Notices of Motion

- 106** Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Tasmanian Burials and Cremations Act 2002 does not provide perpetuity rights for interments.
 - (2) Acknowledges all other Australian jurisdictions provide perpetual interment options within their burials and cremations legislation or regulation.
 - (3) Further notes the current review of the Burials and Cremations Act 2002 is a significant opportunity to introduce perpetual interment rights.
 - (4) Further acknowledges the Tasmanian Burials and Cremations Act 2002 is behind other Australian jurisdictions.
 - (5) Further notes the lack of perpetual interment rights for Tasmanian Veterans.
 - (6) Further notes that Tasmanian Veterans deserve the same interment rights as other Australian Veterans.
 - (7) Calls upon the Minister for Local Government, Hon. Peter Gutwein MP to amend the Burials and Cremations Act 2002 to ensure that cremation or bodily remains interred in a graveyard or burial ground are interred for perpetuity.
 - (8) Further calls upon the Minister to amend the Burials and Cremations Act 2002 to convert the right of interment to a perpetual right of interment in all Tasmanian graveyards and burial grounds.
 - (9) Further calls on the Government to review and amend the Burials and Cremations Act 2002 to provide perpetuity rights to interments by 1 December 2018. (25 September 2018)
- 108** Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises that all people should be afforded respect and the right to access government funded community services that are safe and high quality.
 - (2) Acknowledges there is an increase in the number of services delivered by the community sector, including disability, housing and child protection services and there is an urgent need to ensure the rights of people are protected.
 - (3) Calls on the Government to establish an independent Community Services Commissioner with the powers to:—
 - (a) handle individual complaints;
 - (b) review the situation of an individual, or group of people;
 - (c) monitor and review the delivery of community services and make recommendations to improve the delivery of services and to promote the rights and best interests of service receivers;
 - (d) inquire into matters affecting services and people eligible to receive community services; and
 - (e) promote access to advocacy support for service receivers to ensure adequate participation in decision-making about services they receive.

- (4) Further calls on the Government to provide the House an update on 29 November 2018 regarding the progress to establish a Community Service Commissioner. (25 September 2018)

109 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that 22 September – 30 September 2018 is Veterans' Health Week, an annual event celebrating the ongoing efforts being made to improve the health and wellbeing of the veteran and ex-service community.
- (2) Notes that the aim of Veterans' Health Week, is to raise awareness of, and encourage participation in, activities that promote and maintain the health and wellbeing of veterans, their families and carers.
- (3) Further notes that the key message for Veterans' Health Week 2018 is the promotion of healthy lifestyles with a special focus on nutrition.
- (4) Commends the staff of the Department of Veterans Affairs and volunteers from many organisations across the State including RSL Sub-Branches, Ex-Service organisations, sporting clubs and other community groups for their efforts in participating in the 2018 Veterans Health Week program in Tasmania.
- (5) Encourages the community to get involved and help support our veterans and the ex-serving people who provide such an example of service and sacrifice to our society. (25 September 2018)

NOTICES OF MOTION AND ORDERS

- (1) Notes that the most recent export figures released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) show Tasmania exported a near-record \$3.7 billion of goods in the year to July 2018.
- (2) Further notes that Tasmania leads the nation with 29.2 per cent growth in exports over 2017, which is nearly four times higher than the national rate of growth.
- (3) Further notes that over 80 per cent of Tasmanian goods exports were into Asian markets, with top export sectors being mining and mineral products, as well as agriculture and seafood.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania's top five export destinations were China, Malaysia, Japan, Taiwan and Thailand representing \$2.25 billion worth of our total exports.
- (5) Further notes that this continued strong growth in exports demonstrates the success of the Government's plan to open up new opportunities for Tasmanian products, underpinned by Trade Missions with the business sector to important export markets.
- (6) Further notes that the Government's strong focus on trade is leading to new investment and job creating opportunities in Tasmania. (Next Speaker: Ms O'Connor)
