



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TO THE HONORABLE THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

Legislative Council Office, Hobart Town, 16 July, 1875.

I have the honor to place in your hands the Statistics of the Colony for the past year, 1874.

Before proceeding to the consideration of the matters contained in the returns which Prefatory: follow this Report, I must offer a few observations in regard to the subjects which Conference of occupied the attention of the Government Statisticians of the Australasian Colonies at Statisticians. their meeting in Hobart Town in January last. It is to be regretted that those of Queensland, New Zealand, and Western Australia could not be present on that occasion, and that more time could not have been given to the consideration of the many subjects embraced in the annual Statistics; but a large amount of important work was done, and there is good reason to hope that the labours of the Conference will very materially tend to promote such uniformity as is possible in the compilation of the Statistics of the whole group of Colonies, and to make them more valuable for comparative purposes. The practice, introduced I believe by Sir Hercules Robinson, and now adopted by the Government of Victoria, of publishing annually in one view returns of the principal facts relating to the Australasian Colonies, must also have considerable influence in the same direction.

The conclusions at which the Conference arrived were put into the form of certain resolutions, to be submitted as their recommendations to their several Governments. Some of these recommendations will require legislative action if they are to be carried into effect; but where the present powers of the Government Statisticians are not exceeded, it was resolved that the alterations should be made in regard to the returns for the current year, 1875. This will necessitate the reconsideration and remodelling of a considerable part of the Statistics in most of the Colonies, and will be a matter of labour and difficulty. It was agreed to regard certain things as compulsory, as far as they can be supplied; and in respect to others, the Conference contented itself with recording its opinion that it was desirable that they should be furnished, if possible.

In making the suggestion that the Census of every Colony should be taken on the same day and tabulated on the same plan as that of the United Kingdom, the Conference wished to urge the principle that at least every ten years all the different Census should synchronise. Where ten years was considered too long an interval, a quinquennial Census might be taken in the middle of the period, without prejudice to the general arrangement.

The law has always made the furnishing of information for the purposes of the Census compulsory, and provided for the punishing of any default; and it seemed to the Conference that there was no reason why the same principle should not be applied generally to all statistical enquiries for State purposes: and in this view they were strengthened by recent legislation in Victoria.

It is a curious coincidence that the same suggestion, supported by the same reason, was made independently by the Collector of Agricultural Statistics at New Norfolk. I would request special attention to the following words used by him:—"It is true there are only a few who refused to give the information, but their example is being followed more every year, affecting the truthfulness of the return. Some ignorant producers have a sort of faint belief, which it is difficult to dispel, that the return is in some way connected with taxation."

For the purpose of correcting the estimates of population, it was recommended that returns of Immigration and Emigration should be exchanged by the various Customs departments, since in every country there are always some outgoing passengers whose names and numbers are recorded at the ports of destination, but not at the ports of departure.

Another of the resolutions agreed to aimed at a general plan of classifying articles in the Customs Returns, and items in the Treasury accounts.

Taxation was another subject which came under review. To attempt to compare the total taxation in different countries is now simply hopeless, as far as the general Statistics are concerned, since, in the first place, the burdens as between the State and local bodies are not uniformly apportioned; and, secondly, there has hitherto been no common understanding as to what taxation shall include. It was therefore considered necessary that this should be determined, and that returns should be given of the local as well as of the State taxes, so that the whole might be presented in one view. It was also laid down as a principle that in Statistical returns of finance, moneys raised by loan should be excluded from the revenue; and that the expenditure account, while excluding disbursements from funds so raised, should include the interest and repayment of loans: and it was resolved that, as in the case of taxation, separate and collective returns should be given of the revenue and expenditure both of the General Government and of the local bodies.

These were the most important subjects dealt with at the Conference.

I believe that great good will result from this meeting of the Statisticians of the Australasian Colonies. It will promote harmony of action, and uniformity of system; and if similar meetings were held from time to time, much valuable information could be mutually communicated, and anomalies could be discussed, and, possibly, removed. In his prefatory remarks to the "Statistical Abstract for the Principal Foreign Countries" published in 1874, Mr. Valpy, of the English Board of Trade, alluded to the difficulty of making comparisons between the Statistics of different countries; and every one who has attempted to make such comparisons in regard to these Colonies must have had the same experience. "Unfortunately," he says, "the Statistics of many countries cannot now be compared, owing to differences in dates and in the classification of details; but the making known the want of greater assimilation in the Statistical tables of different countries is a necessary step towards obtaining so important an element in comparative Statistics;" and he proceeds to give instances of variations in regard to the Census, to accounts of Revenue and Expenditure, to Railways, and to returns of Imports and Exports. All these will be shortly remedied, as far as this group of Colonies is concerned, if the suggestions of the Conference be carried into effect.

It is the aim of all inductive philosophy, from individual facts to discover general laws, principles, or tendencies. The generalisations of statistics are of great value in political economy, in physiology and hygiene, and in social science—in short, in all that concerns the welfare of man; and it is therefore a matter of gratulation that we have been enabled in some degree, however humble, to assist in devising means by which they may be more readily effected, and thus to co-operate with the many able men who are diligently studying comparative statistics in the Old World. And when we look at the position which the Australasian Colonies, with their immense extent of territory, must be destined ultimately to attain, the importance to the historian and scientist of the future, of securing uniformity as between themselves and the rest of the civilised world, in the records of their national life, can hardly be overestimated.

Having made these prefatory remarks, which the nature of the case seemed to require, I now address myself to the main subject of this Report.

I.—POPULATION.

Population, pp. 1-5.

The Population on 31 December, 1874, is estimated to have been 104,176; the number of males being 55,117, of females, 49,059. At the end of the previous year it was calculated to be 104,217; so that the number was smaller in 1874 than in 1873, by 41.

By excess of Births over Deaths, there was an increase of 579 males and 829 females, or 1408 persons; while by excess of emigration over immigration, there was

a decrease of 1449 persons of both sexes. In the previous year the increase by excess of Births was 1544, and the decrease by excess of emigration only 587; so that in both respects the year 1874 contrasts very unfavourably.

The number of persons who arrived in the Colony during that year was 6265; 5761 Immigration, or 91 96 per cent. from Victoria, 419 or 6.69 per cent. from New South Wales, 56 from p. 6.

New Zealand, 15 from South Australia, 7 from the United Kingdon, and the same number from the Mauritius. The number of assisted or 'Bounty' immigrants introduced during the year was only 18, against 28 in the previous year.

The number who left the Colony, as stated in the Returns, was 7714; 6631 or 85.96 per cent. for Victoria, 367 or 4.76 per cent. for New South Wales, 660 or 8.56 per cent. for New Zealand, 15 for South Australia, 8 for Queensland, 26 for Bird Island, and 7 for the United Kingdom. But the real numbers of emigrants must have been much greater than this; for there is always a considerable proportion of outward-bound passengers whose numbers are not known until the lists are made up after leaving the port. For example; in 1873, according to our Returns, 6491 persons left Tasmania for Victoria, while, in the Statistics of Victoria, it is stated that 7108 arrived in Victoria from Tasmania,—a difference of 617. In a similar way, the number of passengers from Victoria to Tasmania, appears as 3101 and 5824 in the records of those Colonies respectively,—a difference of 2723. In order to correct these discrepancies it is necessary that the numbers should be recorded as delivered at the ports of arrival, not at the ports of departure; and with that view, it was proposed by the Conference of Government Statisticians that lists of passengers should be periodically exchanged between the Customs departments of the various Colonies.

Next to Victoria, New Zealand attracted the greatest number of our emigrants; about six times as many having proceeded thither as in the previous year.

II.—TRADE, COMMERCE, AND NAVIGATION.

The total declared value of the Imports in 1874 was £1,257,785, being greater by Imports, £150,618 than in 1873. It has not been so large since 1858, when it reached £1,328,612. pp. 7—23; 30—43; p. 49. The rate per head was £12 1s. $5\frac{1}{2}d$. against £10 12s. $5\frac{1}{2}d$. in 1873.

The increases occurred almost entirely in the trade with the United Kingdom, Victoria, and New South Wales; that with New Zealand being very small in absolute amount, although the increase from £1505 to £3180, being rather more than 100 per cent., was relatively large.

On the trade with the following Colonies there were decreases to the extent mentioned:-

Queensland, from £17,647 to £11,498: difference £6149. South Australia, from £4215 to £775: difference £3440. Mauritius, from £110,060 to £82,365: difference £27,695.

The principal increases in the Imports were on the following articles:—

In my report for 1868, I gave a statement of the quantities of Spirits, Tea, Sugar, and Tobacco, taken out of bond for home consumption, from 1858 to 1868 inclusively. In order that we may see what effect the improved condition of the Colony has had upon the use of these articles, I subjoin a continuation of the same statement up to the year 1874. To the articles mentioned, Cocoa, Chocolate, Coffee, Chicory, Malt Liquors, Wine, Tobacco, and Cigars have been added.

The quantity of Spirits consumed was never so small in all the period from 1858 to 1874 as it was in 1872. Thence however it became greatly increased, making the mean for the last three years somewhat greater than for the first three. The consumption of Wine did not vary much, the additional quantity being no more than the increase of population would lead us to expect. In Malt Liquors there is a considerable decrease, the imported article being, no doubt, superseded to a considerable extent by the homebrewed. Tea shows a considerable increase, as also do Sugar and Cocoa and Chocolate. In Coffee and Chicory, on the contrary, there is a great falling off. Tobacco and Cigars were nearly the same in quantity in both periods, so that the consumption per head was less in the latter than in the former period.

Exports, pp. 24—29; 43—51.

The total declared value of the Exports was £925.325, being greater than in 1873 by £31,769; the amount per head of population being £8 17s. $7\frac{3}{4}d$., against £8 2s. $9\frac{1}{2}d$. in the previous year. The value has not been so large since 1864.

The shipments to the United Kingdom were increased by £41,498; to New Zealand, by £26,870; and to New South Wales, by £2123. But the outward trade with Victoria declined to the extent of £30,394; with Queensland, to the extent of £3014; with South Australia, to the extent of £1034. On the Exports to New Caledonia also, there was a falling off of £1775; and those to Batavia and New Guinea, which in 1873 were respectively £945 and £960, ceased altogether in the past year.

A comparison of the total values of the principal articles of Export in 1873 and 1874 shows the following variations:—

The export of Jam, which amounted to 2,648,012 lbs., had an increase in quantity of 384,746 lbs.; and that of Green Fruit was larger by 54,176 bushels than in 1873. After Wool, Fruit, green and preserved, is now our chief commodity of exchange.

Malt Liquors, which are not included in the above articles, were more than doubled in quantity in 1874, the Exports for the last three years having been 9369, 10,399, and 23,011 galls., respectively. Stone also had an increase, the quantities in the last four years having been 916, 455, 966, and 1157 tons.

Of Tin Ore the first export was of 4 tons in 1873. It was increased to 142 tons in 1874. The production of Tin, both in its native and manufactured condition, will be largely augmented during the present year, and this metal ought to become, if we may judge from the reports of discoveries hitherto made in several parts of the Colony, one of our most abundant and profitable articles of commerce.

A small parcel of $27\frac{1}{2}$ tons of Iron Ore was also sent to the United Kingdom in 1874. The present year will, I presume, see the practicability of producing metallic iron from the ores which are so copiously distributed through the island, put to the test on an adequate scale.

During the past year, there entered the ports 607 vessels, of an aggregate tonnage Shipping, of 119,706. As compared with the previous year, there was an increase in the tonnage pp. 52-57. of 1353, but a decrease in the number of 54. The tonnage of ships which arrived with cargoes was greater by 3404; but there was a decrease of 2051 in that of vessels which entered in ballast. Three foreign vessels, of 1084 tons entered, against 7, of 2105 tons, in 1873.

The vessels which cleared outwards in 1874 numbered 620, measuring 119,801 tons. The tonnage, as compared with 1873, was slightly in favour of 1874, but the vessels were 61 fewer. The foreign vessels leaving for the southern Whale Fisheries were only 3, of 1084 tons, whereas in 1873 they were 7, with 2028 tons; and the British vessels bound for the same destination were only 9, with 2136 tons, against 17, with 4318 tons, in the previous year.

