

ANNUAL REPORT, 1899.

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Jenico William Joseph Viscount Gormanston, G.C.M.G., Governor, and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THE Council of the University of Tasmania, in conformity with the provisions of "The Tasmanian University Act," has the honour to report, for the information of Your Excellency in Council, the proceedings of the University for the year 1899.

I.—Public Examinations.

Junior Public Examination.

The Ninth Examination under the Regulations of the Junior Public Examination was held at Hobart and Launceston, and also at Ulverstone, Longford, Devonport, Deloraine, Latrobe, Westbury, Franklin, and Zeehan, as Local Centres, under Local Committees. The Examination lasted from the 27th November to the 2nd December, both dates inclusive, and was under the following Examiners:—Professor A. M'Aulay, M.A.; Rev J. Oberlin Harris, M.A.; Messrs. C. J. H. Chepmell, M.A.; F. M. Young, B.A.; E. A. Nathan, M.A., LL.B.; W. H. Hudspeth, B.A.; H. Nicholls, LL.B.; S. M'Burney, Mus. Doc.; L. Dechaineux; Lt.-Col. Cruickshank, R.E.

Including single-subject candidates, there were 185 entries, and 181 candidates actually presented themselves. 100 passed, 27 being placed in the First Class, and 73 in the Second, while the single-subjects list contains 78 names.

Junior Exhibitions.

On the result of the foregoing Examination, the Council awarded to the five following candidates, Junior Exhibitions of the value of £20 per annum each, tenable for three years from the 1st January, 1900, at the institutions mentioned after their mames:

Senior Public Examination.

The Ninth Examination under the Regulations of the Senior Public Examination began at Hobart and Launceston on the 23rd November, and ended on the 1st December. Candidates were also examined at the Local Centres of Ulver-

II .- Examinations for Degrees.

Ordinary Examinations.

On the 10th, 11th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, and 18th November, there were held the Ordinary Examinations for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and for Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws. The Examiners were the Professors and Instructors of the University, with the follow-ing coadjutors for the B.A. and B.Sc. subjects:—Professors E.Bensly, M.A. (Adelaide); E. J. Nauson, M.A. (Melbourne); H. Laurie, LL.D. (Melbourne); Orme Masson, D.Sc. (Mel-bourne); M. W. MacCallum, M.A. (Sydney); E. J. Trechmann, M.A., Ph.D. (Sydney); and, for the Law subjects, Professor J. W. Salmond, M.A., (Adelaide), and F. Lodge, Esq. R.A. Esq., B.A.

For the Examinations for the Degrees of B.A. and B.Sc. there were in all 18 candidates—13 from Hobart, 5 from Launceston. Of these, 13 passed their several examinations. There were also 4 candidates in single subjects, all of whom

satisfied the Examiners

For the Bachelor of Laws Examination there were in all 11 candidates examined—7 from Hobart and 4 from Launceston-9 of whom satisfied the Examiners.

Thirty-three candidates in all presented themselves at the Degree Examinations. The names of the candidates who passed, and the classes in which Credit candidates were placed, are set forth in the Class Lists annexed to this Report.

Supplementary Examinations.

At a Supplementary Examination held in March, 1899,

Henry Brune Atkinson

satisfied the Examiners in the subject of Mathematics, thereby completing his qualification for the Degree of B.A. in Group D.

Also, at a Supplementary Examination, held in March, 1900,

Robert Studdert de Warrenne Waller

satisfied the Examiners in the subject of Mathematics, thereby completing his qualification for the Degree of B.Sc. in Group H.

III .- Special Courses and Examinations in Pure AND APPLIED SCIENCE.

The Council has for some years past had under consideration the great need of extended means of instruction for students looking forward to a Degree in Science as a guarantee of professional qualifications, especially those connected with Mining and Mining Engineering. There was also the question of making provision for a course of examinations adapted to the requirements of non-matriculated students working in the same direction, but not at present in a position to enter on a regular course for a University Degree. Some of the latter class are devoting themselves to special branches,

such as chemistry and assaying, the metallurgical treatment of ores, experimental mechanics, physical geology and mineralogy, &c., while others are desirous of taking up a comprehensive course with a view to qualification for the office of Mine Manager. To all such students, the University ought to lend a helping hand; but the funds at its disposal have barely sufficed for the maintenance of the existing teaching staff, and the conduct of the Public Examinations and Examinations for Degrees. All that it was possible to accomplish during the past year was to make some provisional arrangements for instruction and examination in Science subjects, which, it was hoped, might prove helpful in the right direction.

The restoration of the University Grant to the amount provided by the Act of Incorporation has now made sufficient provision for the necessary addition to the Professorial Staff, and the initial expenses connected with Practical Science teaching. In its next Annual Report, the Council hopes to announce that it has secured the services of an Officer thoroughly well qualified to take general charge of the proposed course, with special responsibility for those branches of it which are connected with the Mining Industry.

IV .- MATRICULATION ROLL.

VI.—LECTURES DELIVERED AT THE UNIVERSITY.

The number of Lectures delivered at the University throughout the Academic year averaged 70 in each week. The number of Students attending under the University Professors and Instructors at Hobart and Launceston was, in the last term, 35.

VII .- TEACHING AT LAUNCESTON.

The University Professors have continued to pay weekly visits to Launceston to deliver lectures and give students assistance and direction in their several courses of study. Additional teaching was given during the year by Mr. H. C. Kingsmill, M.A., and Mr. A. W. B. Perceval, B.A., who were appointed in 1895, the former giving instruction in Mathematics weekly, under the Professor in that subject, and the latter in Modern Languages, also weekly. The number of students in Languages in the lest term 10 students in Launceston was, in the last term, 10.

VIII .- THE COUNCIL.

The Council has again this year to report the removal by death of one of its most prominent Members, by which the Vice-Chancellorship became vacant, after it had been held for little more than a year by the late Mr. James Backhouse Walker. Both as a Member of the old Council of Educa-tion, and of the Council of the University, Mr. Walker rendered signal services to the cause of higher education in this Colony. The Council, accordingly, desires to record its appreciation of the same, and of the deep and intelligent interest he ever took in the work and welfare of the University, also its unfeigned sorrow for the loss of so estimable a man and so trusted a colleague.

‡ For six months in the year the Chief Justice was acting as Administrator of the Colony. Thus becoming ex officio Visitor of the University, he was consequently unable to attend business meetings of the Council during that period.

XIV. PARLIAMENTARY APPROPRIATION.

It is a matter of satisfaction to the Council that Parliament has discontinued the annual reduction which has been made for several years past in the amount fixed by law for payment out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Council of the University. This amount of £4000 has been diminished by various sums for every year from 1893 to 1899 inclusive, the aggregate reduction being £8000.

The appropriation of the undiminished grant for 1900 will enable the Council to make provision for a Chair of Mining, and for such equipment of the Physical and Chemical Laboratories as will probably suffice for present necessities. The intimate relation of practice to theory has to be constantly impressed on students in all departments of science, but the laboratory exercises will fail to produce satisfactory results

unless the instructor is supplied with necessary materials and apparatus. These, at the outset, need not cost more than the amount which, by judicious and economical management, may be made presently available, and, when the need for further equipment becomes evident, the Council is confident that its requirements will be liberally met.
