

# CASCADE INVALID DEPOT.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT FOR 1868.

Laid upon the Table by Mr. Wilson, and ordered by the Council to be printed,. August 24, 1869.



Cascade Invalid Depôt, Hobart Town, 18th February, 1869.

In submitting the Return showing the cost of the Invalid Depôt for the year 1868, I beg leave to make a few remarks as to the working of the Institution.

It will be recollected that the Depôt was formed in August, 1867; and, to make it suitable for inmates of both sexes, vast alterations had to be made in the Building, it being formerly constructed for Female Prisoners only.

Bath-rooms were most essentially required for the class of persons admitted. I am glad to report that I have now one in each Division, with hot and cold water laid on. These have been put up without any additional expense, with the exception of the materials and plumber's work.

A Dead-house and a Day-room for Males were urgently required. Both have been put up: the latter—55 feet 5 inches in length,  $16\frac{1}{2}$  feet in width, and 15 feet in height—was erected by the Carpenter of the Establishment. With the assistance of prison labour many other improvements have been effected.

The average daily strength of the Males has been 145, out of which number only about from 45 to 50 have been fit to perform any kind of labour. These, so far as they were able, have been employed in cultivating the land adjoining the Establishment, stone-breaking, broom-making, &c.

The quantity of Vegetables raised last year was 93,321 lbs., besides 6 months' forage for the Van-horse. There is now under crop from 8 to 10 acres with potatoes, carrots, parsnips, and onions, which are likely to yield a fair return, although the season has been a very unfavourable one.

With regard to the Female Division, the daily strength has been about 110. There has been no return of labour, with the exception of making their own clothing and doing their washing; but since the Regulations have been introduced they do needlework, such as repairing clothing for the Queen's Asylum, &c.

I would observe that many of both sexes are capable of performing labour, such as picking horse-hair, oakum, coir, &c., if it could be procured, but are totally incapacitated from any other work.

The average age of both sexes is about 69 years. There have been 18 deaths in the Male Division, and a like number in the Female.

This being the first Report that I have been called upon to make, I trust it will meet with your approval.