As regards the different ports and sub-ports, it appears that there were increases in the tonnage inwards,—at Hobart Town, of 6505; at Stanley, of 1277; at Wynyard, of 201: decreases,—at Launceston, of 4738; at Leith, of 303; at Torquay, of 1589. the tonnage outwards there were the following increases:—At Hobart Town, 4850; at Stanley, 255; at Wynyard, 311: decreases:—At Launceston, 3939; at Leith, 388; at Torquay, 1047.

making a difference of 1395 tons in favour of the last year.

I find that the tonnage, both ways, was not so large in any year, with the exception of 1864, since 1859.

The number and tonnage of vessels on the register at the beginning and end of the year were-

showing a decrease of 5 vessels, measuring 285 tons. Twelve vessels, of 621 tons, were wrecked or otherwise lost, and 13, of 832 tons, were struck off the register from other causes; while 19 new vessels, of 770 tons, were added, and an accession of 1 of 398 tons was gained by re-registry after purchase, or by transfer from other ports.

Acting on a suggestion made to me, I have added this year a return of vessels built and sold out of the Colony, from which it appears that 9 vessels of 449 tons, valued at £10,950, were so sold during 1874. The increased activity which now prevails in the ship-building trade gives special interest to the matter.

Whale Fisheries, p. 57. The Whale Fisheries employed only 16 vessels in 1874, instead of 18, as in the previous year. These brought into port 342 tuns of Sperm Oil, valued at £30,780; whereas in 1873, 558 tuns of Sperm and $12\frac{1}{2}$ tuns of Black Oil, valued at £44,000, were returned as the produce.

Prices, p. 58.

The market prices at Hobart Town generally did not vary much in 1874 from the rates which obtained in 1873. Butter was a little lower; Wheat fell from an average of 5s. 9d. to 5s. 3d.; Barley rose from 4s. 9d. to 5s. 6d.; Oats were about 1s. 6d. per bushel higher; Hay, £2 15s. higher; Malt Liquors were also dearer; also Brandy and Whisky, while Rum was cheaper; Timber was dearer, in consequence of the increased demand for exportation. The price of Vegetables was also higher, but especially that of Onions, which, having been from £2 10s. to £3 10s. in 1873, in 1874 was from £10 to £20.*

The Government contract prices were higher as regards Pearl Barley, Brandy, Bread, Butcher's Meat, Flour, Oatmeal, Port Wine; while the price of fresh Butter, Coffee, Currants, Black Oil, Raisins, Rice, Sago, Soap (yellow), Sugar (ration), Tea, Tobacco, and Vinegar was lower.

Trades and Manufactories, p. 59. Trades and Manufactories were returned to the number of 3391, against 3386 in 1873. The following are the increases:—Auctioneers, 4; Bone-dust Mill, 1; Boot and Shoemakers, 4; Bricklayers, 14; Cheese-makers, 19; Coach-makers, 3; Cooper, 1; Corn and Ship Chandlers, 2; Engineers, 6; General Dealers, 26; Mill, hydraulic, 1; Painters and Glaziers, 6; Plasterers, 3; Saddle and Harness-maker, 1; Saw Mills, 4; Shipwrights and Boat-builders, 31; Tailor, 1; Tin Smelting Works, 1; Watch-maker, 1; Woollen Manufactory, 1; Woolstapler, 1. Thus the industries in which the principal advances were made were—Building, cheese-making (or rather dairy farming, since the exports of both Butter and Cheese were greatly in excess of those of the previous three years); that useful department of trade pursued by the "General Dealer" (though the increase in this direction is more than balanced by the loss of 51 Grocers; and Ship-building, which has sprung into vigorous life on the North-western Coast. On the following industries there were decreases:—Agricultural Implement Makers, 5; Bakers, 2; Blacksmiths, 6; Breweries, 2; Brickmakers, 3; Butchers, 3; Cabinetmakers and Joiners, 7; Chemists and Druggists, 3; Cider makers, 5; Dyer, 1; Fellmongers, 2; Foundries, iron and brass, 2; Furriers, 2; Gardeners, 2; Grocers, 51; Hat and Cap Manufactory, 1; Ironmongers, 6; Iron Smelting Works, 1 (at George Town); Maltster, 1; Mills, flour, 10; Millwright, 1; Pastry Cooks and Confectioners, 3; Plasterers, 3; Pottery, 1; Publican, 1; Sailmaker, 1; Soap-boiler, 1; Stonemason, 1; Tanners, 9; Tinworkers, 2; Turners, 7; Wheelwrights, 7.

Wages, p. 60.

The irregularities in the Labor Market make it difficult to institute a close comparison between the rates prevailing in one year and another; but taking the average of all the districts, it appears that in 1874 the wages of the following trades and other callings were higher than in 1873:—Carpenters, Engineers, Masons, Painters, Plumbers, Saddlers, Tanners, Wheelwrights, Day Laborers, Seamen, Mowers (per acre), Shepherds, Shearers, and some descriptions of Domestic Servants; while in other cases, the rates were either stationary or lower. The Main Line Railway works, and the active emigration to Victoria and New Zealand were doubtless the principal cause of the rise, by diminishing the supply.

Mines: Gold, p. 62.

For many years only two branches of Mining (Gold and Coal) in Tasmania were of sufficient importance to have a place assigned to them in the Statistics. During the past year, however, Tin, Iron, and Slate attracted much attention, and a collective return of the quantities of these and other minerals produced has been compiled. Goldmining is dealt with in a separate return, which for obvious reasons has been transferred from the place it occupied in the previous year, under the head of "Finance," as being the representative of value, to a station immediately preceding the return of other Minerals.

Gold-mining operations were carried on in 1874 at only two places—Mathinna, or Black Boy, and Nine Mile Springs—those at the Hellyer River having been discontinued.

^{*} The mean of the rates given by the Collectors of Agricultural Statistics, was, however, lower in 1875 than in 1874.

There was thus a reduction of 75 in the average number of persons employed in alluvial mining. But in regard to Quartz mining there was an increase of 30 persons. The value of mining plant was about the same. The yield of Gold in 1874 was—Alluvial, 850 ozs., or 680 less than in 1873; Quartz, 3800 ozs. 14 dwts., or 669 ozs. 14 dwts. more. The quantity of Quartz crushed was 3452½ tons, or 731½ tons less. The average yield per ton of stone crushed was 1 oz. 5 dwts. 8½ grs., a parcel of 1147 tons at Nine Mile Springs having produced 1 oz. 15 dwts. 17 grs. to the ton, and since the beginning of the current year a crushing of 235 tons is reported in the newspapers to have given an average of 2 ozs. 5 dwts. 22½ grs. The total value of the Gold obtained, as far as could be ascertained by the Commissioner, was £18,491, or £101 more than in 1873. The Customs returns show an increase in the export of £2502 in the value, and of 439 in the number of ounces. The average value of Gold per ounce in 1874 was—Alluvial, £3 19s. 6d., or 1s. higher than in 1873; Quartz, also £3 19s 6d., with no variation. The Gold from Nine Mile Springs is set down as averaging £4 per oz.

The Gold Commissioner's reports are, as usual, appended to the volume. I am sorry to observe that he anticipates increased difficulty in obtaining complete information in regard to Gold mining for the present year. The continual changes of which he complains, and the utter instability of almost all institutions and departments in this Colony, make the duty of dealing with its Statistics most harassing and discouraging.

The quantity of Coal returned as raised in 1874 was 871 tons less than in 1873. Coal, p. 63. There was an increase of 1140 tons at Tasman's Peninsula, and of 22 tons at New Town, but this was more than counterbalanced by the decreases at the other places.

Of Iron Ore 1400 tons are stated to have been raised in the year—1000 at Middle Iron, it. Arm, West Tamar, and 400 at Lewisham, Sorell; and, as already stated, $27\frac{1}{2}$ tons were exported. I have no official information as to the quantity of iron smelted in the year. The Tasmanian Charcoal Iron Company are understood to be making preparations for starting the manufacture of iron on a large scale; and the question whether it can be profitably pursued in this Colony will therefore, in due time, receive a practical solution.

Sanguine expectations were formed at one time of the Slate which abounds in large slate, ib. quantities at the Piper's River; but little seems to have been done with it. The quantity raised in the year is given as 250,000 slates; and 94 tons of slates and slabs appear among the exports to Victoria. I am sorry to observe in the public papers a notice of a meeting for dissolving the Bangor Slate Company. The cause of collapse I take to be that which, for many years past, has proved the ruin of one promising undertaking after another—want of sufficient capital at starting. Experience has unmistakably shown that to start any Company without providing in the first instance means for raising ample funds to meet all contingencies, is, in the majority of cases, simply to court certain failure. A Company, cramped at every step by want of funds, never can succeed; and its downfall is not merely a loss to its own shareholders, but a serious injury to the whole community, by discouraging all associated enterprise, and by wasting capital that might, under other circumstances, have been permanently and profitably employed.

The mineral which occupied the greatest share of attention in the course of the past year is Tin. As to the character of the deposits at Mount Bischoff there seems to be no question. The ore is acknowledged to be remarkable for richness, and for the quantities in which it is found; and it is distributed over a wide extent of country. The supply is therefore practically unlimited. In consequence of the great difficulties of carriage to the port of Launceston, the progress of tin-mining has been slow; and only 142 tons of ore were exported in 1874. The ore is now smelted at Launceston; and the present year ought to witness the shipment of a much larger quantity of the smelted metal. The tin-bearing country in the north-east corner of the island is, I am informed, not so rich in the metal as that in the vicinity of Mount Bischoff, but the facilities of access and of transport should, if advantage be taken of them, enable the mines to be developed much more rapidly. The report of the nearest Stipendiary Magistrate as to the Tin Mines of Mount Bischoff is appended at the end of the volume.

The discovery made since the beginning of the present year, of a large lode Bismuth. of Bismuth, is one of the most important that has yet taken place. If the lode should prove a permanent one, it must become a source of considerable wealth to the Colony.

III.—FINANCE, &c.

I subjoin, as in former years, a Statement of the Public Revenue and Expenditure Finance, for 1873 and 1874, furnished at my request by the Assistant Colonial Treasurer:— pp. 65—67.

The total consolidated revenue shows an increase upon that of 1873 of 2·16 per cent.; and on the several items there were the following centesimal increases:—On Customs, &c., 6·80; on Inland Revenue, 11·58; on Land Revenue, 10·81. The decrease on "other receipts" was on moneys received on account of previous years.

The revenue derived from Customs in 1874 was in the proportion of 55·13 per cent. of the total consolidated revenue.

The proportion of Revenue derived from taxation, on the principles affirmed at the Statistical Conference, was 65.64 per cent.† The amount of Taxation paid to the General Government per head of population was £2 1s. $3\frac{3}{4}d$.

Imperial Expenditure, p. 69. The Expenditure on account of the Imperial Government is stated to have been £14,485 14s. 11d., the amount in 1873 having been £36,567 8s. 4d.

Course of Exchange, p. 69.

During 1874 the Banks still bought mercantile Bills on London as in 1873, at a discount of $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., but lowered the rate of Exchange on Bills on London, issued by themselves, which had been at from $\frac{3}{4}$ to 1 per cent. premium in 1873, to $\frac{1}{2}$ to par in 1874. The rates of Exchange with the Australasian Colonies remained unaltered.

While the Specie and Bullion declined by £3540, or 1.42 per cent., the Balances due increased by £4854, or 7.59 per cent., the Debts due to the Banks by £196,860, or 21.15 per cent., the Notes in Circulation by £14,227, or 14.62 per cent., and the Deposits by £194,671, or 22.70 per cent. The small increase in the Specie as compared with the large extension of the general business, is quite anomalous, but a comparison of the business of the two English Banks shows how it occurred. It will be sufficient for this a purpose to take the December quarter, there being no material difference in the four above quarters-

The small amount of Debts due and of Notes in Circulation in the former case, as compared with the amount of Deposits, shows that the business of the Bank was principally confined to receiving deposits; and the increased rate of interest offered is consistent only with the supposition before mentioned—that money was sent out of the Colony to some other country where it could be turned to greater profit.

