

MUNICIPAL POLICE:

INSPECTOR'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1886.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.

(No. 27.)



Police Department, Inspector's Office, Hobart, 27th May, 1887.

I HAVE the honor to submit my Annual Report upon the Police appointed for the several Municipalities within the Colony for the year 1886, in accordance with Section 7 of "The Police Regulation Act, 1865."

Owing to circumstances to which I have previously referred, I have found it impracticable to visit every Municipality since I took charge of this Department on the 18th January, 1886, and I have been compelled to omit Westbury, Fingal, Glamorgan, and Spring Bay. I have, however, made arrangements to visit them before Parliament meets, and hope to be permitted, if necessary, to make a supplementary Report.

The question of the centralisation of the Police, and the abrogation of the local control of the Municipal Councils, has become one of the public questions of the day, and has engaged, and will still engage, the attention of Parliament. It would not therefore become me to express in this Report any opinion on the subject.

A general understanding has been arrived at between the Territorial and the several Municipal bodies, especially those of Hobart and Launceston, that they shall not interfere with, or encroach in the performance of Police duty upon the ground of each other. This arrangement has been productive of a better feeling than at one time existed between the two branches, and I believe officers and men unite in a commendable desire to work harmoniously, and for the general benefit of the whole community. I have invariably insisted upon a due observance of this arrangement by the Territorial Police.

I believe the position of the men would be greatly improved if some means were devised of removing constables from one district to another. It sometimes happens that men are compelled to resign, or are dismissed, because something has occurred or some cause exists which necessitates their removal from their station, and no means are available, owing to the contracted area of the Municipality, of transferring them to another. It is to be regretted that in such cases the Inspector cannot be resorted to to negotiate or effect an exchange.

The 17th Section of the Act before referred to requires the Municipal Council of each Municipality to "maintain a sufficient number of fit and able men as constables, for the preservation of the peace by day and by night, the prevention and detection of robberies, felonies, misdemeanors, and other offences, the protection of the inhabitants, the security of the property within such Municipality, and for the maintenance of general police communication and uniform organisation throughout the Colony." The Police Establishment of each Municipality is undoubtedly on a basis calculated efficiently to comply with so much of the above requirements as is made imperative "within such Municipality," and I have no hesitation in certifying that such is the case; but the fulfilment of the provision requiring "the maintenance of general police communication and uniform organisation throughout the Colony" is, from the very nature of the constitution of the Municipalities, quite an impossibility.

The Police Gazette, which is published weekly, and placed in the hands of every constable in the Colony, affords to the Municipalities a gratuitous means of circulating information as to offences, a description of stolen property, and other matters; yet, strange to say, some of them do not avail themselves of the undoubted advantage it offers, and I am aware that reports of serious offences and particulars of stolen property frequently do not find their way into its columns.

Sir,

The Rural Municipalities have not in any instance established a Superannuation Fund. It is probably not practicable with such a small body of police as even the largest of them possesses; but the difficulty might be overcome if arrangements could be made to pay the contributions into the "Territorial Police Provident Fund" established by the Government, and to keep the accounts with those of the Territorial Police.

I furnish in detail the returns and particulars of the Force relating to each separate Municipality, in continuation of the practice which I find has prevailed for many years.
