

ESTABLISHMENT AT THE CASCADES.

REPORT FOR 1874.

Laid upon the Table by the Attorney-General, and ordered by the House to be printed, July 27, 1875.



Cascade Establishment, 3rd May, 1875.

Sir.

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith Returns, Nos. 1 and 2, showing the cost of maintenance of Women, Children, Juvenile Offenders, and Male and Female Invalids for the year ended 31st December, 1874.

I beg to state that I was transferred from Port Arthur to this Establishment on the 1st April, 1874; but the returns which accompany this Report have been compiled for the twelve months ending 31st December.

It will be seen on reference to return marked A, that the net cost per head of prisoners in the House of Correction was £17 16s. $7\frac{1}{2}d$.; but by deducting half the pay of the carpenter,—for 274 days, during which time he was employed by the Public Works Department,—£35 14s. $2\frac{1}{2}d$., the cost per head will be reduced to £17 5s. $11\frac{1}{2}d$.

With regard to the Children it will be seen that the net cost per head was £11 6s. 4d.

Return C gives the cost per head of the Juvenile Offenders at £12 4s.

By return D it will be seen that the net cost of Invalids, male and female, was £13 15s. $2\frac{5}{4}d$. per head; but by deducting half the pay of the carpenter, as in the case of the Female House of Correction, the cost will be brought down to £13 12s. 4d. per head.

In all these establishments the cost per head is greater than for 1873; but this is fully accounted for by the increase in the price of provisions; and also, in the House of Correction, by reduced numbers.

In the case of the Reformatory, the total expense was further increased by the appointment of a schoolmaster and a scripture reader.
