

# REPORT FOR 1896.

New Town, 25th March, 1897.

SIR

I HAVE the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report of the New Town Charitable-Institution for the Year 1896.

# Strength.

The number of inmates on the books during the year was—Males, 542; Females, 338—total, 880, or 29 less than in 1895.

The number of inmates in the Institution on 31st December last was 514, a decrease of 9 compared with 1895; this number includes 15 children.

The highest number of inmates at any one time was 547; this shows a decrease of 30 compared with 1895. The lowest number was 508, or 4 more as compared with 1895.

The average daily number during the year was 530 11, a decrease of 15 77 on the previous year.

### Admissions.

The number admitted during the year was 357, or 14 less than in 1895.

## Discharges.

The number discharged was 276, as against 300 in 1895.

#### Mortality.

The deaths during the year numbered 90, or 10.23 per cent., as against 86, or 9.46 per cent. in 1895. The average age of those who died, exclusive of children, was 74.28 years, the maximum age being 97 and the minimum 43 years. The average age of the 13 oldest was 88.07, and 28 averaged over 80 years of age. Appended will be found return showing cause of death, &c.

# Expenditure.

The gross expenditure for the year was £5472 16s. 8d., as against £5952 3s. 4d. in 1895. The receipts from all sources was £615 1s. 5d.; compared with 1895 this shows a decrease of £120 15s. 5d., due principally to the falling off in the amount received for the maintenance of inmates, which was £104 4s. 2d. less than the amount received in 1895. The net expenditure was £4857 15s. 3d., being a decrease of £358 11s. 3d. compared with 1895.

The cost per head on gross expenditure was £10 6s. 6d., or 11s. 7d. less than in 1895. The cost per head on net expenditure was £9 3s. 3d., as against £9 11s. 1d. in 1895.

During the year Customs duties were paid on tea, sugar, tobacco, and spirits to the extent of £230 0s. 9d.

The charge against the Imperial Government for maintenance of Imperial paupers during the year amounted to £330 6s. 7d. This with the amount paid for Customs duty would, if deducted from the expenditure, reduce the net cost per head to £8 2s. 1d., or  $5\frac{1}{4}d$ . per day.

# Repairs and Improvements.

The sum of £92 8s. 11d. was expended under this heading; of this sum £9 15s. 2d. was paid for half cost of erecting fence between the New Town Charitable Institution Grounds and Colebrook; and the balance, £82 13s. 9d., was for materials. Some of the wards, verandahs, officers' quarters, &c. were painted, papered, and renovated by inmate labour.

#### Garden.

45,564 lbs. of vegetables, valued at £71 4s. 9d., were raised and used in the Institution, and £8 18s. 5d. worth were supplied to the Hobart Gaol.

## Farm.

It will be observed from the annexed Return, marked E., that the working of the Farm resulted in a profit of £212 3s. 3d. for the year. Derwent Park Estate was taken over from the beginning of the current year, and certain improvements effected thereto, and farming operations begun. Taking into consideration the dry spring the season's result is very satisfactory.

# Religious Services.

The usual Religious Services have been held during the year, and the spiritual wants of the inmates attended to by the Chaplains, Lay Readers, Sisters of Charity, Flower Mission, Christian Endeavour Societies, Ladies' Reading Committee, Salvation Army, and others.

#### Entertainments, Treats, &c.

Entertainments were given during the year by the Hobart Choral Society, City Band, and others, which were much appreciated by the inmates.

The usual treat of roast beef and plum pudding was given by the Government on Queen's Birthday and Christmas Day, and the Cascade Brewery Company very generously sent a hogshead of ale on the latter day.

Donations of tobacco, lollies, &c. were received from Archdeacon Whitington and Mrs. Colonel Shelton.

Twenty-five of the inmates who had formerly served under Her Majesty either in the Army or Navy were, through the thoughtful kindness of the Officers of the Defence Force, treated to a Social on the evening of the Queen's Birthday, when grog, tobacco, and light refreshments were provided.

Following up their usual practice, the Honorable F. W. Piesse, M.L.C., and Mr. J. Bowman, donated funds for the purchase of Christmas extras for inmates.
