



REPORT of the Directors for the Year 1887.

The Directors submit a Statement of Accounts for the Year ending 31st December last, duly audited. During the year 343,502 passengers were carried as against 337,972 in the previous year, 58,326 tons of goods as against 41,871, and 35,086 head of live stock as against 48,005.

The Receipts and Expenditure for 1887 compare with 1886 as follows:--

The increase in receipts is mainly due to coal traffic (17,865 tons in excess of previous year.) The revenue derived from this increased business somewhat more than balances the decreased receipts from Passengers and Live Stock.

The falling off in the through passenger traffic is attributable to an outbreak of small-pox in Launceston, which entailed the establishment of quarantine at that Port. The local traffic is steadily increasing in volume.

The diminution in the number of Live Stock carried was due to the drought, from the effects of which the Colony is still suffering.

The coal mining industry of the Colony may be regarded as still in its infancy, and has not made the progress expected, but arrangements are now being made to connect the Company's terminus at Launceston with the wharves at that place. These increased facilities will tend to give an impetus to this important traffic.

The importance of connecting the Main Line Terminus at Hobart with the wharves of that city has always been recognised, and there seems now to be a prospect of this desirable connection being made.

Consequent on the adoption of the guage of the Main Line Railway for the Government lines, negotiations have been entered into for the sale of the Company's third rail between Evandale and Launceston, and it is expected the matter will be brought before Parliament in the session just commenced.

The Directors regret that no settlement of the differences between the Government and the Company has yet been effected, but they are not without hope that during the present session of Parliament an amicable arrangement may be come to on the basis of the provisional agreement made with the Agent-General for Tasmania on 9th September, 1886. The accounts show the Government to be in debt to the Company on account of Guaranteed Interest and Interest thereon to the amount of £18,574, which includes £14,500 on deposit at the Consolidated Bank.

The Directors take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of the warm sympathy evinced by all classes in the Colony for Mr. Grant, the Manager, on the occasion of that gentleman meeting with a serious carriage accident, resulting in a broken leg and other injuries. The Shareholders will be glad to learn that Mr. Grant is rapidly progressing towards recovery.

The Reports of the Manager and Locomotive Superintendent on the state and condition of the Permanent Way, Works, Statious, Rolling Stock, &c., are annexed hereto.

The Directors who retire by rotation are Messrs. C. W. Earle and W. Irving Hare, who, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

Mr. Frederick Maynard, the Auditor, also retires, and offers himself for re-election.

My attention has been drawn to a telegram from London which was published in the *Mercury* on Saturday last, stating that "the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company have resolved on opposing the new Tasmanian Loan obtaining an Exchange quotation."

I AM in receipt of your letter of the 17th instant, in which you state that you have no information as to the intention of the Directors of your Company in London to oppose a Stock Exchange quotation being granted for the next Tasmanian Loan. Since the receipt of your letter the following telegram has been received by the Government from the Agent-General for Tasmania:—"Resolution passed by Main Line Railway Company to oppose issue of fresh Loan." I shall therefore feel obliged if you will be good enough to state whether you have received, since the date of your communication of the 17th instant, any official intimation of the Company's intention in confirmation of the report on which the Agent-General's telegram is based.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 20th instant, in which you desire to know whether, since the date of my communication of the 17th, I have received any official information of the Company's intention to oppose the issue of a Tasmanian Loan, should one be placed in the market.

In reply, I have the honor to state that no communication whatever on the matter has since reached me; nor would I expect to be especially informed thereon.

From the wording of the telegram it is apparent that the resolution was passed by the Company at their annual general meeting, usually held at this time, and is probably the voluntary act of the debenture-holders and shareholders themselves—in fact, of the whole Company as

distinguished from the Directors. It is doubtless due to the disappointment felt that their resolutions (adopted at previous meetings especially convened for the purpose of giving the necessary legal sanction to the agreement made between the Agent-General of Tasmania, acting for and on behalf of the Government of Tasmania, and the Company) have been rendered nugatory through such agreement having been repudiated by the late Government. It is only to be expected that any body of shareholders would warmly resent such a very unusual proceeding, under the whole circumstances of the case.

