

CHARITABLE GRANTS DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR 1898.

New Town, 31st December, 1893.

SIR.

I HAVE the honour to submit herewith the Annual Report of this Department for the year 1898.

Out-door Relief, &c.

Return A shows the expenditure under Items 1 to 7, inclusive of Section XVII. of the Estimates, from which it will be seen that the expenditure exceeds by £291 3s. 2d. that for 1897, and is £239 12s. 7d. in excess of the amount provided for on the Estimates. The excess expenditure was in the following items:—Maintenance of persons in country hospitals, £171 6s., as against £145 18s. in 1897, caused by epidemic of measles, &c.; maintenance of destitute persons not otherwise provided for, £176 15s. 7d., as against £106 17s. 2d. in 1897 (this increase was caused by the additional number of persons who were relieved during the year); examination of insane, £91 16s. 6d., as against £65 10s. in 1897; this expenditure depends upon the admission of persons to New Norfolk Asylum; 80 were admitted in 1898, as against 63 in 1897. In outdoor relief, &c., to country districts the expenditure for 1898 was £44 9s. 2d. in excess of that for 1897.

In the item Transport and Funeral Expenses of Paupers the expenditure was exceptionally heavy, and was £126 8s. 2d. in excess of the expenditure for 1897. Included in this service were items of a special character, such as free passages per steamer to persons to enable them to obtain employment, which were mainly responsible for the excess.

The repayments for the year were £62 ls. 1d. from collectors and £9 l9s. from the Imperial Government, leaving a net cost of £3377 l2s. 6d. The sum of £1 ls. was paid on account of 1897 and £9 l6s. on account of 1898. The excess expenditure in each case was provided for upon Supplementary Estimates.

Deaf, Dumb, and Blind.

Return B shows the number of Deaf, Dumb, and Blind who have been maintained during the year at the expense of the Government.

On the 5th July, 1898, the pupils, who were then being maintained in the Royal Victoria Institute for the Blind—2 males and 3 females—were transferred to Hobart. They are now in the Tasmanian Institute for the Blind, which was opened during the year. One blind boy was returned from the Convent of the Maternal Heart, Lewisham, New South Wales, at the beginning of the year, and was subsequently placed in the Tasmanian Institution for the Blind, but was discharged for misconduct on 17th December, 1898.

Appended are extracts from reports relative to the progress of the various pupils.

Out-door Relief (including the two Cities).

Return C shows the comparative expenditure for the past 10 years. It will be noticed that there is an increase of £625 17s, 10d. over 1897. Of this amount £149 9s. 10d. was paid to the

Hobart Benevolent Society for increased price of bread and £400 to the Launceston Benevolent Society, being half the amount expended on the families of the unemployed from the year 1892 to 1896.

Charitable Institutions.

Return D shows the daily average number of inmates maintained in the New Town Charitable Institution and Launceston Benevolent Asylum during the last 10 years. It will be seen that the numbers are decreasing, in 1898 there being 148 less than in 1889.

Out-door Relief in Country Districts.

Return E shows the actual amount expended on out-door relief, medical attendance on paupers in country districts, and temporary provision for tramps. It will be observed that the cost per head, based on the estimated population for 1897, was $5\frac{1}{2}d$. in Municipal and $3\frac{1}{2}d$. in Police Districts.

Imperial Claims.

The amount charged to Imperial Government for repayment of the cost of maintenance in the various Institutions and in receipt of out-door relief during the year was £801 5s. 2d.

Staff.

On the 21st January, 1898, Mr. George Judge, Collector of Fees for the Southern Division of the Colony, died, and Mr. J. Connolly, Clerk of the New Town Charitable Institution, was appointed in his stead.

APPENDIX.

New South Wales Institution for the Deaf, Dumb, and the Blind, New Town Road, Sydney, 22nd December, 1898.

THE following is our Superintendent's Report :-

Re the Tasmanian pupils, George Peters, Pearl M'Lean, and Florence Cullen.

I am happy to be able to report favourably, especially of the lad Peters, as also of Pearl M'Lean, both of whom are blind

It is gratifying to be able to state that by the vote of the blind pupils Peters won first prize as being the most popular boy in the Blind schoolroom.

Pearl M'Lean is a good girl and popular too, though not the winner of this particular prize.

At the recent examination by the Inspector from the Department of Public Instruction, Peters stood high in his class in all subjects, especially in Arithmetic. Pearl, though only $2\frac{1}{4}$ years at school, was examined on the rudiments of Geography, Grammar, History, Arithmetic, &c., and did well in all these, as also in reading and writing Braille. I cannot speak too highly of these two blind children.

Of Florence Cullen (deaf and dumb) one cannot speak so well; as regards both mental and moral qualities she ranks rather low, and I am glad to notice improvement in both respects.

Poor girl, she needs careful treatment, and will often yield most graciously to a little kindness and encouragement, while harsh measures would only spoil her temper.

Already she is able to write fairly well, answers easy questions on Object lessons, Scripture, Arithmetic, &c. On the whole one is hopeful about each of these three children's educational future.
