number of further commitments to waste management, in particular tackling littering and dumping through Community Service Orders, improved reporting and enforcement of littering and dumping, working with local government to increase recycling capacity and the release of a report that considers the potential of a Container Refund Scheme (CRS) for the State.

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- (5) Agrees that waste and recycling initiatives, such as a CRS or banning of particular products may have a role to play, but they should all be considered through the context of a Waste Action Strategy. (29 August 2018)

### **87** Ms *White* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has released average weekly wage statistics, showing that Tasmanians earn the lowest average wage of any state or territory.
- (2) Acknowledges that the average Tasmanian worker earns \$10,000 less per year than the average Australian worker.
- (3) Further notes the ABS statistics showed the gap between average wages paid to Tasmanian public sector workers and their counterparts on the mainland has increased from 24% to 27% since the election of the Liberal Government in 2014.
- (4) Further notes the Liberal Government's 2% wage cap policy is at odds with the Department of Treasury and Finance's 2.25% CPI prediction, meaning Tasmanian public sector workers can expect a real wage cut.
- (5) Over the past four years, average public sector wage growth in Tasmania has been the second lowest of any Australian jurisdiction.
- (6) Calls on the Government to scrap its 2% wage cap policy and negotiate in good faith with our hard working public sector workers. (29 August 2018)

### **88** The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that 3 September 2018, was Australian National Flag Day, the annual day specifically dedicated to celebrating our national flag.
- (2) Further notes that Australian National Flag Day was officially established in 1996 by the proclamation of the former Governor-General, Sir William Deane AC, KBE, QC and celebrates the first time the flag was flown on 3 September 1901 over the dome of the Exhibition Building in Melbourne when then Primer Minister, Sir Edmund Barton GCMG, KC, announced the winners of a competition to design a flag for Australia.
- (3) Acknowledges the Australian National Flag as Australia's foremost national symbol and a unifying and powerful expression of Australian identity.
- (4) Further notes that Australian National Flag Day provides all Australians with an opportunity to reflect with pride and gratitude upon the achievements and qualities of this great nation since Federation.
- (5) Further acknowledges the sterling work of the Australian National Flag Association in promoting and protecting our national symbol, whose work locally is led by Mr Reg Watson and ably supported by patron the Hon. Elise Archer MP, Attorney-General.
- (6) Congratulates all individuals, community organisations, local authorities, businesses and schools across Tasmania that celebrated Australian National Flag Day by conducting flag-raising ceremonies and by flying or displaying the National Flag. (30 August 2018)

### **89** The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Merchant Navy Day was 3 September 2018.
- (2) Further notes the Australian Merchant Navy Memorial is a memorial honouring the Australian Merchant Navy's involvement in World War 1 and World War 11.
- (3) Further notes that the memorial is located in Kings Park, on the northern shore of Lake Burley Griffin in Canberra and its location on the shore of the lake represents the Merchant Navy's relationship with water.
- (4) Recognises the Seafarers' Memorial is a memorial honouring the lives of all Tasmanian seafarers who lost their lives at sea, including those who served in the armed forces.
- (5) Further recognises the Tasmanian Seafarers' Memorial, located in Triabunna, on Tasmania's East Coast:—
  - (a) further notes the annual service on 3 October 2018; and
  - (b) the service will include the annual Blessing of the Fleet for the local fishing industry.

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- (6) Acknowledges that Merchant Navy Day illustrates the important contribution made to Australia's economic growth and prosperity in peacetime and in war.
- (7) Further notes that the Merchant Navy of the whole British Empire, which included the Australian Merchant Fleet, suffered proportionately the highest casualties of any of the allied services in the Second World War.
- (8) Further notes that thirty thousand two hundred and forty eight British Empire merchant seamen who served at sea under the red ensign lost their lives doing so and that the Australian Department of Veterans Affairs nominal roll records 3,500 Australian merchant seamen serving in World War II in Australian registered ships. (30 August 2018)

### **90** Mr *Brooks* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that mining and minerals processing is a key economic pillar in Tasmania, employing thousands and accounting for over 50 per cent of our exports in the year to June 2018, or more than \$2 billion.
- (2) Acknowledges that the sector is on the verge of major revival with:—
  - (a) the granting of approvals for a new \$100 million iron ore mine at Rogetta south of Burnie, that will create hundreds of jobs;
  - (b) a boom in job numbers at Grange Resources Savage River and Port Latta operations to around 560 FTEs and \$10 million investment in the first stage of a feasibility study that may lead to accessing the ore body through underground development; and
  - (c) the announcement that Hellyer Gold Mine will be re-opened and tailings processed to extract gold, silver, lead and zinc with up to \$1.5 billion in gold and \$1 billion in zinc to be processed from the tailings dams and up to 50 ongoing jobs created.
- (3) Further notes that the 2018-19 Budget includes \$2 million for the new Exploration Drilling Grant Initiative to expand the real and potential mining base industry in Tasmania through supporting increased 'greenfield' mineral exploration with applications opening on 6 September 2018.
- (4) Further notes that there is no better friend of the mining and minerals processing than the Hodgman Liberal Government. (30 August 2018)
