



ESTABLISHMENT AT PORT ARTHUR:

REPORT FOR 1876.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Secretary, and ordered by the House to be printed, April 24, 1877.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Annual Report of this Establishment for 1876.

Epitomising the several following Returns, as lettered, it will be seen that A. gives the value of materials supplied at £234 13s. 4d.; B. the daily average number of prisoners at 67, with a statement of offences committed by them; C. the labour classes of prisoners; D. the various description of labour at which employed; E. the quantity and estimated value of produce raised, and amount paid by Stipendiaries for labour at £1138 4s. 4d.; F. the quantity and value of timber and firewood supplied at £407 0s. 2d.; G. the number of articles of convict clothing made and repaired, with amount of washing and repairs to buildings at £322 10s. 2d.; and H. the average number of effective prisoners, as before stated, at 67, of paupers at 70, and of lunatics at 83, with the mortality at 10.

At commencement of the year, 83 prisoners, 20 paupers, and 85 lunatics form the strength of the Establishment. Of the first, 13 were discharged to freedom, 20 to the gaol, Hobart Town, and 14 were received therefrom, leaving 64 at end of the year: of the second, an addition was made to the numbers of 134, from which 34 were discharged and 7 died, leaving 113; and of the third, 2 were discharged, 3 died, and 1 was lost in the bush, leaving 79.

The deaths in every instance occurred in weakened constitutions from a complication of disorders, such as rheumatism accompanied by heart disease and organic changes in the lungs, the liver, the kidneys, with brain and other affections: considering, however, that the average age of the deceased was 71½ years, it can be no matter of surprise that the several ailments found time and opportunity eventually to destroy life.

With the lost man it is to be regretted the case was far different. In strong bodily health, and 61 years of age, he managed to escape from the Under-keeper in charge of the wood gang, and although a search was immediately instituted, and continued for several days, no trace whatever could be discovered of the unfortunate imbecile.

Returns Nos. 1 and 2 elucidate the expenditure under respective headings, and show the cost per head of prisoners at £29 8s. 6½d., of paupers at £22 17s. 2d., of hospital patients at £23 3s., and of lunatics at £29 2s. 7d.

These sums indicate a decrease on preceding year of £2 10s. 9½d. for prisoners, £1 3s. for hospital patients, and 10s. 9d. for lunatics, a result attributable to the influx of invalids sent from the Brickfields and Cascades in July last.

To conclude, it is only necessary to add, that the routine duties of the Establishment were regularly and satisfactorily performed by the several officials, and that the inmates collectively, both free and bond, were respectful and well behaved.
