

TASMANIA.--(No. 28.)

Downing-street, 6th April, 1861.

SIR, I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 6, of the 18th of January, reporting that Mr. James A. Youl had been authorized by you, with the advice of your Executive Council, to represent the interests of the Colony of Tasmania in this Country.

It appears to the Members of the Government that it will be highly advisable that this Colony should be represented in England by a properly accredited individual, thoroughly acquainted with its interests, competent to afford authentic information in regard to them, and to advise on the bearing of measures that may from time to time be under consideration, and calculated favourably or otherwise to affect them. Mr. James A. Youl, by the prominent interest which he has shown in all Australian questions during his residence in England,—as, for instance, in Immigration, in Postal Communication, and in the Introduction of Salmon,—as well as by the fact of his being an old Colonist of large stake in Tasmania, and held in general and deserved personal respect, appears to be specially recommended for the offices required in a Representative such as we contemplate; and as he has been good enough to consent to accept the proposed position,—one accompanied by no advantages to himself individually,—it is the object of this communication to beg that Your Excellency will, should the project meet Your Excellency's approval, be so kind as to make such a communication to the Secretary of State as may assist Mr. Youl in those transactions in which, by express instructions in writing from the Governor in Council, he may from time to time be engaged on behalf of this Colony with the Colonial Office.
