

## GENERAL HOSPITAL, HOBART.

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### *ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Management for the Year 1893.*

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SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honor to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during the past year.

2. Seventeen Board and eighty-seven Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

3. The Board is happy to report that during the past year the number of cases of typhoid fever treated shows a marked diminution as compared with the preceding year, 71 cases with 8 deaths in 1893 as against 98 cases with 15 deaths in 1892. There has also been a marked reduction in the number of cases of diphtheria during the year, 39 cases having been admitted, 10 of which proved fatal, but of this number 5 deaths occurred within a few hours after admission. In 1892 52 cases were treated, 18 of which proved fatal.

4. The number of Indoor patients treated during the year is slightly in excess of that of the preceding year. In 1892, 1200 cases; in 1893, 1232,—being an increase of 32.

5. Of the 1232 cases treated during 1893, 99 proved fatal, but of this number 21 died within seventy-two hours after admission to the Hospital.

6. The net annual average cost of each occupied bed in 1892 was £84 19s. 11d., and for the past year £66 18s. 11d. In 1892 the cash collections and receipts from other sources amounted to £1275 17s. 4d., and for 1893 to £1204 3s. 11d., but the gross expenditure is considerably less than that of the preceding year. The fees remaining on the books for collection at 31st December amounted to £96 14s. 3d.

7. Although the number of In-patients treated during 1893 is above the average of the past twelve years, the net cost of the establishment is lower than it has been since 1881, and the gross cost less than since 1883.

8. The Outdoor patient department shows an increase in number of attendances compared with the preceding year, in which it amounted to 5364, the number of attendances for 1893 being 5603.

9. The Hospital Dispensary is open daily from 9 A.M. to 6 P.M., and cases of urgency are attended to at all hours. Besides the In-patients and Out-patients of the Hospital itself, the Gaol, C. D. Hospital, Lying-in Home, Permanent Force, Training School, and all the sick poor attended in their own homes by the Government Medical Officer, are supplied with medicines, &c. from this Dispensary, thus entailing a large annual expenditure over which the Board has no thorough control.

10. The Board of Management has pleasure in recording their appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Officers have discharged their onerous duties during the year, and as will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been successfully performed during the year.

The Board desires also to record its high appreciation of the continued zeal and ability with which Dr. Smart has conducted the multiform duties devolving on him in his capacity as Chairman of the Board of Management of the Hospital, the period of his valuable services as Chairman now extending over sixteen years.

11. The absence of an Operating Room in connection with the Hospital has long been felt as a serious defect, and attention has repeatedly been called to the fact, and the Board takes advantage of this opportunity to urge on the Government the necessity for this provision being made.

12. The New Home for the nursing staff of the Hospital was completed in the early part of the year, and handed over for occupation in May last, and so far has been found to meet every requirement, affording to the nursing staff all the comforts of a first-class home or residence.

13. The hospital grounds, under Mr. Abbott's able supervision, have progressively improved, and are now, viewed from a sanitary standpoint alone, valuable, while as a general improvement to

the Hospital and its surroundings they are highly ornamental. It must be apparent to any one, however, that the enclosing fence fronting on Campbell-street is most imperfect and unsightly, affording no safeguard against communication with patients from that quarter.

14. It is to be regretted that, although the necessity for escapes or safeguards in case of fire has been brought under the notice of the Government since 1891, no steps have, so far, been taken to provide this very desirable addition to the Hospital.

15. The want of a steam laundry in connection with the Hospital is still as urgent as ever, for, although every care is taken to curtail the expenditure under the head "Washing," the item is still a heavy source of expense. The present cost of "washing" is at the rate of £400 per annum, and by the introduction of a properly-equipped steam laundry it is estimated that an annual saving of at least £190 would be effected.

16. In July, 1891, the attention of the Government was drawn to the necessity of enclosing portions of the verandahs in connection with the Hospital for Females, in order to afford the nurses on duty protection from severe weather during the winter months, but, so far, nothing has been done in the matter.
