

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1892.

DURING the past year the Institute has continued to fulfil its mission in disseminating scientific, literary, and other useful knowledge.

On March 2nd the Jubilee of the Institute was celebrated by a Conversazione, at which Mr. Henry Button read a paper, detailing the history and progress of the Institute. This was published in pamphlet form, and distributed among the members and kindred institutions, and a few copies are still available.

The Committee Room having been found incommodious as a reading-room for the use of the members, whilst they were crowded out by the public in the General Reading Room, your Committee set apart the northern portion of the Reading Room for the exclusive use of the members, and enlarged the southern portion, placing therein a large selection of books for perusal by the public. The alterations have given general satisfaction.

The number of subscribers during the year has been 417, of whom 60 were new, 90 ceasing to pay their subscription. There are now 31 life members on the roll.

It will be seen from the Treasurer's statement, hereto appended, that the funds are in a satisfactory condition.

The northern wall has been painted, and the whole building is now in a fair state of repair.

During the year 550 vols. have been added to the Library, making a total of 18,570. The circulation to members has been 24,880 vols. and 8200 periodicals. Your Board wish it to be widely known that the books are available for the use of country subscribers, and can be forwarded as desired.

Mr. J. B. Walker, at the request of your Committee, delivered a lecture on "Early Hobart"; he was assisted by Mr. Nat. Oldham. Mr. Magnus Smith also gave an instructive lecture on "Bee Culture." Mr. Oscar Balfe and Mr. A. Barrett, with the assistance of Mrs. Styant-Browne and others, gave an evening's entertainment, principally of Shakesperian readings.

During the winter months the Parliamentary Debating Society was carried on in connection with the Institute.
