

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Report of the Launceston General Hospital for the year 1879.

The number of admissions were less than last year by 16.

There were admitted during the year 468 In-Patients, of whom 333 were males and 135 females.

The total expenditure for the year is in excess of last year, and the daily cost per head is greater by 1s. $2\frac{3}{4}d$.

The number of Out-Patients, 633, is less than last year.

The receipts from Paying Patients amounted to £239 4s. 10d., a decrease of £89 4s. 8d. on those of preceding year.

There remained at the end of the year 1878, 51 Patients, so that the total number of In-Patients-treated during the year was 519: of those there were discharged 389 cured or relieved, 66 died, and 64 remained under treatment.

Average diets issued to Patients in Hospital for year were 53.25.

Of the 66 deaths, no less than 37 were over 50 years of age; many of them admitted in a hopeless state, and surviving but a few hours after admission. The average age was 51.86.

The admissions were 16 less than last year, and the deaths more by 10.

Of the Patients admitted, 72 were self-supporting and 396 were colonial paupers.

The statistical information is as usual appended.

ADDENDUM.

The following figures show the number of patients, and cost per head, as compared with the previous year:—

[•] If, however, from this the sums—as shown on page 4—for repairs, furniture for female nurses' quarters, &c. are deducted, the expenditure per head would be only £54 18s. 6*21d.

The estimates of expenditure under nearly all heads were exceeded, owing to extraordinary repairs having to be executed, extra medicines and surgical instruments, as well as furniture (a new item) for female nurses' quarters being obtained; while the washing had to be let out in consequence of the Gaol Authorities being unable to have it performed by prisoners. Gas had to be supplied for cooking purposes in lieu of wood and coal, the old range being unfit for use.
