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

ANNUAL REPORT for 1888.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management, giving particulars regarding the government, condition, and cost of the above-named Hospital for the year 1888.

2. Messrs. Birchall, Maddox, and Stanfield retired during the month of December, and no opposition was offered to their re-election.

3. Thirteen Board and fifty-one Committee Meetings were held during the year.

4. A proposition has been made by the Honorary Secretary of the projected Children's Cottage Hospital that the Trustees of the fund raised in the Jubilee year be permitted to partially furnish wards for children, and that they be allowed to pay a fixed sum per annum towards the cost of their maintenance. If at any time a separate institution is erected for the benefit of sick children, it is stipulated that the furniture shall be transferred to it. It is expressly understood that no interference with the present management will be permitted.

5. As the Central Board of Health has no medical officer in the North, the Surgeon-Superintendent has, when requested to do so, visited districts in which contagious diseases had developed, and reported to the Honorable the President.

6. The exceptional drought experienced during the year is doubtless related to the remarkable occurrence of numbers of cases of fever, diphtheria, and various forms of pharyngitis which have prevailed. It is desirable that all cases of inflammation and congestion of the lungs should be notified to the Boards of Health.

7. The proper disinfection of patients' clothes has engaged the attention of the Board, and it is thought that a portable chamber would be best adapted for the purpose.

8. The Board do not approve of the erection of a reception-house for the insane within the Hospital grounds proper, but suggests that the necessary buildings may be erected in the neighbourhood of the Hospital and worked by its staff.

9. The hydraulic lift has given some anxiety, and it is a question whether a gas-engine would not prove more economical and convenient than the existing water motor.

10. A site for men's sleeping-rooms has been selected in juxtaposition with the building in which laundry operations are carried on.

11. The laying out of the grounds is being proceeded with.

12. There was a great loss of water during the first eight months of the year.

13. The Hospital is indebted to many private citizens for acts of kindness which they have visited upon the patients.

14. The following improvements have been carried out:—

The walls of the old portion of the Hospital have been hacked and plastered preparatory to their being painted. The foundations of the N.W. wing have been rebuilt, and the fissures which have existed for many years, and which widened in the month of April, have been pointed up. A further subsidence of the wing has occurred.

The internal walls of the Nurses' Home have been painted, the boiler-room has been dismantled and converted into a dormitory for the nurses on night duty. The dark rooms have had their conditions slightly improved, and light has been let into the kitchen scullery.

The site of the iron gates having been condemned by the Government Architect, that position has been abandoned and another one at the top of the avenue has been selected. The approaching road is being flanked with an iron picket.

15. The work has been heavy during the year, and the expenditure has been greater than usual. The visitation of smallpox in the year 1887 drained our resources, and the acute cases treated during the year under revision raised the cost of each occupied bed.

16. The usual detailed information, furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent, is embodied in this Report, and is of an interesting character.
