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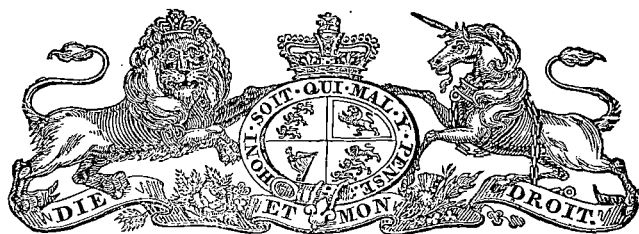

EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS.

THE Board of Education has directed the publication of the annexed Report of the Examiners appointed to conduct the Examination of Candidates for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.

EXAMINERS' REPORT.

WE have the honor of presenting to the Board of Education a Report of the Twentieth Annual Examination for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.

The Examination occupied the same time as that of last year, and no change was made in the standards of qualification, nor in the marks obtainable in the several subjects. Twenty-four boys and ten girls offered themselves as competitors, of whom ten were examined at Launceston, and the rest at Hobart Town.

READING. *Rev. Canons Davenport and Bailey, Examiners.*—The reading was upon the whole satisfactory, nearly three-fourths of the Candidates having gained three-fifths of the marks. The fact of the reading being judged by different Examiners at different places must necessarily be a disturbing element in this portion of the Examination; but there is every reason to hope that by the arrangements made on the present occasion the disturbance has been reduced within narrow limits.

DICTATION. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.*—The spelling of the majority of the Candidates was correct; but their punctuation was defective. Only two of them inserted correctly the inverted commas, as marks of quotation, and the other stops connected with them. It will be seen that one of the female Candidates gained full marks.

PENMANSHIP. *Rev. Canons Davenport and Bailey, Examiners.*—The writing was exceedingly good considering the age of the Candidates; and with very few exceptions the whole of the papers were sent up in a neat and creditable form.

ENGLISH GRAMMAR. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.* The answering in this subject was on the whole creditable. The distinction between Active, Passive, and Neuter Verbs appeared, however, to be a mystery to most of the Candidates; and such mis-spelling as 'Nomonitive' and 'Nomitive' points to a defect in teaching which the Masters will do well to note. Wilson answered remarkably well; and Rider, Bell, Roache, and Toan are deserving of creditable mention.

GEOGRAPHY. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.*—The answering in this subject was far from being satisfactory. Only two of the Candidates gained three-fourths of the marks, while no fewer than eleven failed to gain half the number. A great want of accuracy and definiteness pervades nearly the whole of the papers. By several of the Candidates East and West were almost invariably confounded with each other; Naples being said to be on the East Coast of Italy, and Madagascar on the West of Africa. Too little attention appears to be paid to the Geography of Tasmania; Toan, Langley, and Hay were the best acquainted with it.

HISTORY. *Rev. Canon Davenport, Examiner.*—The answers, on the whole, are a little inferior to those of last year. Nineteen, however, out of thirty-four Candidates obtained more than half of

the maximum number of marks, namely, in order of merit : Wilson, Annie M. Davis, Rider, Toan, East, Price, Cummins, Sullivan, Bell, Mason, Roche, Morrison, Church, Hurst, Langley, Morton, (the last four being equal), Jessie M. Blair, Reynolds, Donaldson.

ARITHMETIC. *Rev. Canon Davenport, Examiner.*—Wilson and Roche answered admirably, obtaining full marks. Twelve obtained more than two-thirds of the marks, namely, Bell, Rider, Mason, Johnstone, East, Morton, Morrison, Toan, Annie M. Davis, Price, Church, and Cummins, (the last two being equal). Four others obtained more than half the maximum, viz. Donaldson, Langley, Reynolds, and Sullivan. Considering the ages of the children and the difficulty of some of the questions, the work is on the whole commendable, though a little inferior to that of last year. The processes by which results were obtained were not always the best, and the work was often less clear and intelligible than it would have been if more pains had been taken.

The annexed Table of Marks shows the results in detail. Two of the Candidates failed to obtain 400 marks, the standard qualifying for a place in the Table. Twenty boys and five girls obtained more than 600 marks, the standard for an Exhibition.

We have pleasure in recommending for Exhibitions John Wilson, Walter Fortnam Rider, John Drysdale Bell, James Edward Miles Roche, George Babington Toan, and Cecil Leslie Mason. Also, Annie Maria Davis, Jessie Margaret Blair, Grace Hollings, Harriet Prisca Cole, and Jessie Westbrook Downward.

The results of the Examination are, in our opinion, satisfactory. They compare favourably in some respects with those of last year, and both the number of Candidates and the number of Schools represented are larger. The marks, however, obtained by the highest on the list, and the average attainments of the Exhibitioners, are somewhat less than at the last Examination. Many, who have failed to win the Exhibition, have nevertheless acquitted themselves very creditably, and their attainments, as well as those of their successful competitors, reflect honor on the Schools at which they have been taught, as well as on their own industry and ability.

REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS, 1879.

It is hereby notified that Six Exhibitions of the annual value of £16 13s. 4d. each, tenable for four years from the 1st July, 1879, will be open for competition, during the month of June next, to Male pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1879.

II. It is also notified that Six Exhibitions of the value of £16 13s. 4d., tenable for four years from 1st July, 1879, will be open for competition during the month of June next to Female pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1879.

III. The Examination will comprise the following subjects :—

1. Reading aloud passages in prose or verse from some English Author.
2. Writing from Dictation.
3. Penmanship.
4. English Grammar and Language.
5. Geography.
6. History.
 - A. English History.—A.D. 1307 to A.D. 1377.
 - B. Sacred History.—From the call of Abram to the death of Moses.
7. Arithmetic.

IV. The following values have been affixed to the several subjects of Examination :—

It shall be essential to success that a Candidate gain 50 per cent. of the total number of marks ; that is to say, 600 marks.

V. The Exhibitions obtained by Male Candidates will be tenable at one or other of the following Superior Schools as shall be named by the Parent or Guardian, and be approved by the Board ; viz.—The High School, Hobart Town ; the Hutchins School, Hobart Town ; the Church Grammar School, Launceston ; and the Horton College, Ross ; and Exhibitions obtained by Female Candidates will be tenable at such Schools as may be selected by the Parent or Guardian, and approved by the Board.

VI. A Boarding Allowance of Twenty Pounds per annum, in addition to the amount of the Exhibition, will be granted to Exhibitioners whose residence is more than five miles from a Superior School.

VII. The Exhibition will be payable by quarterly instalments to each Exhibitioner upon production of a certificate of industry and good conduct from the authorities of the school to which the Exhibitioner may belong.

VIII. In the event of the non-production of such certificate for any one quarter, the Exhibition shall be declared vacant : provided always that this rule shall not apply to Exhibitioners who may have been incapacitated from attending school by illness or other cause deemed sufficient by the Board.

IX. The Examination for these Exhibitions will be held in Hobart Town and Launceston.

X. Applications* from Candidates desirous of offering themselves for Examination should be transmitted to the Chairman on or before the 1st May, 1879, supported by certificates as under :—

1. Certificate of good conduct for the twelve months immediately preceding the date of application from the Conductor of the School attended by the Candidate.
2. Certified extract from Register of Births, or such other Certificate as shall be deemed sufficient by the Board, showing that the Candidate will not have reached the age of 12 years on the 1st June, 1879.