The increase on Profit and Loss was very large, and greater than that in the preceding year, 1873, which was 42.05 per cent. The increase on Deposits during the year was, however, less than that in 1873, which was 16.39 per cent. The large increase on Repayments, as compared with that for 1873, (5.79 per cent.,) is easily accounted for in connection with the increase of Deposits in the ordinary Banks, by the fact that the latter offered a higher rate of interest for moneys lodged for 12 months, and thus must have caused the withdrawal of considerable sums from the Savings Banks. In 1874 on the average amount on Mortgage there was a decrease of £11,144, while on the sums invested in Debentures and Treasury Bills there was an increase of £37,388.

Public Debt,

The Public Debt of the Colony on 31 December, 1874, was £1,476,700, of which £52,000 consisted of Treasury Bills redeemable in 1875, and the remainder of Debentures, redeemable partly in Hobart Town, and partly in London, at various dates, from 1875 to 1902. There were also Debentures to the amount of £72,300 authorised but not issued. The actual indebtedness per head of estimated population was £14 3s. 6d., being $\frac{3}{4}d$. less than in 1873.

During the year, the number of Post Offices and Receiving-houses was increased by 9; of persons employed also by 9; and of miles of post roads by 50. The Revenue increased by £1200, and the Expenditure, in consequence of the additional cost of conveying the Intercolonial Mails, by £3210.

By the Electric Telegraph were transmitted during the year 30,301 paid messages, Electric was an increase, as compared with the previous year, of 18.55 per cent., and on the amount received, 7.80 per cent. On the number of Messages transmitted on public service there was a decrease of 1933, cr 19.88 per cent. The increase on the Messages by land lines was 4109 or 26.03 per cent. by land lines was 4109, or 26.03 per cent., on those by Submarine Cable, 633, or 6.48 per cent. The total number of Messages transmitted, of all kinds, including shipping messages, estimated at 4000, was 42,020, against 39,281 in 1873.

The number of miles of Telegraph open on 31 December, 1874, was 291; in course of construction, 205.

On the Launceston and Western Railway there were conveyed during the year L. & W. Railpassengers, 91,264; goods, 24,802 tons: the passengers showing an increase on the number in 1873 of 8341, or 10.06 per cent.; the goods a decrease of 481 tons, or 1.90 per cent. The passenger traffic has been steadily increasing, the numbers in the last three years having been—1872, 63,647; 1873, 82,923; 1874, 91,264; the average per train being respectively, 39.6, 44.01, and 48.14; and the average per train mile, 0.88, 0.99, and 1.07. The tonnage of goods in the same years was 18,111,25,283, and 24,802; the average tons per train, 11.3, 13.5, and 13.2; and per train mile, 0.25, 0.3, and 0.29.

The receipts of the Railway were in 1874, £18,325 4s. 10d., or 3s. 10.7d. per train mile, the working expenses £15,627 18s. 8d., or 3s. 3.85d. per train mile, being at the rate of £347 5s. $7\frac{1}{4}d$. per mile of railway open, besides which there were losses by fire to the extent of £758 5s. 5d., leaving a balance in favour of revenue of £1939 0s. 9d. The revenue per train for 1873 was 4s. 1.02d.; for 1872 was 3s. 9.24d. The total number of miles travelled in 1874 was 1,612,173, against 1,423,671 in 1873, being 13.24 per cent. in excess. The average distance over which each passenger travelled was in 1874, 17.66 miles; in 1873, 17.17, an increase of 2.77 per cent.

Penal Establishments, pp. 110—114. The average number of prisoners under punishment in the Penal Establishments during 1874 was 540, of whom 380, or 70.37 per cent. had been Imperial convicts. The net cost of these establishments was £19,242 12s. 9d., of which £13,947 14s. 9d. was borne by the Colonial Government, and £5294 18s. by the Imperial.

Charitable Establishments, pp. 115—126. The Hospitals had an average of 143 Patients during the year, and caused a net expenditure of £6183 1s. 6d., nearly the whole of which was chargeable to the Colonial Government. In these are not included the Hospital for the Insane at New Norfolk, the cost of which was £6231 16s. 2d., of which £766 3s. 11d. was apportioned to the Imperial Government. The average number of Lunatics and Idiots maintained during the year was 353, 200 of whom, or 56.66 per cent., had been Imperial Convicts. Of these 353 Lunatics, 270 were kept at New Norfolk, and 83 at Port Arthur. Calculating the proportion of expense at Port Arthur from the rate per head, the total cost incurred on account of Lunatics in 1874 would be £8616 6s. 7d.

The Pauper Establishments include the Queen's Asylum for Destitute Children, the Cascades, for Males and Females, the New Town Institution for Females, the Invalid Depôt, Launceston, and the Brickfields, for Males; and the Benevolent Societies at Hobart Town and Launceston. The average daily number of Paupers in the Government Institutions was 1001, the net cost of whom for the year was £13,256 8s. 7d. Of the adults (751) 656, or 85 36 per cent., have been Imperial convicts. The Benevolent Societies relieved 387 adults, and 555 children during the year, at a net expense of £1402 4s. 10d., the Government contributing £1064 5s. 1d., and private individuals £507 6s. 7d. Independently of these institutions, the Treasurer disbursed the sum of £8866 10s. 1d. in out-door relief. Including the Boys' Home, but excluding the Industrial School for Females and the Ragged Schools, which are rather educational than eleemosynary institutions, the whole expenditure borne by the Colony for charitable objects, (including Hospitals), was £33,934 7s. 5d.

The Industrial School received from Government £398 12s. 5d., and the Ragged Schools £300. The average daily number of children maintained at the former was 36, and the average number in daily attendance at the latter, 363.

As compared with the year 1873, the out-door relief in 1874 increased by £53 17s. 9d. The amount of relief dispensed by the Benevolent Societies was, on the contrary, considerably less.

Royal Society, p. 127.

The next returns are those of the Royal Society and Public Library. The amount of Government aid granted to the former was £600. The number of visits recorded as having been made to the Society's Museum was 16,456, and to the Gardens 38,508, being in excess of those in 1873. The number of visits to the Public Library, as stated in the returns, was smaller by 852 than in 1873. This does not prove, however, that the actual use made of the Library was less, because a considerable proportion of persons will always neglect to record their visits, and that proportion may happen to be greater in one year than another.

Road and Bridge Trusts, p. 130.

The Road Trusts had $3075\frac{2}{4}$ miles of roads under their control; they raised £16,798 16s. $2\frac{1}{2}d$. by Rates and Tolls; they received £5670 17s. 5d. from Government; they had balances in hand at the beginning of the year to the amount of £5486 7s. 5d.; their aggregate revenue being £27,956 1s. $0\frac{1}{2}d$. They expended, in Salaries £1031 1s. 4d.; on Roads, directly, £19,212 7s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$.; in other ways, £3290 13s. 6d.; making a total of £23,534 2s. $1\frac{1}{2}d$. There was an increase, as compared with the previous year, of £2452 10s. 3d. on Rates and Tolls; and of £4170 7s. $5\frac{1}{2}d$. in the total revenue. The sums contributed by the Treasury amounted to £1322 1s. 7d. less than in 1873. The collective balance in hand on 1st January, 1874, as shown by the returns rendered to me for that year, appears to be £5486 7s. 5d., while, from those furnished for 1873, it amounted to only £4945 9s. 4d.—a difference of £540 18s. 1d. The existence of such a difference, where there ought not to be any, shows the need of some effectual check upon the accounts. An audit, so called, by persons who are not skilled accountants, or experienced in account keeping, is little better than useless. Without such a check it is simply impossible, however much trouble we may take, to be sure that the information supplied for statistical purposes is correct. On the total expenditure there was an increase of £4693 17s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$. The amount spent directly upon Roads was greater by £5379 5s. 9d., while the indirect outlay for salaries and incidental expenses was £685 7s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$. less.

The accounts of the two Bridge Trusts require no special comment. Their revenue amounted to £2967 10s. 2d.; their disbursements to £2827 17s. 3d.

The Municipalities of Hobart Town and Launceston assessed the annual value Municipalities of property within their limits at £161,559, being £1183 more than in 1873; they pp. 132—133. raised £24,125 9s. 9d. from Rates; they had a total Revenue of £37,037 13s. 11d.; and an aggregate Expenditure of £36,506 12s. 9d. On the revenue there was an increase of £794 4s. 3d.; on the expenditure, an increase of £1216 2s. 3d. The Taxation in the pound at Hobart Town was 3s. $1\frac{1}{2}d$.; at Launceston, 3s. 3d.

The Rural Municipalities assessed the annual value of property within their boundaries at £341,541, the rates levied being from 6d. to 9d. in the pound on private property. The amount produced by these rates was £11,570 14s. 4\frac{3}{4}d.; their aggregate Revenue was £19,524 16s. $4\frac{3}{4}d$.; their Expenditure for Police £11,432 5s. 10d.; for other Salaries, £4064, and for other purposes, £4049 0s. $6\frac{1}{2}d$., being in the whole £19,545 6s. $4\frac{1}{2}d$. On the Revenue there was a decrease of £857 4s. $5\frac{1}{4}d$; and on the Expenditure a decrease of £776 6s. $1\frac{1}{9}d$.

The annual value of landed Property in 1874, as shown by the Valuation Rolls, was Valuation of £598,787. The corresponding value in 1873 was assessed at £601,538, or £2751 more. The decrease arises out of a reduction in the District of Kingston from £25,396 to £19,498,—a difference of £5898.

V.—Crown Lands, Agriculture, &c.

producing a sum of £85,748 15s. 6d. The County Lands averaged £1 2s. $1\frac{1}{2}d$. per acre, the Town and Suburban Lands, £9 10s. Free Grants under different Acts were made of 3231 acres.

Comparing these figures with those for 1873, we find an increase of 5 in the number, of 31,152 in the acreage, and of £38,942 in the amount for which they were sold. The County lots of and under 500 acres were fewer by 45 than in 1873, and the area was smaller by 2729 acres. On the lots over 500 acres, there was an increase of 23, (the number in 1874 being nearly three times that in 1873), and in the acreage, of 33,814. There were increases on the average price per acre—of County Lands, of 1s. $4\frac{1}{4}d$.; of Town Lands, of £2 4s. 4d.

There were leased—In Tasmania itself, 545,848 acres; in the Islands, 802,552 acres; producing a rental of £5898 10s. 7d.

On the land under lease for pastoral purposes there was a decrease of 304,012 acres, and on the rental derived therefrom, a decrease of £197 4s. 6d. Considering that the decided tendency was to give more attention to wool-growing and stock-rearing, and less to agriculture, such a circumstance is quite contrary to all expectation, and since the figures for 1874 were, as I am given to understand, carefully revised, leads to the inference that there must have been some error in the previous return.

During 1874, there were issued,—741 Miners' Rights, 13 Business Licences, 3 Gold Auriferous Mining Leases, covering together 22a. 3r. 36p.; there were granted 1 Prospecting claim, and 2 Prospecting areas; and 2 Machinery areas were registered: and the amount received was £522 0s. 2d. In 1873 only 198 Miners' Rights were issued, 1 Water Right, and 10 Business Licences, 2 Leases were executed; and the amount received was only £476 1s. 9d. The cause of this improvement was the re-opening of some of the Mines at Nine Mile Springs, leading to the discovery of stone of exceptional richness. At the end of 1874 there were in force, in excess of the numbers at the end of 1873, 543 Miners' Rights, 1 Water Right, 3 Business Licences, 5 Leases comprehending 50a. 1r. 18p., 2 Machinery areas, of 2 acres each; while 2 Prospecting areas were relinquished.