So far as the Board of Directors are concerned, what information I have had led me to believe that, in regard to any opposition to a Tasmanian Loan, they would be entirely guided by my report on the proceedings of the present Government, which, for various reasons that must be palpable to you, has not yet been sent them.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letters of the 17th and 23rd instant, in which you inform me that you have not received, nor do you expect to receive, special information in regard to the reported intention of the Company to oppose the quotation on the London Stock Exchange of the contemplated new Loan to be issued by the Government of Tasmania.

Whether the resolution said to have been passed at the annual general meeting was, as you suggest, the voluntary act of the debenture-holders and shareholders themselves, or the action of the Directors who were able to carry such a resolution, it is clear that the Company are endeavouring, for ends of their own, to injure the credit of this Colony.

If the debenture-holders and shareholders have been led to believe that there has been on the part of the Government of Tasmania a breach of agreement in the refusal of the Government to accept terms suggested by the late Agent-General in order to bring about a settlement of matters in dispute, the action of the debenture and shareholders, if it be their action, may be accounted for in that way. But as the so-called agreement was distinctly only a suggested agreement, clearly dependent for its acceptance on the will of the Government and Parliament, there has been, in the refusal of the late Government to accept it, no repudiation whatever.

However, the Government now feel that, in view of this threatened action of the Company, they can no longer pursue that conciliatory policy which they have since they assumed office endeavoured to carry out. They have refrained from embarrassing the Company by withholding such portion of the interest payable to the Company as the Government have been entitled to withhold under the contract, and in accordance with Mr. Speight's views in dealing with former disputed items, having been willing hitherto that such sums should stand in abeyance until such time as the Company should take the proper course open to them for the settlement of all points in dispute. But now, in view of the threat of the Company, the Government are constrained to take another course; and consequently, in making the next advance for the quarter ended 30th June last, they will deduct the sum of £2257 11s. 3d., which represents the amount claimed as a set-off under the contract in adjusting the account to the 31st December, 1887.

For your information I enclose the account to 31st December, 1887, made up by this Department.

With regard to the year 1888, the usual deduction of £25 will be made in paying the advance for the quarter ended 30th June last.

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 26th instant, in which you contend that the refusal of the late Government of Tasmania to submit to Parliament the agreement made by their accredited agent and representative (almost especially sent home for the purpose) with the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, was no repudiation whatever.

While acknowledging that there is a choice of terms in describing such action, I cannot but repeat that the Proprietary of the Main Line Company have every reason to consider that the act was one of repudiation of such agreement by the Government of Tasmania, and it is not surprising they deeply resent this extremely unusual conduct.

It gives me pleasure to acknowledge the justice of your claim that the present Government have not hitherto endeavoured to strain or violate the contract to the embarrassment of the Company, and therefore I the more regret that you now announce their intention to deduct the sum of £2257 11s. 3d. from the guaranteed interest now due on accounts presented to the 31st December,

Although I propose, as hitherto, to accept the amount that the Government agree to pay, subject to the usual open receipt being given therefor, I must differ from your expression that the disputed amounts are only held in abeyance until such time as the Company should take the proper course open to them for the settlement of all points in dispute. The Company have continually shown through their chairman, their solicitors, and myself, and the Government have been most strongly urged by their own professional adviser, that the only equitable or reasonable course for a settlement of these disputes is by reference to experts, or by mutual agreement founded on the advice of competent authorities; and that forcing the Company to an action at law in Tasmania will be to compel them to accept a tribunal which is not competent to afford an unbiassed trial. In this course it is hardly possible they will meet with the sympathy of British capitalists.

