

THE Police Magistrates and Wardens of the Districts of Oatlands, Campbell Town, Launceston, and Longford, and the Municipalities of Richmond and Clarence, state that they are unable to furnish the information for the years 1855, 1856, and 1857, on account of having no record of such cases; consequently the numbers given in those years do not include the cases that may have occurred in those Districts during the years named.

THERE are not any documents in the Supreme Court which will enable me to furnish "the Cost of Prosecution" or even the amount of Witnesses' expenses in these cases; but the sums paid for the latter may be ascertained by reference to the orders filed with the Auditor, in which orders the name of the Prisoner, or one of the Prisoners, in each case will appear; and with a view of more readily arriving at the information required, I have caused the names of all the Persons tried in each case to be inserted in pencil in those cases where they did not sufficiently appear in the Return.

I would respectfully observe that, if the object of this Return be to ascertain the cost to the Colony of the Prosecution of Prisoners previously convicted *out* of the Colony, there are many expenses of Prosecution other than those of Witnesses. And I would further suggest that, to make the return complete, it should show the cost of *Prosecution* of every such Person, whatever the result.
