
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GAOLS, HOBART AND LAUNCESTON:

SHERIFF'S REPORT FOR 1889.

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Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



*Sheriff's Office, Hobart, 18th July, 1890.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to furnish herewith the usual Returns in relation to the Penal Establishments, Hobart and Launceston, for the year 1889.

The number of prisoners in custody on 31st December last was as follows:—

being a decrease of 7 men in Hobart and 3 in Launceston, and of 5 women in Hobart, but an increase of 3 women in Launceston; the total decrease of both sexes being 12.

The total number received and discharged during 1889 was as follows:—

During the year an alteration has been made in the Gaol for Females, Hobart, which admits of young and first convicted offenders sleeping in a separate apartment from older and more confirmed offenders.

If this Division of the Gaol could be transferred to the site of the present Police Office and Watch-house, a great improvement could be effected in the classification of the Male prisoners.

The steadily decreasing number of prisoners in both Gaols is a matter of great satisfaction.

A desire having been expressed by the Members of Parliament representing Launceston that the existing Gaol in that city should be removed, the matter has, at the request of the Government, recently engaged the earnest attention of the department. Reports upon the subject, principally by the Deputy Sheriff at Hobart, are now under the consideration of the Government, which, it is to be hoped, will be the means of relieving Launceston of the present Gaol, which was built very many years ago under altered circumstances, and which, from its conspicuous position and rough exterior walls, has long been an eyesore in that city. The probable acquisition of the Main Line Railway by the Colony raises the question whether the principle of our future Gaol system should not be that of one central Gaol, with the Watch-houses used as Gaols in the various Municipalities and Police Districts.

It would appear to me to be opposed to the interests of the Colony to maintain a separate Gaol in Launceston when there is ample accommodation in the larger establishment at Hobart, where a considerable staff must, of necessity, be kept in existence, and which staff is sufficient to control all the prisoners now under sentence in Tasmania. The transit of prisoners on Government Railways is a mere matter of account between departments, but the maintenance of a staff in a separate Gaol involves actual expenditure of money which might be avoided.
