

THAT your Petitioners view with deep regret the fact that "The Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia," as submitted by the Federal Convention to the Parliament and the People of Tasmania, contains no recognition of God.

That your Petitioners consider it most fitting and desirable that, at a crisis in the history of the Australasian Colonies so important as their federation into a Commonwealth, the Divine Being should be recognised as the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, and the Controller of the Destinies of Nations.

That your Petitioners would respectfully submit that such a recognition of God would be in harmony with the British Constitution and with the past legislation of Great Britain, and would be specially in accordance with the wishes of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen.

That your Petitioners respectfully desire your Honourable House to use its powers in securing such an amendment of the proposed "Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia" as shall secure the definite recognition of God, and make it possible for Christian men throughout the Colony to accept it heartily when submitted to them.
