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

## GENERAL HOSPITAL, HOBART.

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### ANNUAL REPORT, 1889.

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SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, I have the honor to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, I trust, fully exhibit the working of that Institution during the past year.

2. Seventeen Board and eighty-one Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good ; while during the same period the Honorary Medical Officers were regular in their attendance on the sick. The following alteration in the *personnel* of the Board during the year was—J. Harcourt, Esq., retired, and C. Harbottle, Esq., elected in his place.

3. The annual cost of each bed in 1880 was £64 6s. 0½d. ; 1881, £68 11s. 1d. ; 1882, £68 3s. 6d. ; 1883, £68 11s. 10d. ; 1884, £68 3s. ; 1885, £67 15s. ; 1886, £68 12s. 5d. ; 1887, £73 6s. 9d. ; 1888, £68 3s. ; and for the past year, £73 10s.

4. It is satisfactory to note that during the past few years the amount of money received from patients who were able either in whole or in part to pay for their maintenance in hospital has shown a steady upward tendency. In 1882, £222 16s. 11d. was collected ; in 1883, £470 1s. 2d. was collected ; in 1884, £593 5s. 8d. was collected ; in 1885, £613 8s. was collected ; in 1886, £789 12s. 3d. was collected ; in 1887, £844 was collected ; in 1888, £998 12s. 5d. was collected ; and for the past year, £833 13s. 3d. has been collected.

5. No improvements of importance as regards buildings have been made during the past year ; but there being now available for additional buildings the sum of £5400 for carrying out necessary works during the ensuing year, the expenditure of this sum in the manner proposed will mark an important advance towards the general scheme of completion. The kitchen, so often reported on as defective and out of date, will now be thoroughly renovated, and equipped with modern appliances. The old separate apartments and grounds used for the control of male patients under observation for or suffering from mental derangement will be swept away, while superior accommodation for this unfortunate class of patients will be provided.

6. A building suitable as a chapel for the use of the Hospital, and at the same time available for other purposes, will also be added to the Institution ; and a commodious, convenient, and efficient building will be erected on the Argyle-street frontage of the Hospital Square as a home for the Nursing Staff of the Establishment.

7. The grounds of the Hospital, under the able management of Mr. F. Abbott, will be laid out in a manner suitable to the new arrangements, and in a style at once artistic and ornamental.

8. The number of Indoor patients treated during the year has not been so large as that of the preceding year. In 1888 the number was 1158 ; in 1889, 1013, being a diminution of 145, notwithstanding the fact that there were 23 more cases of typhoid fever treated.

9. The Out-door patient department shows a reduction in number of attendances compared with the preceding year, in which it amounted to 6207, the number of attendances for 1889 being only 4636.