Leases of Mineral Lands are taken up chiefly on speculation, and freely abandoned tands conwhen the first excitement is over. In 1873 Iron held the "pride of place" in popular favor, 20 leases with an area of 1488 acres having been granted: in 1874, the "iron age" had passed away, only 5 leases, with an area of 192a. 3r. having been granted, and Tin

became the favorite, 16 leases, whose area was 1279 acres, having been taken up, against 5, and 400 acres, in 1873. Five leases for Coal, and 4 for Slate were also issued in 1874. The number of leases of Mineral Land in force at the end of that year was 56—namely, Iron and Tin, each 22; Coal, 6; Slate, 5; Lime, 1; the total area 4236 acres; and the total rental received, £1036 16s. 3d.; the rental received for new leases granted during the year being £489 6s. 3d.

Agriculture : Acreage, p. 139.

The Agricultural and Live Stock Returns were published this year on June 15, a month earlier than last year. They might have been brought out a week earlier, had the returns for Clarence and Richmond been received. The Collector for Clarence has accounted for the delay by stating that he was waiting for the return of some of the producers' schedules; but from Richmond no explanation has been received.

The acreage in the principal crops for the last three years is shown below:—

It will be seen that only in Oats was there an increase. The declension is due principally to two causes—1. The difficulty of obtaining labor, and the increase in the rate of wages; 2. The rise in the price of Wool: both combined making it more to the interest of the landholder to grow Wool than Agricultural produce.

In the land under Pease, Beans, and Tares, there was a decrease of 601 acres as compared with the figures for the previous year; while the acreage occupied by Rootcrops (Turnips, Carrots, Mangel Wurzel, and Onions), was larger by 787—nearly 36 per cent. There were also decreases under the head of Gardens and Orchards, Green Forage, Permanent Artificial Grasses (under which term is included all land which has been laid down in grass, and has not relapsed into a state of nature, as distinguished from natural or "bush" pastures), Bare Fallow, and "all other cultivated land." Under the head of "New Land broken up" there is an increase of 274 acres; under "Rotation of Crops," there appears to be a decrease of 4228 acres. This I believe to be apparent only, and to arise from the better understanding of the term. So much had this important point in husbandry been neglected, that for some years it was exceedingly difficult to get farmers and some Collectors to comprehend even what was meant by it.

Produce, pp. 140—141. Although the breadth of land in crop was in most cases less than in 1873-4, the yield in every case except that of Tobacco, Hops, and Apples, was considerably greater. This will be best seen by showing in one view the average produce of the principal crops for the last three years:—

The season of 1874-5 was a favorable one, the rain-fall at Hobart Town having been in excess of that of the preceding year; though the reports speak of the effects of drought upon the crops at Campbell Town, Fingal, and Horton. Grub, wire-worm, and blight, as well as rabbits, were also destructive in some Districts.

^{*} It should here be noted that a somewhat different system of calculating the general average in this year has been adopted. In the previous years the sum of the averages was found and divided by the number for the mean; for 1874-5 the total area was divided by the total produce. Experience has shown that the latter method is the more exact. The average of Hops for the two years previous to 1874-5, as shown above, has been recalculated on this principle.

It will be useful to compare these yields with those of other countries. For Victoria, N. S. Wales, and Western Australia the average is for three years.*

Thus it will be seen that Tasmania is more productive than any of the other Australasian Colonies, excepting New Zealand.

Some progress was made, in the face of all discouragements, in the use of manures, in drainage, and in the employment of machinery, to which I shall have again to refer. Of the latter, a good criterion is the number of acres of wheat reaped by machine, and by hand, in the last three years, which was as follows:-

The above figures, with the exception of those relating to Wheat, Oats, Potatoes, and Hay in Victoria, are taken from the Agricultural Returns published by the Board of Trade in England. The average produce per acre is not given in the Statistics of New South Wales; in Queensland, not even the gross produce. This is a good example of the difficulties in making comparisons caused by the absence of uniformity in Statistics, and of the desirability of reducing figures into such a form (per-centages, averages, &c.) that they may at once be employed for comparative purposes, without the labor and expenditure of time necessary if the calculations had to be made whenever the results were required.

Pigs are the only description of Stock in which there was a decrease. The diminution amounted to 8160. The cause is not explained, but there is no reason to suppose that there is any error in the returns, since the deficiency is not found in one or two districts only, but is pretty equally distributed over the whole.

. Compared with the numbers in 1873, there were increases—On Sheep: imported, 7596; slaughtered, 7099: on Pigs, 504. There were decreases—on Horned Cattle: imported, 137; slaughtered, 609.

Collectors' Reports, pp. 197—204.

The reports of the Collectors speak of the difficulty of obtaining labor in the Country Districts, and show that this is at least one of the causes of the increase of sheep, since at the present price of wool, it is more convenient and profitable to feed sheep and cattle than to cultivate for crops. The increase in the land appropriated to stock-feeding of course implies a corresponding reduction in the area under crop. The Collectors also note an increase in the use of machinery at Evandale, Glamorgan, Longford, and Westbury. At Longford reaping machines are coming into general use, and at Westbury there is reported to be "a vast improvement. The double-furrow plough, reaping, and mowing machines are much used in the district." At New Norfolk the introduction of subsoil ploughs is noticed. Fallowing and the use and conservation of manures are mentioned as coming into vogue at Glamorgan, Oatlands, Richmond, Hamilton, and Longford. In view of the tendency to substitute pastoral for agricultural operations, it could scarcely be expected that underground drainage would receive increased attention; but I am pleased to find that in the New Norfolk district a trial has been made, though on a small scale, and the consequence is stated to be, that "the ground can be successfully cultivated now, whereas previously to its being drained, it could not be depended on."
"The result," I am informed, "is very satisfactory." Draining (I presume on the surface) is noticed also at Oatlands and Spring Bay.

I am glad to hear that at Green Ponds one individual is devoting himself assiduously to Horse-breeding. Improvements in the breed of Cattle and Sheep are reported at Hamilton, Kingborough, Port Sorell, Westbury, and Longford; and I am informed that at Spring Bay." there is evidently much more care bestowed on the washing and sorting of wool than formerly was the practice. There has also been an increased desire generally to obtain a better class of sheep by using the best rams procurable." plain that the energies of those who form the agricultural and pastoral classes were devoted principally and increasingly to the rearing and improvement of stock; and there does seem to have been an important advance in this direction.

VI:-LAW, CRIME, &c.

The number of persons committed for trial continued to decrease, having been only 120 in 1874, while it was 125 in 1873, 123 in 1872, 137 in 1871, and 238 in 1866.

Persons tried in Superior Courts,

The number tried in the Superior Courts-that is in the Supreme Court, and in the Recorder's Court at Launceston-in 1874, was 81, of whom 63 were convicted, and 18 acquitted. Of these 81, 65 were charged with Felonies, 16 with Misdemeanors; and of their offences, 27 were against the person, and 54 against property. In 1873 the number tried was 101, convicted, 75; in 1872, tried 108, convicted 82.

The total number of ordinary cases dealt with in the Magistrates' Courts in 1874 Curiously enough, the number of was 6513, against 7308 in 1873, and 6321 in 1872. cases of drunkenness tried was exactly the same (1474) in 1873 and 1874. Adding the number of convictions obtained and the orders for payment of money made in the three years the sum will be—in 1872, 4464; in 1873, 5193; and in 1874, 4693. The corresponding numbers in the three preceding years were in 1871, 4725; in 1870, 5056; Notwithstanding the excess of cases in 1873, the general tendency, and in 1869, 5202. it will be observed, was towards a diminution of offences.

Besides the ordinary magisterial cases, there were 2389 of non-payment of the Magisterial Launceston and Western Railway Rate, which resulted in 1952 orders being made for Cases, p. 147. payment.

There were again no Executions in 1874. The last Execution was in 1870.

The decrease in the more serious offences is plain. The increase in minor offences is doubtless traceable to temporary causes.

The Supreme Court in its ordinary Civil Jurisdiction issued 204 Writs of Summons, Litigation, and tried 20 Causes in 1874, there being increases of 22 and 1 respectively as compared pp. 147—148. with 1873.

Probates and Letters of Administration were granted in 1874 to the number of 133, Probates, &c. the value of the property being sworn under £255,323. In 1873 the number was only p. 149. 85, and the amount only £111,688.

Sixteen petitions in Bankruptcy were presented in 1874, against 7 in the previous Bankruptcies, year; and 25 petitions for liquidation by arrangement, against 7 in 1873.

This great increase, as is well known, was caused by the failure of a large firm in Launceston, drawing in many smaller firms, and occasioning for the time a general disturbance of commercial credit. The petitions in Bankruptcy at Launceston and Hobart Town were as 11 to 5, and the petitions for liquidation as 20 to 5. The assets and liabilities are not given for Hobart Town, but at Launceston the former was only between one-seventh and one-eighth of the latter.

The Mortgages transferred were in both years 5; the amount in 1874 being £15,695, in 1873, £3550. Mortgages discharged, in 1874, 68; in 1873, 82; amount, in 1874, £21,180: in 1873, £32,618.

Bills of Sale, p. 150. The Bills of Sale were fewer, and for a smaller amount, than in 1873, the figures being—for 1874, 149, amount £46,092; for 1873, 151, and £59,752.

Deeds, &c. registered, ib.

There was an increase of 49 in the Memorials, &c. registered in the office of the Registrar of Deeds; and of 91 in the number of Grant Deeds enrolled in the Supreme Court.

Inquests, p. 151:

Inquests were held as to the cause of death in 1874 in 138 cases, 93 being males and 45 females, the aggregate number being 18 less than in 1873.

Police, pp. 151—152. The total Police Force in 1874 consisted of 21 Superintendents, 9 Chief and 9 Second Class District Constables, 26 Sub-Inspectors, 17 Sergeants, 160 Petty Constables, 27 Special Constables, and 3 Detectives, together 272. The total cost, as returned by the Inspector was—Territorial, £7956; Municipal, £20,797; together £28,752. The returns furnished by the Municipalities give £15,054 as the cost of their Police. I account for the discrepancy by supposing that they have in the latter sum returned the expenditure for Salaries alone. This was not my intention in drawing out the form: I desired to ascertain the whole cost of the Police Force. Even as regards salaries alone, however, there is a discrepancy of £2935 between the returns at pp. 132, 133, and 152, to which I should wish to direct the special attention of the Mayors and Wardens, in order that it may be rectified or explained next year.

VII.—EDUCATION.

Public Schools, p. 156. During the year 6 Schools seem to have been added to the number under the Board of Education. The number of distinct scholars on the rolls was 12,158, the average number on the rolls being 7970; the average daily attendance was 5867; the number entered during the year 4689; the number who left 2627. The teaching staff consisted of 107 male and 116 female teachers and assistant teachers, and 16 male and 23 female pupil teachers and paid monitors. On these numbers the increases were—distinct scholars on the rolls, 1355; average scholars on the rolls, 923; average daily attendance, 599; number entered, 838; teachers and assistant teachers, 10; pupil teachers and monitors, 7. It is to be presumed that these increases were the effect of a more stringent application of the compulsory clauses of the Public Schools Act. The increase in the number of new scholars was about 22 per cent.

The total amount granted for the Schools from the funds at the disposal of the Board was £12,865 16s. 8d., or £2 3s. 10d. for each scholar, calculated upon the average daily attendance: besides which £4933 5s. 5d. was contributed by the parents and friends of the children. The amount borne by the public was greater by £593 8s. 7d. than in 1873; but the average for each child was 3s. $10\frac{3}{4}d$. less.

Superior Education, p. 157. The expenditure of the Council of Education in connection with the Tasmanian Scholarships and the Degree of Associate of Arts was £960 5s. 10d., or £323 15s. 11d. more than in 1873. The amount expended for Exhibitions was £558 19s. 2d., or £3 6s. 5d. less.

Priendly Societies, p. 158. As regards Friendly Societies, the return for 1874 shows fewer members in consequence of one Lodge having omitted to state the number of its members. The receipts exhibit a slight increase, also the expenditure; but the capital was augmented by no more than £50. The number of societies which filed returns was 2 more than in the previous year; but in the absence of any penalty for neglect, the law is still in many cases set at defiance.

VIII.—VITAL STATISTICS.

Births, p. 160.

The number of Births of children registered in 1874 was 3097—the increase as regards the previous year being 49. The ratio of Births per 1000 of population at the end of the year was 29.73.

