ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1896.

SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honor to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during 1896.

Sixteen Board and one hundred and seven Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

The Board of Management desires to express its sincere regret at the loss sustained by the death of the late Hon. T. C. Smart, a member of the Board from its inception, and for a period of nineteen years Chairman of the Board of Management.

The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff by the frequent donations of fruit, flowers, books, periodicals, and the daily papers.

During the year the Operating Room, the cost of which was defrayed out of the money bequeathed to the Board by the late Mr. Joseph Solomon, has been completed, and admirably answers the requirements of the Hospital, thus supplying a long felt and pressing want.

The vestment of the sole control and management of the Institution in the Board for a fixed amount is still a matter for congratulation and satisfactory to all concerned, for, although during the year there was a very considerable increase in the number of patients treated in the Hospital and in the Out-patients department, the gross cost is £728 below the average expenditure of the past 16 years ; and the Board of Management is pleased to be in the position to hand back to the Government the sum of £104 14s. 6d., being the unexpended balance of the grant in aid.

The Board of Management has much pleasure in recording its high appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Staff have discharged their onerous duties during the year, and, as will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been successfully performed.

During the year the buildings and grounds have been well attended to, and the new fence erected along the Campbell-street frontage by the kindness of the Government greatly improves that portion of the Hospital Grounds.

During 1895, 1188 In-door patients were treated ; this year 1293, of which 111 proved fatal, 35 deaths occurring within 72 hours after admission. The average stay of patients in the Hospital was 22 days, as against 25 in 1895. Of the 1293 cases treated in the Hospital, a large percentage, as usual, came from the country districts ; and out of the total number treated, 1029 were found to be pauper cases.

In the Out-patients department there is a marked increase in the number of new Out-patients, casualties, and attendances, as, for instance, in 1895, the total attendances numbered 5054 ; this year, 5796.

In 1895 the net average cost per patient was £4 6s. 11½d ; this year, £3 18s. 9½d. The actual cash collections during 1895 amounted to £544 5s. 9d. ; this year the collections amounted to £611 16s. 7d. The net expenditure for this year, as compared with that of 1895, shows a decrease of £72 13s. 8d., a most satisfactory condition of affairs, when it is borne in mind the large increase in the number of cases treated at the Hospital. The fees remaining on the books for collection at 31 December amounted to £32 13s. 9d. It has not been necessary to recommend any fees for remission during the year.

In the personnel of the Board of Management and resident staff several alterations have been made,—viz., Dr. E. L. Crowther, elected Honorary Medical Officer, *vice* Dr. Giblin, deceased ; Mr. Alexander Riddoch, elected a member of the Board, *vice* the Hon. T. C. Smart, deceased ; Dr. E. J. S. Spark, appointed House Surgeon, *vice* Dr. Maxwell, resigned ; Dr. E. Thorburn Macgowan, Assistant House Surgeon, *vice* Dr. Sprott, resigned ; and Miss Nancy Johnstone Turnbull, appointed Lady Superintendent and Matron, *vice* Miss Munro, resigned.

Consequent on the death of Dr. Smart, Mr. D. MacMillan was unanimously elected Chairman, and Mr. W. F. Brownell, Vice-Chairman, of the Board of Management.

Although on several occasions during the year the resources of the Hospital were severely taxed, owing to the larger number of acute cases under treatment, the Board is pleased to report that the inner working of the Institution was all that could be desired, and that not the slightest hitch of any description occurred.
