


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

ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Management for the Year 1894.

SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honour to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during the past year.

2. Nineteen Board and eighty-seven Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

3. The Board of Management desires to express its sincere regret at the loss sustained by the death of Messrs. James Salier and Joseph Solomon, who for many years faithfully served as members of the Board, and took a personal interest in the welfare of the inmates of the Hospital at all times.

4. Messrs. R. Snowden and T. Whitesides were elected as members of the Board of Management, taking the places of Messrs Salier and Solomon, deceased.

5. The number of cases of typhoid fever treated in the Hospital during the past year is 93, as compared with 71 so treated in 1893. The deaths from typhoid fever in 1894 numbered 10, as against 8 in the preceding year. Thirty-seven cases of diphtheria were treated, five of which proved fatal. In 1893, 39 cases were treated, 10 proving fatal.

6. The number of In-door patients treated during the year is slightly less than in the preceding year. In 1893, 1232 cases, with 99 deaths; in 1894, 1185 cases, with 93 deaths, of which number 28 occurred within 72 hours after admission to Hospital. Although the number of cases treated is slightly less than last year, the average stay of patients in Hospital has been greater, viz. 26 days, as compared with 24 days in 1893. Of the 1185 cases treated in the Hospital last year, 963 were admitted as paupers.

7. The net annual average cost of each occupied bed in 1893 was £66 18s. 11d., and for the past year £60 2s. 7d. In 1893 the cash collections and receipts from other sources amounted to £1204 3s. 11d., and for 1894 to £1167 5s. 10d.; but the gross expenditure is considerably less than the average of the past ten years. The fees remaining on the books for collection at 31st December amounted to £12. It has not been necessary to recommend any fees for remission during the past year.

8. The Out-door patient department shows an increase in the number of attendances compared with the preceding year, in which it amounted to 5603, the number of attendances for 1894 being 5699. Since the appointment of the present Government Medical Officer there has been a marked diminution in the number of orders and prescriptions received at the dispensary, as also in the cost of medicines, &c. for the large number of destitute patients who receive relief from this branch of the Institution.

9. The Board of Management has pleasure in recording their appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Officers have discharged their onerous duties during the year, and, as will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been successfully performed during the year.

The Board desires also to record its high appreciation of the continued zeal and ability with which Dr. Smart has conducted the multifarious duties devolving on him in his capacity as Chairman of the Board and of the Visiting Committee, the period of his valuable services now extending over seventeen years.

10. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff, and during the year several performances were given by private individuals and companies for the benefit and entertainment of the patients.

11. The absence of an operating-room in connection with the Hospital has long been felt as a very serious defect, and attention has repeatedly been called to the fact, and the Board takes advantage of this opportunity to urge on the Government the necessity for this provision being made.

12. It is to be regretted that although the necessity for escapes or safeguards in case of fire has been brought under the notice of the Government since 1891, no steps have so far been taken to provide this very desirable addition to the Hospital.