Of the children born, 1601 were males, and 1496 females; the proportion of boys to girls being as 107.02 to 100. This is in excess of the average proportion, which is rather over 104 to 100. Since 1865 the preponderance of births of males in 1874 has

been exceeded in two years only—1870 and 1871—when it was 112.23 and 107.97 respectively. These high ratios are somewhat remarkable, since I find that in Victoria, from 1864 to 1873, the excess never rose above 6.45 per 100; in Scotland, from 1855 to 1870, never above 6.6 per 100; in England, from 1861 to 1870, never above 4.7 per 100.

The registered Births exceeded the registered Deaths by 1407. Including the one death unregistered, the deaths were 54.57 per cent. of the births.

The Deaths registered in 1874 numbered 1689; and one, unregistered, occurred at Deaths, Port Arthur. The rate of mortality was 16.22 in every thousand persons living at the Pp. 161—168. end of the year. With the exception of 1868, when it was 1661, the death-rate has not been so high during the last nine years. The deaths of males was 1022; of females, 667. The mortality of males in 1874 was 18.54 per 1000; of females, 13.59. The proportion of males to females was therefore as 136.38 to 100. In 1873 it was only as 130.17 to 100. That is, out of every 100 persons who died in 1874, 60.51 were males, and only 39.49 females; and of those who died in 1873, 59.57 were males and 40.43 females. In 1872 the proportions were 59.03 and 40.97 respectively. From this it appears that the mortality of males in 1874 was exceptionally high.

I will mention only two circumstances in connection with the foregoing figures, namely:-That the proportion of deaths of children under 10 years of age formed no more than 32.34 per cent. of the deaths at all ages; and that the deaths of old people from 60 upwards were 32.22 per cent. I find that in Victoria, in 1873, the proportion of children cut off by disease before completing their tenth year was 47.89 per cent.; while that of persons from 55 upwards (the difference of 5 years in classification giving Victoria protanto an excess), was only 15.52 per cent. As regards children, the inference is plain—that the smaller proportion of deaths is due to the greater healthiness of the climate of Tasmania; indeed its superiority in this respect is so marked that the subject is well worth dwelling upon a little more at length.

The most important criterion of infant mortality is considered to be the ratio of deaths of infants under one year old to the births in any given year. The per-centage of such deaths in the Australian Colonies for the five years, 1869-73, was-In Tasmania, 9.45; in N.S. Wales, 9.57; in Queensland, 11.07; in Victoria, 11.86; and in South Australia, 14.24. From the report of the Registrar-General of England for 1870 it appears that in that year 16 deaths of infants to every 100 births occurred, and 15.6 in 1869. The per-centage ranged from 15 in one large town to nearly 26 in another. In Scotland, in 1870, it appears to have been 12.28.

Other ways of ascertaining the relative mortality are (1.) by comparing the deaths at a given age with the total number of deaths at all ages; and (2.) by calculating the ratio which they bear to each 1000 of the general population. The subjoined tables show the proportion of deaths of children up to 5 years, and between 5 and 10. The first method gives the following results:

In Tasmania no more than 20·25 per cent. of the total deaths were those of infants under one year; and only 6·83 were those of children between one and 5 years of age. The ratio of deaths of infants under one year to 1000 persons at all ages living, was only 2·79; and between 0 (birth) and 5, it was no more than 3·87. In Victoria in 1873 the proportions to total deaths were—under 1 year, 27·66 per cent.; between 1 and 5 years, 14·98. The ratios to 1000 of all ages living were—under 1 year, 4·02; between 0 and 5 years, 6·20. In Scotland, in 1870, the per-centage of deaths was—for children under 1 year, 19·10; between 1 and 5 years, 16·84: the ratio to population—under 1 year, 4·22 per 1000; between 0 and 5 years, 7·93 per 1000.

A third method is to compare the deaths to 1000 persons at each age living. Taking the numbers, as found by the Census of 1870, as the basis of the calculation, the deaths were—

I have not leisure to make the tedious calculations necessary before we can contrast each of these ratios with the corresponding figures for the Australian Colonies: but from sources already available I find that in Victoria, on an average of 10 years, the ratio per 1000 for children under 5 years was, for males 55 08, for females, 49 66 (the mean, which is not very far from the true rate for both, being 52 37); and in England and Wales, on an average of 30 years, it was 72 42 and 62 46 for males and females, respectively (mean 67 44); while our rate, for both sexes, was only 26 78. Between 5 and 10 years, the rate was—In Tasmania, 2 57; in Victoria, from 6 95 for females to 7 52 for males (mean, 7 23); in England and Wales, from 8 67 for females to 8 79 for males (mean 8 73). In Scotland the ratios* were in 1870:—

This means, that in every 1000 infants under one year old in Scotland, about 44 who now die, would at least survive the most dangerous period of life, with proportionally favourable chances of attaining maturity, if they were born under the more happy skies of Tasmania; between 1 and 2, the saving of life would be about 47 per 1000; between 2 and 5, about 52; between birth and 5, about 32; and between 5 and 10, about 7.

During 1874, 98 persons of 80 years and upwards died; 18 being between 90 and 100; and 1 over 100. At the date of the last Census in 1870 the number at 80 and upwards was returned at 360; and as there has probably not been any great change in it since, the mortality per 1000 living at this age would be about 270.

There was a serious increase in the Miasmatic order of diseases in 1874, the number having been 198 in 1873, and 292 in the following year—the excess being 94, or nearly 48 per cent. Scarlatina, diphtheria, quinsy, croup, whooping-cough, fevers, erysipelas, metria, and diarrhœa were more prevalent and fatal. Local diseases also caused more deaths; developmental diseases of children had 3 more; old age 16 more; atrophy and

debility 3 more; while enthetic, dietic, and parasitic diseases in the zymotic class, constitutional diseases, and developmental diseases of adults had fewer. Violent deaths were Suicides were the same in number, namely, 6 in both years. For the 5 years, 1869-73, the average number of suicides was 5.70 to every 100,000 persons. In Victoria, for the ten years 1864-73, the average was 11.03 per 100,000.

The proportion of deaths in each class in 1874 to 100 deaths from specified causes, as compared with the proportions in Victoria and England to all causes, was as

In this comparison there are two things which operate against Tasmania-the unusual mortality of 1874, and the fact that the proportion is calculated on the specified* deaths only, making it larger than if the total number were taken. Still the Zymotic and Constitutional diseases show a considerably lower ratio than in the other countries. The excess of Developmental Diseases is caused by the deaths of old people, which were 12.49 per cent. of the deaths from specified causes. The proportion of deaths from old age to those from all causes in Victoria for the 5 years, 1864-8, was 1.04 per cent.; for the next 5, (1869-73), 1.89 per cent.; and for the year 1873, 2.12, showing a rapid increase: in New South Wales, the oldest Colony, for the two corresponding quinquenniads, it was 3.62 and 5.50 respectively; and for 1873, 6.42. At the date of the last Census, the proportion of persons of 60 years and upwards in Tasmania was 6.64 per cent.; in Victoria, 2.75; in New South Wales, 4.18. The higher mortality of old people is therefore attributable to the presence of a much larger proportion of persons of advanced age. The per-centage of deaths registered as from "old age" in this Colony for 1868 and following years was,-

giving a yearly average of 9.88 per cent.

The number of Marriages contracted in 1874 was 712, against 659 in 1873, being Marriages, 53 in excess. By Deputy Registrars 3 were performed in 1874, none in 1873. There pp. 168—169. was a decrease of 5 on the Church of England marriages, and 11 on the Church of Scotland; an increase of 22 on the Independent, 15 on the Primitive Methodist, 11 on the Roman Catholic, 8 on the Free Church of Scotland, 6 on the Wesleyan, and smaller increases on marriages among other denominations. The Baptists had one marriage in each of the two years.

The marriage rate in 1874 was 6.83 per 1000; in 1873, 6.32; and in 1872, 6.14. The proportion of Births to each Marriage was—in 1874, 4.35; in 1873, 4.62; in 1872, 4.77; in 1871, 5.11; in 1870, 4.56; in 1869, 4.39; in 1868, 4.57; in 1867, 4.98; in 1866, 4.91; and in 1865, 5.19. The mean of the earlier five years was 4.81, and of the later five, 4.68. Thus the tendency was, on the whole, though with some inequalities, a downward one from 1865 to 1870; and from 1870 to 1874 the descent was uninterrupted.

The ratio of Births and Marriages to 1000 of the population for those years is shown in the subjoined table, so that it may be read in connection with the preceding figures :-

In the first quinquenniad the mean Birth-rate was 29.94; in the second, 29.71; while the Marriage-rate for the same periods respectively was 6.23 and 6.36. The Marriage-rate increased from 1866 to 1870, when it suddenly fell, and again from 1871 to 1874, in which year it attained the maximum of the decad.

Diseases in In the General Hospitals at Hobart Town and Launceston, the Hospital at Camp-Hospitals,&c., bell Town, and the Queen's Asylum, 1521 cases of disease were treated, the number of pp. 172-8. deaths being 166 or 10:01 nor cont. In the General Hospitals at Hobart Town and Launceston, the Hospital at Camp-deaths, being 166 or 10:01 nor cont. In the General Hospitals at Hobart Town and Launceston, the Hospital at Camp-deaths, and the Queen's Asylum, 1521 cases of disease were treated, the number of deaths being 166 or 10:01 nor cont. deaths being 166, or 10.91 per cent. In the Queen's Asylum there were 78 cases treated, with only one death. Excluding these cases, the mortality in the Hospitals alone was 11.43 per cent. In the Hospital for Insane it was only 7.97 per cent.

> In the Penal Establishments, taken together, with an average daily number of adults of 310, an average age of each inmate of 46.33 years, the number of cases of sickness treated was 745, and of deaths 18, or 2.41 per cent. Among the children in the Reformatory and infants in the prison with their mothers, there were 16 cases of sickness, but no death. In the next class,—that of Paupers,—we find that 808 adults, of the average age of 58.79 years, furnished 13.75 cases for treatment, and had 117 deaths, which were therefore in the proportion of 8.51 per cent. The children (including the Queen's Asylum) 271 whose approach as a second of sides and the prison of the second of sides and the second of sid the Queen's Asylum), 271, whose average age was $6\frac{1}{2}$ years, had 99 cases of sickness, and 4 deaths, giving a per-centage of 4.04. The sickness and mortality among the insane and idiots were as follows:—Adults—Average number, 343; average age, $58\frac{1}{2}$; number of cases, 379; deaths, 35, or 9.23 per cent.: Children—Average number, 10; average age, 13; cases, 16; death, 1, or 6.25 per cent. Calculated on the average daily numbers, the mortality per cent. for each class was—Criminals, 5.81; Paupers, adults, 14.48—children, 1.48; Insane, adults, 10.20—children, 10.00.

Vaccinations.

There were no Vaccinations performed during the year at any institution maintained or assisted by the Government.

Meteorology, p. 174.

Coming now to the Meteorology of the year, as shown by the observations taken at Hobart Town, and comparing the results with those of the 30 years' tables, we find that the mean height of the barometer was 29.894, or 0.44 greater; mean temperature, 57.52, or 2.80 higher; mean diurnal range, 20.73, or 2.82 in excess; solar intensity, 91.54, or 1.85 less; terrestrial radiation, 39.72, or 3.29 less; dew point, 46.7, or 1.2 higher; humidity of air, 0.69, or 0.06 less; elastic force of vapour, 0.316, (equal); rain-fall, 24.09 inches, or 1.38 more; number of days on which rain fell, 138, or 2 less; ozone, 5.82, or 1.42 less; wind-force, monthly mean, 80.55 lbs. per square inch, or 22.18 lbs. in excess. The prevailing wind was, as usual, the north-west in ten months of the year, and the south-east in the remaining two; but the latter, instead of taking the second place during six months, as it generally does, gave way to strong south-west gales in October and November.

IX.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Political Franchise pp. 177, 178.