Your taunt made to the solicitors of the Company, that the very serious injustice to which the Company may be compelled to submit to here can be corrected by an appeal to the Privy Council, must surely be made in forgetfulness that any such appeal cannot provide the elements of justice which a trial before a proper tribunal would furnish.

The Company believe, and are well advised, that the deductions hitherto made from their accounts as presented, and especially those now made, are legally quite indefensible; but they further contend that in regard to the interests of the Colony also such are utterly opposed to all principles of equity or to common sense.

RE PURCHASE OF BONDS, £14,500, T.M.L.R. COMPANY.

I have the honor to inform you that I have received advices by cablegram from London, which desire me to request that the Government of Tasmania will agree with the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, in exchanging the deposit of £14,500 in the Consolidated Bank, Limited, of London, in their joint names, into the new 4 per cent. pre-preference Debentures which the Company are now issuing to take the place of the first mortgage of £100,000.

It is scarcely necessary that I should remark upon the perfect security of this new loan, because it not only covers the whole of the Company's property, of every description, but also their right to receive the guaranteed interest of £32,500 per annum; while, as regards interest, the rate of 4 per cent. is certainly better than that which the London Bank pays for loans on deposit.

Should the Government have any doubt as to realising the full amount of £14,500 on the new stock, when they desire to do so, I do not doubt it could be arranged that the Company would take it at par; or, as the stock would probably be worth a good premium in the market, there could be no difficulty as to its sale.

Since the exchange would be made by mutual consent, it could not in any way whatever prejudice the rights or position of either party; and, if thought necessary, this could be guarded against by special agreement.

I therefore trust that the Government will accede to the suggestion made by the Company.

RE GUARANTEED INTEREST.

Sir

I have the honor to forward you herewith the usual Quarterly Statement of Receipts and Expenses for the period ending the 30th June last, and regret, while doing so, that I am not able to show a greater elasticity of traffic than these accounts indicate.

This is almost entirely due to the loss of freight from the agricultural districts, owing to the drought of last summer.

I also enclose an account for the quarter's subsidy, amounting to Eight thousand one hundred and twenty-five Pounds, and have brought forward the amount in question between the Government and the Company, of which I much regret that no settlement has been made.

You will much oblige by passing the account for payment under the terms prescribed by the contract.

It will be noticed that although the expenses of operating considerably exceed the gross receipts on the quarter—as is frequently the case at this period—there is still a balance of profit, which promises well for the result of the whole year's working; and unless some altogether unforeseen and untoward circumstances arise, I do not doubt that my estimate of the difference between receipts and expenditure for the present year will be more than verified.

I also enclose an account against the Government for the sum of £12,280 8s. 10d., now due to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, (irrespective of the amount included in the action now pending), the payment of which, in accordance with the terms of the contract, will much oblige.

I have the honor to inform you that the Accounts of the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, for the year ending 31st December, 1888, have been examined, and to submit my Report thereon for the information of the Government.

The total Receipts credited to Revenue Account were £76,094 8s. 3d., showing an increase over the previous year of £7054 14s. 4d.; the average per train mile being 3s. 10·8d. as compared with 3s. 9·1d. for the year 1887, the train miles for 1888 having been 390,226, and for 1887 367,267.

The Expenditure debited to Revenue Account in the Company's books amounted to £71,966 3s. 5d., an increase of £3851 3s. 5d. over the previous year, leaving a profit, according to the Company's books, of £4128 4s. 10d. available for reduction of guaranteed interest. This profit, however, would be increased by the disallowance of expenditure on new works chargeable to capital, according to the practice hitherto adopted by the Government, should the circumstances hereafter explained warrant the continuation of such practice. The increased expenditure is thus accounted for:—

It is noticed that a considerable portion of the increase in the Permanent Way Charges has been caused by a smaller amount having been realised and credited to that item for sales of material, and by the issue of new rails and sleepers for renewals having been somewhat larger than for 1887. The increase in Carriage and Waggon Charges is due to increase to rolling stock. The decrease in Locomotive Charges is mainly caused by the 1887 account being larger than usual in consequence of the addition of a new locomotive, none having been added in 1888.

