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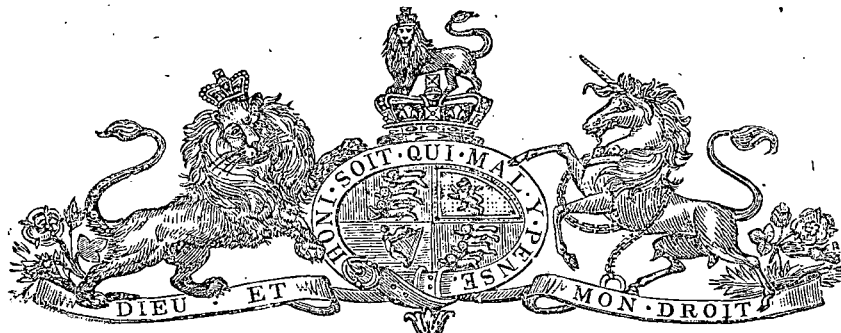

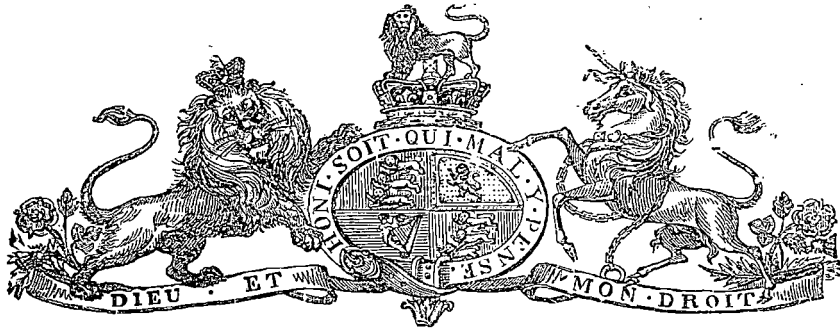

## GENERAL HOSPITAL, LAUNCESTON.

### REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1898.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management of the above-named Hospital for the year 1898.

1. On the 28th March, Mr. Wm. Barnes, who had for many years been a most zealous and active member of the Board of Management, died. The Board desires to express its sincere regret at the loss of one of its members who devoted so much of his time and energy to the interest of the Institution whose welfare he had so much at heart. Mr. W. Perrin was elected to the vacant position. In October, Mr. W. I. Thrower resigned as a Member of the Board, Mr. Thos. Bourke being elected in his place. Mr. H. Edgell was granted six months' leave of absence from his position as Member of the Board of Management.

2. Sixteen Board and forty-seven Committee meetings were held during the year.

3. Messrs. Weedon, Irvine, and Dr. C. J. Pike retired from the Board of Management during the month of December, and were unanimously re-elected.

4. Dr. F. J. Drake, Surgeon-Superintendent, resigned his position on 31st March to enter into private practice in Hobart. The Board of Management accepted his resignation with regret, and expressed their hearty appreciation of the valuable services rendered by him in the capacities of House Surgeon and of Surgeon-Superintendent. The House Surgeon, Dr. J. Ramsay, was appointed Surgeon-Superintendent, whilst A. Norman M'Arthur, M.R.C.S. &c., was appointed to the position of House Surgeon.

5. One student has attended the Medical and two the Dental Practice of the Hospital.

6. A course of Lectures in Minor Surgery was delivered to the Nurses by the Surgeon-Superintendent, and in Nursing by the Lady-Superintendent. The usual examinations in Nursing were held during the year, with the result that four Nurses gained the Certificate of the Launceston Hospital Training School for Nurses, two of them obtaining First Class Honours.

7. The bacteriological apparatus purchased more than two years ago is still lying idle because of the absence of a suitable building in which to erect it and carry on the necessary bacteriological work. The necessity for such a building is becoming more and more evident, and before long it is hoped that such will be at the disposal of the Hospital to be equipped as a bacteriological laboratory.

8. The building of the New Nurses' Home was completed early in the year, and proved to be as great a boon as was anticipated. The furnishing of the Home and laying out of the grounds was carried out by the Board from its private funds, and cost £1062 3s. 11d. As evidence of the necessity of such adequate quarters and of their suitability from a hygienic point of view, the amount of sickness amongst the Nursing Staff has been greatly reduced. The work of laying out the grounds of the Home is still being proceeded with, and the excavation necessary for the future erection of a Lawn Tennis Court has been accomplished.

9. The opening of the New Nurses' Home has necessitated a re-arrangement of many of the rooms and quarters occupied by the Staff throughout the Hospital. The House Surgeon's quarters have been transferred from the main building to the Old Home, where a suite of two rooms has

been renovated and partly re-furnished. The Dispenser has now his quarters in the Old Home. The Board Room has been enlarged by removing the partition, and it has been repainted and partly refurnished. A room has been given to the Sister in charge of the Female Wards in place of an inclosure in the large Ward. The Nurses have now a more commodious and suitable Dining Room in the Old Home upstairs, the small lift being altered to suit their requirements. The old Nurses' Dining Room is now used for the female servants.