The last subject to which I have to advert is that of the Political Franchise. And first, as to the Legislative Council. Before the last revision, in January and February, 1875, there were 2819 names on the Electoral Rolls. At the revision, 94 Electors were found to have died, and 134 names were struck off on other grounds, and 227 were added; leaving 2818, or 10 less than in the preceding year. As regards the Rolls for the House of Assembly, 255 Electors were found to have died, and 1867 to be discretified by the state of the second qualified by other causes, and 2101 names were added; leaving 13,996 on the Rolls for Ī875.

The foregoing facts and figures indicate that the improvement in the state of the Colony, which commenced in 1872, continued to operate in 1874; and many of the words with which I closed my report for 1873 are equally applicable to the past year. The most unfavourable circumstance disclosed by the Statistics for 1874 is the withdrawal of population and capital, due to the greater attractions offered by the other Colonies in the way of higher wages and interest of money. Tasmania in regard to her insular position, her geographical features, and the limited extent of her territory, is placed at a disadvantage as compared with her competitors; but, with ordinary energy, her superiority in some other respects ought to secure for her a fair measure of permanent prosperity.

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

A drawback of the Duty paid is allowed on exportation of wine, tea, sugar, coffee, cocoa, chicory, currants, raisins, dates, rice, hops, malt liquors, candles, wax and composition, ginger, pepper, sago, soda crystals, sulphur, white lead, sheet lead, Barcelona nuts, mustard, manufactures of silk, cotton, linen, and wool, and all articles manufactured therefrom; drapery, haberdashery, hosiery, millinery, furs, hats, boots, shoes, wool-bags, and cornsacks, being in the original packages in which the same were imported.

On hats and caps manufactured in Colony from felt, silk, or any other material, exported in quantities of not less than

ten dozen, four shillings per dozen.

On malt made from imported barley, on proof of payment of import duty on such barley, sixpence per 100 los.

On jam manufactured in the Colony within one year of exportation, and packed in jars or tins, exported in quantities of

On jain maintactured in the Colony within one year of exportation, and packed in jars of this, exported in quantities of not less than one ton, £2 10s. per ton.

On carriages, pianofortes, and other musical instruments, sewing machines, and silver plate, imported by visitors for their own use, if the reshipment of such articles (except silver plate) has been made within six months of import, the full amount of duty paid.

No drawback unless duty amounts on each article to £5, and goods are shipped within three years from date of import,

or malt liquors within one year of such date.

APPENDIX A.

REPORTS ON GOLD AND TIN.

FINGAL GOLD FIELDS.

Commissioner's Office, Mathinna, 16th January, 1875.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward the Return relative to Gold Mining operations at the Fingal Gold Fields during the year 1874; and, as usual, I accompany the Table with some remarks upon the state of the Gold Mining industry in the district during the year to which the figures refer.

Population.

A slight decrease has taken place during the year 1874 on the Mathinna or Black Boy Gold Field, to which these remarks exclusively refer. This decrease almost exactly balances the increase in the latter half of the year 1873, as the following figures show:-

A portion of the decrease may be ascribed to the fact that considerable attention was directed to the Nine Mile Springs Gold Field by the report of rich discoveries in the early part of the year, and many persons within my own knowledge quitted Mathinna for Nine Mile Springs. The average number of men employed in Gold Mining at Mathinna during 1874 I estimate at 120, of whom, on the average, some 40 were alluvial miners, and 80 quartz miners. The number of alluvial miners was increased towards the end of the year in consequence of the cessation of work on the Derby Reef, which threw several men out of amplement and also lessened the number employed in quartz mining. out of employment and also lessened the number employed in quartz-mining.

The remainder of the men on the diggings were employed in the stores and public-houses, and as wood-cutters, carters, &c. The health and conduct of the people have been good, and there have been few accidents among the mining community.

Alluvial Mining.

Alluvial mining has been rather more active during the past year than during its predecessor, especially at the beginning and the end of the year. Ground which has been several times turned over is still being worked with varying success, but no new ground has been opened. The total estimated yield for the year is 500 ounces, valued at £1975. This would give under ten shillings a-week per man for those employed had forty men been constantly working during the whole year, but the number has been sometimes less than twenty for weeks together, and it is very difficult to get at the number regularly employed, or at their earnings, for statistical purposes. No effort has been made to open the South Esk deep-lead during the year.

The figures show a falling-off of nearly one-half in the quantity of quartz crushed as compared with The figures show a falling-off of nearly one-half in the quantity of quartz crushed as compared with 1873. This is principally owing to the stoppage of the Derby Company, which only crushed 301 tons in 1874 as compared with 2116 tons crushed in 1873. The City of Hobart Company still heads the list, having crushed about twice as much stone as all the other companies combined. The number of men employed in quartz-mining was much less at the close than at the opening of the year. The suspension of work by the Derby Company very much lessened the numbers employed in quartz-mining, and gave a great blow to the progress of the Gold Field. The City of Hobart is now the only company employing any considerable number of men on wages, and the absence of permanency in the earnings of many of the residents must seriously affect these process in the place. residents must seriously affect those persons in business in the place.

No fresh discoveries of reefs have been made during the year; and I fear that, unless some unforeseen circumstances occur shortly to give an impetus to mining at Mathinna, the current year 1875 will not compare favourably with its predecessors as far as gold-mining is concerned. The Commissioner of the district having been also put in charge of the George Town district during the year is no longer permanently resident at Mathinna; and as there is now no Mining Registrar or Resident Mining Surveyor, the statistics are more difficult than ever to obtain, and the revenue and general interests of the public and the government have necessarily suffered. the government have necessarily suffered.

GEORGE TOWN GOLD FIELDS.

Commissioner's Office, George Town, 9th March, 1875.

SIR,
I HAVE the honor to forward the Return relative to Gold Mining operations at the George Town Gold Fields during the year 1874.

Owing to many adverse circumstances, I have been unable to forward this Return at as early a date as I could have wished, and even now it is not so exact as I should have liked to make it.

So many changes have occurred in the personnel of those connected with mining, that it has been very difficult to obtain reliable information.

I only took charge of the district in the month of May, 1874, and having still the charge of the Fingal District, I have been compelled to divide my time between the two; and though this would have been of little moment had there been a Resident Mining Registrar at the centre of mining operations in each district, yet under existing arrangements it is difficult to transact the public business in a satisfactory manner with reference to statistics or any other matters.

The Commissioner for this district has been changed; the Mining Registrar, who holds several other offices, is only able to devote a portion of his time to his mining duties, and is now at King's Island; the Mining Surveyor is non-resident; the District Constable in charge has been changed; the Amalgamator and Battery Manager, and nearly every Legal Manager and Mining Manager connected with the Gold Field have made way for successors during the past year. Under these circumstances it is very difficult to prepare reliable statistics.

Population.

At the commencement of the year there were very few persons at the Nine Mile Springs and Back Creek, but the excellent results obtained during the first quarter of the year from the claim subsequently known as the Golden Point, then worked by a few quartz miners on the co-operative system, attracted the attention of Launceston speculators, and several companies were formed, which employed a large amount of labour. The European population on 30th June, 1874, numbered 241, who were thus divided—

There were also 52 Chinese miners, bringing up the total to 293. From this date the population decreased, and in September, when the commercial crisis in Launceston caused work to be suspended on several claims, the numbers were-

The decline continued until the end of the year, when the total population at the Springs only reached 151, of whom 79 were men, and 72 were women and children. At the date of writing, the numbers are about the same, there being 83 men and 72 women and children at and near the Springs, making a total of 155. In this number are included 29 Chinese, all adult males.

The population at the Back Creek Diggings numbers 24, of whom 14 are men, and 10 women and children. At the Leura mine, which is on private property, and therefore not under my jurisdiction, there is a population of 35, of whom 18 are men, and 17 women and children.

There are five Chinese in the number of men at Back Creek, making the total number 34 on the George Town Gold Fields. At the busiest time of the year there were about 100 men employed in quartz mining, and alluvial mining was then neglected, but as quartz mining decreased a number of men turned their attention for a time to working the alluvial ground. There is no Public School or Christian Church at the Springs, the only place of worship being the Chinese Josshouse, but the Church of England clergyman from George Town has held occasional services during the year at the Commissioner's Office and at the Assembly Room at the Springs.

The health of the population has been good, and there have been no fatal accidents during the year.

Alluvial Mining.

With the exception of a few Chinese, the miners have neglected alluvial digging except when they have been from time to time unable to obtain employment in reefing, and the Chinese will never state their real earnings. As an instance of the difficulty of obtaining returns I may state that the Resident District Constable, who makes weekly returns of gold obtained, and who obtains his information from the miners themselves, reports 40 ounces 19 pennyweights as the quantity of alluvial gold obtained from 26th September to 31st December, 1874, whilst the Commercial Bank at Launceston is reported by the cashier to have purchased upwards of 130 ounces of gold from the alluvial miners at Nine Mile Springs during the same period. I estimate the yield of alluvial gold for the last year from Nine Mile Springs and Back Creek at 350 ounces at least, valued at £1400. All this has been obtained from ground that had previously been partially worked; for although there were one or two rumours of discoveries, no extent of new alluvial ground was worked during the past year.

Quartz Mining.

The extraordinary richness of the Golden Point Claim attracted public attention early in the year; but, as is too frequently the case, the command of the mining market was obtained by unprincipled speculators, whose object was to enrich themselves as rapidly as possible at the expense of the public; and the feverish excitement in the early part of the year resulted in a speedy and ruinous collapse of the mining interest. The "commercial crisis" of September last in Launceston doubtless hastened the crash at the Nine Mile Springs; but this may be looked upon as so much the better for the few honest investors concerned, whose loss would only have been greater the longer the finale had been postponed.

Had companies been formed with sufficient bonâ fide capital, with no paid up shares, and with regulations absolutely prohibiting the sale or transfer of scrip at more or less than the paid up value for say twelve months; and had dividends been prohibited during the same period, and the works put in the charge of competent men, I believe investors would have, at the end of a year or so, received a fair return for their outlay. When, however, we find a claim like the Golden Point in the hands of the Sheriff a few months after its proprietors have commenced operations, although between five and six thousand pounds worth of gold have been obtained from quartz that could be raised and crushed in a month or six weeks at the outside, we have proof positive of the existence of a very rotten state of affairs.

* *

The sooner the principle obtains recognition that "Honesty is the best policy" in mining, as in other matters, the better will it be for Tasmania.

The Native Youth Claim is still being worked with good results, a recent crushing having given between two and three ounces to the ton; but the proprietors of the claim, since the reorganization of the Company, have wisely abstained from declaring a dividend, and have preferred to improve their machinery and to develope their mine.

The Industry Claim is being worked, and machinery is being erected by the proprietors. The claim gives promise of good results, but no crushings have taken place at present.

A Company has been formed to work auriferous quartz on the Leura Estate at Piper's River, some twelve miles from the Springs. The estate is the property of Mr. William Ritchie, of Launceston, who is a large shareholder in the new company. A fifteen head battery has been erected, to be worked by water power; but I do not think those concerned have exercised a wise economy in fitting a breastwheel where an overshot wheel could have been erected at a small additional expense. Too much power is a fault more easily rectified than too little. I trust, however, that the enterprise of the persons concerned will be crowned with success. The works give employment to some 18 men, whose wives and children make up a total population of 35. Many of the workmen are shareholders in the company. The quartz is admittedly poor, but it is anticipated that the quantity available for crushing, and the cheap rate at which the stone can be reduced by water power, will enable the ground to be worked at a profit.

The Den Diggings have been deserted during the year.

Nothing has been done at Back Creek beyond a little alluvial fossicking by Chinese, and a small amount of quartz prospecting by Europeans.

At the Denison Diggings four or five men have been occasionally at work, and some good rough alluvial gold has been obtained, six pieces of which, weighing 1 oz. 4 dwts., were shown to me. One piece weighed 9 dwts. and another 8 dwts.

Waterhouse has been deserted except by one or two prospectors, who have made no fresh discoveries.

TIN.

Police Office, Wynyard, 20th March, 1875.

SIR.