The average cost per train mile returned by the Company was 3s. 8·2d. against 3s. 8·5d. for 1887, and on the reduced cost, after deducting capital and other expenditure noted hereafter, 3s. 7·8d. against 3s. 7·4d. for 1887.

The London Charges for the year 1887 were adjusted and added to the account of the year 1888, the estimated amount debited to 1887 having been exceeded by £626 0s. 9d.

In a letter dated 4th July instant I informed you that the General Manager of the Company had, contrary to the usual practice, refused to furnish an account of the cost of new works (Correspondence in Appendix A), and as the details were not obtainable on the vouchers submitted by the Company for examination, I am not yet in a position to furnish the precise cost of such works; but taking the estimate furnished by the Engineer-in-Chief, the cost has amounted to £570 (see Appendix B.)

It will be noticed that the item for addition to Dwelling, Conara Station, £50, in the Return of new works furnished by the Engineer-in-Chief, has been excluded, Mr. Grant having explained that this work was commenced in 1889.

SIR.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 7th instant, in which, on the authority of the Engineer-in-Chief, you recite certain works as having been done on the railway during the year 1888, and desire to be furnished with the cost thereof. On these items I would remark that the cost of the very small additions to the Epping Forest Station and the Hobart Store shall be sent you as soon as ascertained. In regard to the small addition to the dwelling-house at Conara Station, this work was not in any way commenced until after the commencement of the present year, and is not at the present time completed. The loop siding at Rhyndaston is simply a shifting of the former siding to a different place; so many mishaps occurred through the former siding being what is called a "blind" one that it was made a loop siding, as being necessary for public safety, although not quite so convenient for loading freight. The cottages at Tea Tree Station and Crooked Billet are simply replacements of former cottages which had become by lapse of time unfit for habitation—they cannot, therefore, be classed as new works; while in regard to the cottage at Rosetta Crossing, the cottage previously erected by the Company was destroyed by fire, and being insured the insurance company paid its value. The new one was placed in a somewhat different position. As regards the Signals, which Mr. Fincham estimates as worth £30, I do not know which are referred to, those that have been erected during the past year not being of that value.

Rhyndaston Siding—This is more than removal; there is considerably increased accommodation, and expense has of course been incurred which I can only very approximately ascertain. Cottages.—It is not fair to treat these as renewals; they are good cottages, and replace the veriest hovels that would have been dear indeed at £10. They were always understood as having been erected by the men themselves, and certainly so appeared. Signals.—This is at Glenorchy. I should press the Manager for his statement of cost in each case.

You are aware that it was my intention to provide you with these figures in the manner I have hitherto done, as a matter of courtesy only, and without acknowledging the propriety of your request for the same; for I have always maintained that the 10th clause in the Contract only gives the Government the right to inspect satisfactory vouchers, or to take evidence of bonâ fide payments where vouchers are not available. But in the recent law-suit which was heard in the Supreme Court, you will doubtless remember that the Company's leading Counsel took great exception to my action, which he described as having been improper, and as causing him great embarrassment in his conduct of the case of the Main Line Railway Company.

Under these circumstances, I trust you will not take offence when I state my inability to give the information you desire. I may further state that to remove any chance of misunderstanding, Mr. Fooks has written me a legal opinion on this matter in which his contention at the trial is more strongly upheld.

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 1st instant, and beg to express my great obligation for the very courteous nature of the last paragraph.

In regard to the exception you take to my statement that the information hitherto given you was only supplied as a matter of courtesy, I can only refer back to the time when you first asked such information, and reminded you of the extreme hesitancy and delay with which it was afforded. This was strongly commented upon by yourself in your evidence in the recent trial between the Company and the Government, in which you alluded to the trouble that you had had in obtaining the accounts from me. You also gave evidence that I contested with you for a considerable time as to whether you had power to require such accounts, and that when these were asked for you stated that my rendering them could not compromise either the Company or myself, upon which I eventually furnished them.

