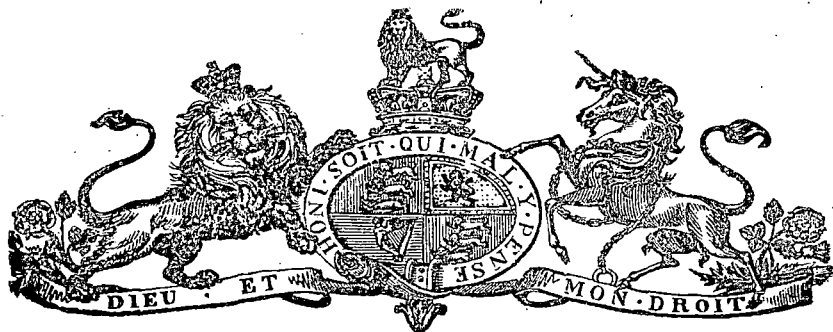

To His Excellency CHARLES DU CANE, Esquire, Governor-in-Chief of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

DURING the past year a small further increase in the number of Patients in this Institution has taken place. At one period of the year they had reached the number of 279; but, before its close, had again declined to 271,—being 5 more than appears in the Return of 1871. From an examination of the Returns for the last seven years, it appears that the average annual increase for that period has been 9; but, while the number of Patients under treatment in the Hospital has thus gradually risen, the number of admissions during the same period has been nearly stationary,—indicating that the increase that has taken place is chiefly due to the accumulation of chronic cases.

This result is in accordance with the experience of the adjoining Australian Colonies, and more especially of New South Wales, with which this Colony is most nearly identified in point of age and early social condition, out of which so large a portion of the insanity existing in both Colonies has sprung.

At present the number of insane persons in Tasmania, in proportion to the whole population, is in excess of that which prevails in the United Kingdom and other European Countries; but the time must come when the special cause which has led to, and still maintains, that excess will cease to operate, and the amount of insanity for which the Colony has now to provide will be reduced to the rate existing in other lands.

The increase that has thus taken place in the number of Patients has filled the Hospital to its utmost proper capacity; and any further augmentation would be attended with embarrassment. In the detached cottage for Female Patients alone some vacant room is to be found.

Since the date of the last Report of the Commissioners the Institution has been conducted with all the quiet efficiency which has long characterised its management.

No inmate has been subjected to personal restraint, and none have attempted to escape.

Various minor improvements and necessary repairs have been effected by the labour of the Patients, including the erection of a verandah in front and at the back of the cottage for idiot boys, a separate bath-room attached to the refractory ward for females, and a substantial foot-bridge across the Lachlan leading to the farm and home of the idiot boys.

The general condition of the Hospital buildings is satisfactory; and such repairs as they require will be effected by the labour of the Patients.

Of the whole number of Patients under treatment during the year, the cost of 37 only has been borne by the Imperial, and of 234 by the Colonial Government.

The entire expenditure for the year was £6717 10s. 11d.—£182 2s. 4d. less than in the previous year,—the annual cost of each Patient being £24 10s. 4d., or 1s. 4d. per diem.

Thirty-nine Patients have been wholly or partially self-supporting. On their account the sum of £1235 17s. has been received,—being £89 15s. 9d. more than was derived from the same source in the previous year.

RETURN of Work performed by Patients in co-operation with the Carpenter and Painter in the Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, during the Year 1872.

Buildings erected.—Front and back verandah to boys' cottage, with pantry; stable for bull, bath-house for cells, female division; Dutch barn, 227 posts and rails split.

New Articles made.—Press and cupboard for ladies' cottage, bath-house, boys' cottage shingled, shafts to horse-dray and cart, 2 shower-baths to female division, 2 wheels for barrows, hay rakes, quantity of handles for axes and brooms, new posts to laundry drying ground, 18 coffins.

Repairs.—Trough to mill-race for irrigation, sundry couches and chairs, wheels of horse-dray, drying-horses in laundry, bull cart, flooring in wards, cells, &c., fences in hospital grounds, farm, and garden.

Glazier.—Wards and cells coloured, water pipes repaired and kept in order, water taps repaired and kept in order, piping laid on to shower-baths, piping laid on to bath-house cells, 227 squares of glass put in.