In accordance with your request I have the honor to furnish you with a short report on the Tin Mining operations at Mount Bischoff to the 31st December last. It must be understood that the quantities, &c. are most of them merely approximate, although I have endeavoured to obtain as accurate information as possible. Before proceeding to details I may state that Mount Bischoff is within this Police District, and lies about 29½ miles a little to the west of south of Table Cape, that the present road available for traffic is to Emu Bay, a distance of about 45 miles, and which passes through the lands of the Van Diemen's Land Company nearly the whole of that distance. The survey of a tramway along that route has just been completed from Burnie to the extreme boundary of the Van Diemen's Land Company's property, 41½ miles, at the expense of that Company, and it is expected that the work of laying the tramway will be commenced by the 1st May next. A nearer route has been discovered between Mount Bischoff and Wynyard, which is estimated at only 38 or 40 miles, and which a party of men is now opening 10 feet wide at the expense of the Government; about 16 miles of the track, formerly opened to the Hellyer Gold Field, being utilised. The route in question passes through crown land nearly the whole distance, some of which is very good and well suited for agricultural purposes, whilst other portions of it consist of open grass land. Fine belts of splitting timber are also passed through; plenty of fine stone for macadamising purposes is available along the track.

About £2000 has been expended upon the present line of road to Emu Bay, which sum has been contributed chiefly by the Mount Bischoff Tin Mining Company, Messrs. Walker and Beecraft, Messrs. Cummings, Henry, and Co., and the Waratah Company, but through the great amount of traffic some parts are very heavy indeed, more particularly that portion near the mines.

Population.

The population is at present rather fluctuating, but I may quote the number of men employed on the various works as follows:—

In addition to this about 45 men were employed during a considerable portion of the year in repairing the present road to Emu Bay.

Metal raised.

The estimated area worked is about half an acre, from which the following quantities of tin ore have been obtained:—336 tons (including lode) from Mount Bischoff Company's section; 220 tons from Messrs. Walker & Beecraft's section; the holders of no other section having yet commenced to raise the ore. The total yield has therefore been 556 tons, which may be valued on the ground at £40 per ton, making a total value of £22,240. Of the above quantity 125 tons have been shipped to England, and 5 tons to Sydney. The area worked altogether is about an acre.

Tramways.

A tramway from the boundary of Messrs. Walker and Beecraft's section to the Waratah River, 1½ miles, which runs through the property of the Mount Bischoff Tin Mining Company and that of Messrs. Cummings, Henry, and Co., has been constructed at the joint expense of the three parties named at a cost of £1300. Another tramway is now on foot, which will connect the above-mentioned portion with the proposed line to Emu Bay, a distance of two miles and thirteen chains.

Buildings and Machinery.

The buildings at present on the various sections at Mount Bischoff may be estimated as follows:—Mount Bischoff Tin Mining Company, £600; Messrs. Walker and Beecraft, £500; Messrs. Cummings, Henry, and Co., £500; Waratah Tin Mining Company, £300; and the various machinery at £600. Preparation is at present being made for the erection of buildings and machinery for sluicing and crushing operations at the Waratah Falls, which will cost at least £2500. Smelting works are also in course of erection in Launceston, when the ore will be smelted and shipped to England in ingots.

Wages.

The wages of the Mining Managers run from £250 to £300 per annum, while the average wages for workmen at the mines may be quoted at 30s. per week with rations.

Carting.

From 40 to 50 teams (including horse and bullock teams) are employed on the road in carting the ore to Emu Bay. Upon an average from 16 to 18 cwt. is brought down by each team; but as the summer advances from 22 to 23 cwt. will be the average load. The bad state of the road necessitates very high rates being given to the carters, which may be quoted at £9 per ton at present.

Mount Ramsay.

A party of men is now opening a road from Knole Plain to Mount Ramsay, with a view of working the Bismuth lode which exists there. The lode is about a chain in width, and the average yield of Bismuth is 7 per cent. The present value of Bismuth in England is about 21s. per lb.

Hampshire Hills.

Tin of excellent quality is found in payable quantities near Hampshire Hills, about $4\frac{1}{3}$ miles from the old Van Diemen's Land Company's station, and about a mile from the River Blythe. Several sections are applied for. A party of four men obtained about 11 cwt. of fine stream tin from one of the sections in 10 days. Tin is to be found in nearly every creek in that locality, but in small quantities.

BOTHWELL.

There is also a decrease in the cattle. This is in consequence of a number having been sold and their places filled up by sheep, of which there is an increase over those of last year.

I have nothing further to report, there being no improvement in the District since last year.

In the Agricultural Returns there is but little variation from those of last year.

In wheat, oats, and pease there has been an increase in acreage and quantity. The mangel wurzel crops have been very poor, owing to the drought in the latter part of the summer and autumn. The quantity of apples has been small, but the pear crop very abundant: both have suffered severely from the grub.

There have been no new productions; and improvements in the mode of cultivation, rotation of crops, fallowing, use of manures and machinery are little thought of in a pastoral district like Campbell Town.

In the Stock Returns the number of horses and cattle have slightly decreased. The number of sheep has increased by nearly 1000; that of pigs slightly decreased.

In spite of the vigorous efforts made by the Rabbit Trusts, there appears to be but a small diminution of these pests, and some of the landholders are incurring an enormous expense in fencing them out by a paling close fence surrounding the most valuable portions of their properties.

The improvements in sheep-breeding are continued to be energetically carried out by a few gentlemen, who have been amply rewarded by the high prices obtained for them in the neighbouring Colonies.

CLARENCE.

THE only difference I have observed this year, as compared with last year, is a falling off in the acreage of wheat and barley, and the produce. This is accounted for, inasmuch as the amount of labour necessary for the preparation of land for these kinds of grain is greater than any other, and the prices realised are inconsiderable when compared to other agricultural produce; and were it not for the machinery used in cutting the hay (although the price obtained per ton this year is greatly above the average) this produce would barely pay the cost of cultivation.

DELORAINE.

You will observe that the average yield of grain, &c. during the past year is higher than that of late years. I do not, however, think that it can be attributed to any improved method of cultivation, but rather to the late favourable season.

I have nothing new to report with regard to agriculture in this district.

EVANDALE.

I AM glad to say the general crops have been much better this than last year as regards quantity, but the prices are not remunerative at present.

Machinery appears to be on the increase in the district, but I see very little improvement in any other shape.

FINGAL.

THESE Returns would have been forwarded earlier, but the steam thrashing machine which annually visits this district was some weeks later than usual; the result, however, is more correct than if the yield of Wheat, Oats, &c. had been only estimated; the returns from the larger growers are the actual produce, which is in all cases more than was estimated.

You will find the Returns generally show a decrease compared with those of the previous year; the exception being that of Hay, of which 149 acres and 347 tons more were grown this year than last. There is also a small increase in Cheese. In Stock the only increase over last year is in sheep; viz., 5228 more than at same time in 1874.

The past season has been in some respects an extraordinary one; for six months we had hardly a shower of rain, and the Potatoes suffered in consequence, which will account for the deficiency in that crop, and but for this circumstance both Butter and Cheese would have shown a considerable increase over present figures.

As mentioned on former occasions, some of the Returns would appear in error in consequence of the small quantity produced compared with the acreage, but the figures are correct, the Crops having failed or been destroyed.

There is nothing in the present aspect of Agriculture in this district to call for particular remark.

FRANKLIN.

THERE is a talling off in the quantity of Apples as compared with last year, owing to the blight; otherwise there is no great difference in the gross produce.

I have collected the Returns in the usual manner, as I found the schedules do not answer.

GEORGE TOWN.

COMPARED with last year there is a considerable decrease in the total amount of acreage under cultivation. This, I think, can be accounted for in a great measure through the Iron Mining Companies on the west bank of the Tamar having resumed operations on an extensive scale, the wages offered being a sufficient inducement to small farmers to work at the mines in preference to cultivating their land. As the principal part of the land in this district is not well adapted for agricultural purposes, small landholders, as a rule, follow any other occupation that offers.

You will observe that there is an increase in the Live Stock Return of 5553 Sheep and 804 head of horned Cattle as compared with last year's Statistics.

GLAMORGAN.

I HAVE the honor to forward the Return of Machinery for Glamorgan, and also to fill in the queries in reference to the Agricultural Return. You will see that in every case the crop failed, excepting one, and that was cut green.

Replying to your headings for a Report,-

- No. 1.—Hops seem to be the only new production advancing with much success, and this is confined to one enterprising individual, who uses manures (both bone and guano) freely, and succeeds in obtaining a fair return; the climate and soil of the Coast appearing to be favourable.
 - No. 2.—I do not think much improvement has taken place.
 - No. 3.—Is not much attended to.
- No. 4.—Several double-furrow ploughs have been lately imported and worked successfully. The reaper and mower combined is thought a great deal of.
- No. 5.—Attention is paid to improving the breed of sheep, and many importations from the Messrs. Taylor and Gibson's flocks have taken place with that view.
- No. 6.—The agricultural land in Glamorgan being limited, more attention is paid to depasturing stock than anything else, and consequently less labour is employed than formerly.

The trade in bark (wattle) has largely increased, and if some method was adopted to ascertain the number of tons sent to Hobart Town, it would be found that a large sum of money came to the district through this channel.

GREEN PONDS.

Wheat, Oats, and Barley together show a decrease of 337 acres as compared with the year 1873-74, but there is an increase of 774 bushels in the total yield, which would have been more but for damage by rabbits in some parts of the district.

Grain and Hay have been the principal crops during the past year; root crops occupy a very small area—228½ acres out of nearly 4000. Rotation of crops is not known here.

Drainage receives no attention from the farmers in this district.

There are five Mowing and Reaping Machines in this Municipality, yet not an acre of grain or hay has been cut by them during the last harvest; the reason assigned for their non-use is that it is difficult to get competent men to work them, and also that with the labour farmers have now, (principally boys and old men), they are not able to prepare the land properly for their use.

One landowner here has entered upon the breeding of thoroughbred horses, which he intends to carry out on an extensive scale.

Cultivation is gradually growing less in this district, nearly 1500 acres of English grass land has been thrown into "other cultivated land," and over 500 acres of "other cultivated land" has become bush land during the past year.

Some of the causes which keep down Agriculture are the high price of Wool and Sheep, which induces the large landholders to make sheep-runs of their properties instead of either cultivating themselves or letting to tenants, and the destruction to crops and pasture lands by rabbits, which together have thrown a large area (nearly 3500 acres) out of cultivation in this district during the past two years.

HAMILTON.

I HAVE the honor to report for your information in reference to the following queries mentioned in your Memorandum of Instructions relative to the collection of the Statistics of this District; viz:—

(1.) New Productions.—None. (2.) Improvements in Cultivation, &c.—Improvement on previous year. (3.) Drainage under ground, &c.—None. (4.) Machinery and Implements, &c.—Improvement on previous year. (5.) Improvement in Breed of Stock, &c.—Improvement on previous year.

A marked improvement in sheep and cattle in this District, which look very healthy, &c., and the former have had a greater per centage of increase and a heavier clip of wool than in previous years.

This is a large pastoral District, a small area of which is under cultivation. The nature of the improvements in cultivation for the past year in this District was that the farmers had adopted fallowing of the land previous to putting in grain crops more generally than they did in previous years.

HORTON.

General Remarks on the Condition of the District of Horton during the past year.

1st. The people have been better off and money has been more plentiful than for years past. This has been owing to the development of the Tin Mines at Mount Bischoff. Many of the farmers, or their sons, (as well as labourers proper,) have gone up to the Mines for a few weeks at a time to earn some money and then return. For some months men were passing to and fro constantly on the road between this and Emu Bay, or by steamer, few staying there long at a time.

2nd. From the same cause labour has been scarce.

3rd. The spring and early summer were abundantly moist, but for the last two months it has been drier than it has ever been before within the memory of the inhabitants, and both feed and water were becoming scarce. Rain, however, has fallen at last sufficient to start the feed, but not to renew the wells and waterholes.

4th. "Flat-grass," a species of Dandelion, is becoming a great nuisance, spreading from farm to farm and beating out all other growth. It is not bad feed in itself so long as it lasts, but that is but for a short time.

