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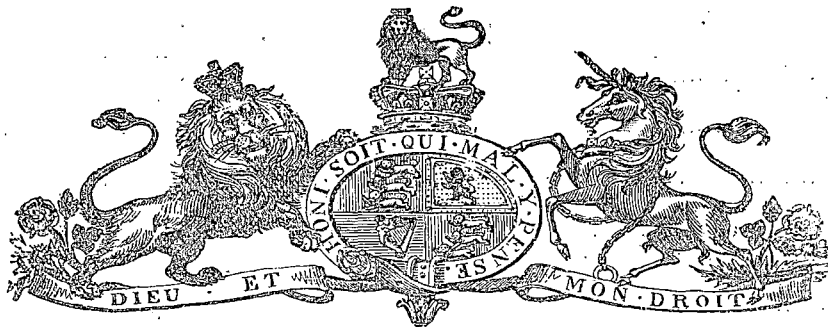

SIR,

THE Ladies' Committee of the Girls' Training School Reformatory, in presenting their Twelfth Annual Report, are pleased to state that the work of the Institution has gone on steadily throughout the year.

The Institution continues to be self-supporting, and has the sum of £146 4s. 3d. towards a reserve fund. At the beginning of the year there were fifteen girls; during the year five were received and seven left the Institution. Their behaviour on the whole has been good. A short service is still held on Sunday morning, and classes by ladies for Bible instruction on Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons.

The girls are employed in washing, housework, cooking, needlework, and receive instruction in reading, writing, and arithmetic.

The amount received by washing during the year is £285 0s. 4d.

The Committee again record their appreciation of the energy and zeal of the Matrons, which help so much towards the success of the Institution.

ANNUAL Examination, 5th December, 1892.

TWELVE girls were examined. Nine of these had been present at the previous yearly examination. Their progress individually was as follows :—That of 2 had been fair ; that of 5 had been moderate ; that of 2 had been slow.

Class I. Number examined, 2.

One of these had been present at the previous examination, the other was a new scholar. Neither had advanced far in reading easy words.

Class II. Number examined, 5.

Three had been examined in the same class in the year 1891 ; one had been since promoted to it ; and one was a new scholar. All passed in reading, one with credit. All passed in writing, one with credit. All passed, but showed more or less weakness in Arithmetic.

Class III. Number examined, 5.

Four of these were examined in the same class in the previous year ; one had been promoted from a lower class. All passed with credit in Reading. All passed in Writing, three with credit. Four passed in Arithmetic, one with credit.

The results of the examination show that the teaching of Reading and Writing is satisfactory, but that of Arithmetic, though improved, is still rather weak.