10. The erection of the Isolation Wards for Infectious Diseases, as a memorial of the Diamond Jubilee of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, was, after much delay, completed, and the opening ceremony performed by Mrs. G. T. Collins, on 22nd December. Many necessary items had been overlooked by the architect, and many alterations were necessary, so that an appeal had to be made to the Government to supplement their original vote of £850 by £146 11s. 2d. This appeal was responded to, and the work completed at a total cost of £1546 11s. 2d., £500 of which was very generously donated by the ladies of Launceston to help to carry out the useful work. The furnishing was done out of the Board's private funds, at a cost of about £250. The opening of these wards will now allow of proper isolation of infectious cases, and relieve the Medical Officers of much anxiety engendered by the previous imperfect isolation in the wards of the Hospital. The utmost capacity of the new wards is sixteen beds. A grass plot has been laid out between the wards and the main building, but the necessity of erecting a fence to more completely cut off this portion of the grounds is very strongly felt. Telephonic communication has been established with them.

11. In the Dental Department the work continues to progress satisfactorily, and there has been a steady growth in the number of cases treated year by year. From the Report for the year it will be seen that there is a large increase over previous years, and more gratifying still is the marked increase in the proportion of stopping cases and operations for the saving of the teeth instead of their extraction. The work of conservative dental surgery, besides yielding the greatest benefit to the patients, has opened up a useful field of practice to the students, who, under the direction of the Honorary Officers, are permitted to undertake their treatment.

Besides the ordinary Hospital patients the children of the Girls' Industrial School have attended for examination and treatment.

During the year Ward 5 was specially equipped for the treatment of dental cases, and is now used as the Dental Department. This change not only facilitates the work of dentistry, but leaves the operating theatre free for surgical cases alone.

In the School of Dentistry the usual clinical instruction has been given. Courses of Lectures have been delivered by the Surgeon-Superintendent and Mr. A. Lucadou-Wells, and demonstrations in Anatomy given by the Surgeon-Superintendent and House Surgeon.

A gratifying testimony to the usefulness of the work done was the receipt of a communication from Dr. Drake, late Surgeon-Superintendent, in which he desires the Board of Management to place on record his appreciation of the services rendered to the Hospital by the Honorary Dental Staff during his term of office.

The destruction of the drying-room of the laundry about the middle of the year has led to a great increase in the expenditure in this department, most of the drying having to be done outside the Hospital. The subject of the erection and equipment of a laundry on more modern lines is engaging the attention of the Board and the Government.

13. During the year a petition, presented by some of the medical men of Launceston and the surrounding districts asking for a change in the present system of medical control of the Hospital, was on several occasions considered by the Board of Management. The Board, however, could not see its way clear to take upon itself the responsibility of making the suggested alteration.

14. The method of attending patients in the reception house by means of a married couple has in the past proved unsatisfactory. A change was therefore made, a male attendant and an elderly housekeeper being appointed, whilst female patients are attended by members of the Nursing Staff as part of the training of the latter.

15. An alteration was considered desirable in the maximum number of marks allotted to Nurses, so as to allow of marks being given for "Efficiency during course of Training." The maximum was therefore increased from 650 to 700 marks.

16. The widow of the late Wm. Barnes, Esq., has kindly donated to the Hospital the sum of £150 to perpetuate the memory of her late husband, who took such deep interest in the welfare of the Institution. The interest on this sum is to be devoted to the purchase of a prize—"The William Barnes Prize"—to be awarded annually on the 28th March to the nurse who obtains the highest number of marks in the Final Examinations held during the preceding twelve months.

17. The following improvements have been carried out during the year:—

The north end of the building was coated with waterproof material.

A large Pasteur filter was erected in the dispensary.

The floor of the Matron's room has been repaired.

The House Surgeon's rooms have been repainted and papered.

The walls at the Reception House were repaired.

Repainting was carried out in the Wardmaids' dining-room, Board-room, main hall and staircase, man's room at the Old Home and Ward 8. The blinds in the children's wards were repainted and repaired.

The second bathroom at the Old Home was altered and converted into a room for the reception house attendant.

The Dispenser's room, rooms at the Surgeon-Superintendent's residence, and the Nurses' dining room have been repapered.

A new paling fence was erected at the Surgeon-Superintendent's residence.

The window-sills at the north end of the building have been covered with sheet-lead.

A portion of the asphalt around the Hospital has been repaved.

Repairs to the boiler-door, mantel-pieces, fireplaces, water-pipes, drains behind mortuary, &c., have been effected.

The drying-ground has been extended, and several new posts erected.

Beading has been put on the fence along Mulgrave-street.

A stopcock has been placed on the hot water supply pipes to the isolation wards.

A new stopcock has been placed in the boiler-house.

A covered stretcher has been made for the better conveyance of bodies to the Mortuary.

18. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness to the patients and staff. During the year several performances were given by private individuals and companies for the entertainment of the patients, and were very much appreciated.

19. The Samaritan Fund is being utilised to assist deserving and indigent patients in obtaining any articles necessary to their comfort and health when leaving the Hospital, or to provide travelling expenses to enable them to return to their homes.

20. The diet scales for the patients and staff have been revised, and alterations made to allow of an increase in the more necessary food-stuffs, and to provide more variety.

21. The quality of the provisions, &c. supplied to the Hospital during the year has, on the whole, been good.

22. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