5th. The Californian Thistle has been thoroughly established for several years in the Township, where it continues to spread gradually through the streets and gardens; no serious attempt having ever been made either by the Road Trust or anybody else to arrest its spread. Fortunately it has not yet extended beyond the Township, so far as I am aware. The mere cutting down of these thistles (as by the Act required) is no earthly use; they spread from the root, hardly if at all from the seed.

6th. There have been no improvements of any kind. The quantity of heavy timber is discouraging to the intending improver, and the farmers generally are poor.

7th. The caterpillars have done about the usual amount of damage; more in some places, less in others. At the Montagu, one of the most fertile spots in the Island, combining a rich easily worked soil and a moist climate, and admirably suited for grass, the grass is liable to be completely destroyed by grubs and caterpillars, the latter seldom giving it a chance to go to seed.

- 8th. There seems to have been less rust than usual, and the crops generally have been good.
- 9th. The Rotation of Crops mentioned in the Return (25 acres) is as follows:—1, grass; 2, potatoes; 3, pease; 4, grain (wheat); 5, grain (oats); but it is varied a little occasionally according to circumstances.
- 10th. The three-quarter acre of "all other cultivated ground" represents the three-quarter acre of rye mentioned at the end of the return.
- 11th. Flax, when grown at all in this District, is grown in very small patches, and then almost always for the seed (linseed). When it was grown for flax as flax the scutching alone cost as much as the product was worth, setting aside all the cost of cultivation; this was owing to want of knowledge and skill, I believe. One person has grown it as flax this year—with financial result not yet known. Where the yield is given in the Return as flax, it has been grown for flax only; where it is given as linseed, it has been grown for linseed only.
- 12th. The delay in sending in the Returns has been caused by the difficulty of getting in the subreturns from distant localities, from Emu Bay, and from the Islands (Robins'). After receiving such Returns I have to go over them carefully to check them, and always find in them matter requiring explanation or amendment, which involves further correspondence and delay.
- 13th. A good many—farmers and others—have left or are leaving the District, while no fresh blood is coming in to supply their place.
 - 14th. Sheep in this District are never washed in warm water; always shorn in the grease.
- 15th. One reaping machine has been introduced at Table Cape and one additional one at Circular Head, but they are hardly used at all. A few oats have been cut with them, (where the ground happened to be pretty free from sticks), but only the 7 acres of wheat mentioned.
- 17th. Under the heading "Permanent Artificial Grasses," I have, as usual, entered all land once broken up that carries fair pasture, but not common bush land.

KINGBOROUGH.

Report on the state and prospects of Agricultural and Pastoral pursuits in the District of Kingborough for the year ending 31st March, 1875.

- 1st. The only new production has been the growth by one farmer of a small quantity of Flax.
- 2nd. There has been no improvement in the mode of cultivation. Rotation cropping is not practised, and there has been but little fallowing. Manuring has been principally confined to that made on the farms.
 - 3rd. There is no underground Drainage.
 - 4th. There has been no improved Machinery brought into use.
 - 5th. Increased attention is being paid by a few of the farmers to the breeding of Cattle.
 - 6th. Dairy Farming and small fruit growing occupy a large proportion of attention.

LAUNCESTON (SELBY).

In the acreage under Wheat and Pease there is a small decrease to that of last year, while in Oats, Barley, Turnips, and Artificial Grasses there is an increase. In Hay and Potatoes the acreage is about the same as last year, while the average return per acre is $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 bushels better than last year.

- In Permanent Grasses there is an increase, but a decrease in fallow and other land, owing to some of the latter being laid down in the former.
 - In Apples there is a great decrease, owing to the ravages of the grub.

In Hops there is an increase owing to the favourable season, also an increase in Horned Cattle, Sheep, and Pigs. The two acres of Carraway Seed in this year's return were grown in the Scotsdale portion of this District.

LONGFORD.

No new productions have been introduced, nor has any change taken place in the mode of cultivation, beyond the fact that Fallowing and the use of Manures, chiefly Guano, are extensively carried on in this District. No underground Drainage, by tiles or otherwise, has been performed during the year.

In Machinery and Farm Implements an increase in the employment of almost every kind of implement in use last season has taken place, and more in particular as regards Reaping Machines, 30 having been brought into use this season against 13 in my last year's return.

In reference to Live Stock great care and attention is still used by the principal breeders of Sheep, the improvement of which has now reached a very high standard.

In conclusion I desire to add that the acreage in cultivation, although larger this season than last, shows a much better average in Wheat, Oats, and Hay.

NEW NORFOLK.

THERE are no new productions to report. There is a slight improvement going on in the mode of cultivation, although the old system still predominates,—want of capital and intelligence being, I believe, the main reasons.

I know of only one instance of underground drainage in farming operations being adopted on a small scale. I cannot give the expense; but the ground can be successfully cultivated now, whereas previous to its being drained it could not be depended upon. The result, I am informed, is very satisfactory.

There is an increase in the use of subsoil ploughs. Nothing particular has occurred in the breeding of Live Stock or in the getting up of Wool.

The season has been a good one, the produce to the acreage being much more than in the preceding season, especially in Wheat, Hay, and Oats.

I am induced to believe that the cultivation of Hops in this District will not be materially extended, although the price expected this season will be very remunerative. Several causes will operate in that way; the two principal ones, I believe, are the difficulty of getting pickers just at the time when the crop is ready, and the dissatisfaction prevailing concerning the measurement, which in some grounds is said to be heavy. One uniform standard bushel measure ought to be introduced, and stamped, so that it would be seen by the pickers. There are many fine samples of Hops this season, but some grounds suffered severely by the spider.

In conclusion, I would respectfully suggest that some measure should be introduced to make compulsory the giving the information by producers of their Stock and Crop, the same as in the case of taking a Census of the Population. It is true there are only a few who refuse to give the information, but their example is being followed more every year, affecting the truthfulness of the Return. Some ignorant producers have a sort of faint belief, which is difficult to dispel, that the Return is in some way connected with taxation.

Hoping that the present Return will meet with your approval, I enclose my account.

OATLANDS.

I HAVE the honor to enclose herewith Stock and Crop Returns for the year ending 31st March, 1875, and which, to the best of my belief, you will find correct.

I have much pleasure in drawing your attention to the increase in the Agricultural produce generally, also the great increase in Sheep and Cattle.

Messrs. ———— returned last year 10,000 sheep, this year only 4000. Mr. ————— requested me to inform you that this year they have removed the principal part of their Sheep to the Great Lake District: thus the decrease in their returns.

There is a great improvement in the mode of cultivation. Farmers are taking more care of the manure than formerly, which accounts in a great measure for the better crops than usual in this District.

Draining is still increasing, and showing a great improvement to graziers and the farmers who have given it a trial.

I have much pleasure to report that the District is in a more prosperous condition than it has been for many years.

PORT SORELL.

I BEG to inform you that, from what I have been able to glean during the short time I have been in this district, I am glad to be able to state that the Agricultural interests, as also in regard to the Machinery employed, is steadily on the increase. More attention is now paid to fallowing land and improvement in grasses, as also to the raising of stock.

There are now two Agricultual shows held in this district each year,—one at Latrobe, and the other at the River Don,—which is likely to create more interest in all agricultural pursuits. You will perceive there is an increase of acreage under cultivation for the present year, and that the average yield has been much better than last year. There is a slight increase in Sheep and horned Cattle, and in the number of Horses (about 170).

Steam communication with Melbourne has been established for some time past, which is likely to benefit in all respects this district. I am sorry to say that, as regards under-ground drainage, it is entirely neglected in this district. Skilled labour remains difficult to procure, owing to the number of hands employed at Mount Bischoff and at the Ilfracombe Iron Mines; although it is with pleasure I am able to state that Ship-building is steadily on the increase, two vessels having recently been launched and three others on the stocks, one of which will be ready for launching by the end of May. In conclusion, in every respect I may state that the prosperity of the district is steadily on the increase.

RICHMOND.

I CANNOT say that any improvements have been made worthy of special mention. A considerable quantity of guano is now used in this district, with beneficial results. The withdrawal of a large portion of the agricultural labour to the Railway works has materially impeded the agriculturists in their operations; and the exodus of the sons of the soil to the neighbouring Colonies will have the effect of retarding the progress of agriculture for some years to come.

ROSS.

I can report no new productions or improvements in mode of cultivation, &c. There has not been so much land under cultivation this year as usual, in consequence, I believe, of the scarcity of labour; the district consists mainly of pastoral land. No works of drainage in addition to last year; no improved kinds of Machinery have been brought into use. The breed of live stock and getting-up wool remain the same; I am not aware of any alteration or improvement connected therewith. The large sheep-owners mostly adopt warm water washing before shearing.

SORELL.

THE difference in the quantity of Wheat and increase of Hay may be accounted for by the low price of the former and increase of the latter. The total land in cultivation has increased by 1779 acres, which fully accounts for the difference in the quantity of grain.

Apples have decreased 1771 bushels, which may be, I think, mainly accounted for by the dryness of the season.

SOUTH LONGFORD.

THERE is a considerable increase in the number of Sheep depastured in this district this year, as compared with the last return, which is partially in consequence of the disappearance of fluke and the continued high price of stock and wool.

The whole of the land in this district is situated at an altitude of from 3000 to 4000 feet above the level of the sea, and is therefore entirely devoted to depasturing purposes.

SPRING BAY.

In accordance with the 9th clause of instructions, I have the honor to report that in this Municipality there are no new productions to be noticed, or any improvements in cultivation. There has been a marked falling off this year in the crops (more especially potatoes) grown on land that has been manured with seaweed and kelp: in many instances localities where eight, ten, and even twelve tons per acre were no uncommon crops, this year they have produced only from one to three. Much of the wheat early in the season promised good returns, but a great quantity blighted off, only about two-thirds of the ears producing full-sized grains.

I only know of one case of wire-worm, and that was my own; this being the second year that every blade I attempted to grow was wholly taken by this pest, and on each occasion it has been on land that grew potatoes the preceding year.

There are no improvements going on with the exception of those on the property of Mr. Page, at the Eastern Marshes, where he has had several miles of draining done; and now has a number of men employed in draining the comparatively open marshes, many hundreds of acres in extent, with the intention of ultimately laying the land down in permanent grasses. There is a marked improvement in the appearance of the sheep throughout the district, attributable chiefly to the working of the Scab Act, the monthly harassing for dressing, dipping, &c., of the olden time now being at an end.

In the getting up of Wool there have been no great alterations, but there is evidently much more care bestowed on the washing and sorting of wool than formerly was the practice. There has also been an increased desire generally to obtain a better class of sheep by using the best rams procurable.

One thing worthy of note is the absence of any green forage in the Return, in consequence of the prolonged drought,—no one having sown any with the exception of perhaps one or two rods in a garden.

WESTBURY.

I have much pleasure in drawing your attention to the large increase in the yield of Cereals and Roots, Sheep and Cattle: and with few unimportant exceptions the yield is in excess of the previous year. The only regret is that the price of grain is so low at present, thereby causing a depression in the agricultural interests. Fortunately, of late, our farmers have taken to improve the breed of stock and to pastoral pursuits. Comparing last year's yield with the present, you can see at once the increase.

In agricultural implements there is a vast improvement; the double-furrow ploughs, reaping and mowing machines, are much used in the district. The thrashing has been rather late this season in consequence of the quantity of straw reaped by the machines, being far more difficult to thrash. The average thrashed would be about 500 bushels a day, whilst with the straw reaped by hand the average would be 1100 per diem.

Skilled labour is getting very scarce; wages of a good farm labourer from 12s. to 15s. per week.

I regret to have to report that the disease amongst sheep known as the scab has broken out in several small farmer's flocks. A sheep-dip in connection with the sale yards of Westbury and Carrick, where fortnightly and monthly sales are held, would be a boon, where sheep which may be slightly infected could be dipped at the expense of the owner, and much unpleasantness, which at present of necessity exists, may be obviated, where sheep are constantly driven from one sale to another.

The sale of the Quamby Estate has cast a gloom over the district; a large number of tenants on the estate, it is to be feared, will have to seek new homes when their leases expire,—perhaps in another Colony.