The effect of my action has resulted in all the trouble which has taken place, and in the ruinous lawsuit which is now running its enormously costly course. I have, &c.

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 3rd, in reply to mine of the 1st instant, in which you still seem to insist that the accounts of the cost of new works constructed in 1883 and 1884 were furnished by you and accepted by me as a matter of courtesy.

I regret being unable to agree with you in this contention, and cannot see that the circumstances as stated by you (even if fully proved, which I do not admit) can bear the interpretation you place upon them, and, further, that there is nothing in the official correspondence that has passed between us on the subject that can in any way lead to the belief that the accounts were received by me except as a right and a matter of business, as explained in my last letter.

By inference you appear to blame me for having unfairly used the figures you supplied, and thereby having caused all the trouble which has taken place in the ruinous law-suit, &c., and thus appear to be following the tactics adopted by your counsel in the late trial in the Supreme Court when referring to the action taken by me. In the latter instance, you are aware, I could have no opportunity of refuting the unfair statement then made; but you must also be aware that I have not in any way acted beyond the limits of a clear public duty imposed upon me; therefore I feel compelled to refer to a course so unusual on your part in all previous correspondence with me, and which is calculated to bring about a state of affairs that would be far from creditable to either of us that would be far from creditable to either of us.

As it is evident the misunderstanding in this matter cannot be cleared up by further correspondence, it is suggested that the discussion thereof, so far as we are personally concerned, should not be continued.

In reply to a letter from me, dated 7th March last, requesting information as to the cost of certain new buildings, &c. erected by the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company during the year 1888, the General Manager of the Company has replied, in a letter received on the 1st instant, that he is unable to give the information, because, he maintains, that the 10th Clause of the Contract between the Government and the Company only gives the Government the right to inspect satisfactory vouchers, or to take evidence of bona fide payments where vouchers are not available, and that Mr. Fooks has written a legal opinion on this matter, in which his contention on this point at the late trial in the Supreme Court is more strongly unheld. strongly upheld.

As it is very desirable that this question of my right as Auditor-General of the Colony to require the production of vouchers and particulars of all expenditure incurred in the construction and maintenance of the Railway should be decided, I have the honor to request you will obtain the opinion of the Law Officers on the following questions:-

1. Does not Clause 10 of the Contract between the Government and the Company require the production of vouchers with particulars of expenditure satisfactory to the Government, or the agent whom the Government may appoint to examine the Railway Accounts?

2. Do the provisions of Clauses 17, 18, 19, and 23 of the Audit Act apply in respect to the accounts of the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company?

As in the event of the replies being in the affirmative it is my intention to ask the Government to instruct me as to the desirability of taking proceedings to compel the production of the information which the General Manager of the Railway now declines to furnish.

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 5th instant, and only depart from the suggestion contained in your last paragraph therein for the purpose of entirely disclaiming that in my previous letter I had any intention whatever of in any way reflecting upon your action in using the figures I supplied you with at your request.

I must positively assure you that nothing could have been farther from my intention, neither did I in the least suppose that your desire to have the figures was not solely from a sense of public duty, and according to your interpretation of the reading of the Contract. So far from any blame attaching to you such a course, I am sure you could not have acted otherwise under the responsibility you must have intended of upon you. The sentence of mine which appears to have called forth your remarks was that instead of continuing to contest your powers under the Contract (as you are aware that I did strongly at first), I supplied the information you required as a matter of courtesy, although from the same cause I naturally did not put this forward in the correspondence. Had I taken a firmer course, and insisted upon the matter being legally fought out and settled, in all probability the proper reading of the Contract, as now expounded by the Judges, would have been forced upon us, and the terrible law-suit in which we have both been engaged would have been averted.
