



REPORT FOR 1888.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



ANNUAL REPORT of the New Town Charitable Institution for the Year ending 31st December, 1888.

New Town Charitable Institution, 6th February, 1889.

SIR.

I HAVE the honor to present for your information the Tenth Annual Report of this Institution, which will be found of a simply formal character, there being little else worthy of notice than is explained by the accompanying forms.

The cost of maintenance is $9\frac{1}{4}d$, per diem, being a little in excess of 1887. This arises from a less average number of inmates and an increased number of sick, requiring a greater amount of comforts, &c. I cannot, however, but feel satisfied that all possible economy has been observed, allowing for a fair distribution of absolute necessaries.

There have been considerable repairs and additions much needed, and which will eventually prove beneficial and convenient.

Contracts have been accepted for the laying of pipes, fire-plugs, &c., and the work when completed will afford an abundant supply of water for the use of the whole Institution, and, at the same time, render any serious damage by fire next to an impossibility.

The telephonic connection of this Institution with Hobart has proved to be a great advantage; its great use has, in several instances, been put to the test, and found to be of inestimable value.

There have been a few entertainments kindly given by sympathising friends to the inmates, who are at all times delighted to find there are some efforts made to relieve the monotony of their lives.

At the early part of the year the inmates of the male division were, as usual, feasted by Mrs. Colonel Shelton and her lady co-workers. A second treat has also been supplied by the ladies of the Flower Mission.

The proprietors of the Mercury, Tasmanian News, Church News, Catholic Standard, People's Friend, and the Salvation Army War Cry have kindly continued the gratuitous supply of their journals, which are eagerly sought for.

Donations of newspapers, pamphlets, illustrated journals, &c. have been kindly made by Messrs. Propsting and Cockhead, T. L. Hood, Ash & Son, B. T. Solly, and several others. Donations of this nature are very acceptable, and afford a great deal of satisfaction to the recipients. Mr. Scholz, of Elizabeth-street, supplied a quantity of spiced beef, &c. to the sick.

Religious instruction has held a foremost position throughout the year. The chaplains have been remarkably attentive to their duties, and have been ably assisted by ministers of other Christian denominations.

I am happy to report favourably of the general good conduct of the inmates. Of course, at times, a few insubordinates will give a little temporary trouble, but, as a whole, in reference to conduct, I believe the invalids at New Town will compare favourably with any similar institution in Australia.

The officers generally have afforded me every satisfaction, and I am pleased to report the same.

The accompanying Returns will, I hope, give all necessary information, and meet with your approval.
