Notices of Motion

- 11** The Minister for Primary Industry and Water to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises that the Perth Bicentenary was celebrated on 29 and 30 May 2021.
 - (2) Acknowledges that 30 May 2021 marked 200 years to the day of when Governor Lachlan Macquarie visited Tasmania, staying with pardoned convict David Gibson near the town. David Gibson came from Perth in Scotland, so in honour of his home town, they decided to name this town Perth.
 - (3) Notes celebrations included a bonfire at Adams Distillery on 29 May 2021, a Thanksgiving service at the Perth Tabernacle on 30 May 2021 and a history celebration and afternoon tea at the Perth Community Centre on Sunday afternoon 30 May 2021.
 - (4) Further notes that Bicentennial murals were painted by local artists and installed across the town.
 - (5) Congratulates the Bicentennial coordinator Russel MacKenzie and Bicentenary history coordinator Sue Field, organising committee, historians and volunteers for organising such a great weekend of celebrations. (24 June 2021)
- 12** Ms *Haddad* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Recognises one of the highest responsibilities of Government is to look after the most vulnerable.
 - (2) Acknowledges the many people who have shared their stories about their poor experience with the Public Trustee.
 - (3) Notes it has been nearly three weeks since the Attorney-General, Hon. Elise Archer MP announced that terms of reference for an independent review of the Public Trustee were being 'urgently' developed.
 - (4) Further notes reports that people who have made complaints to the Ombudsman about the Public Trustee have been told the Ombudsman is too short-staffed to review their complaints.
 - (5) Further recognises the latest 'Human Services Dashboard' revealed that in March 2021, 65 children were referred for a child safety investigation but were not allocated a caseworker within agreed timeframes.
 - (6) Acknowledges the problem of understaffing in child safety highlighted by the CPSU.
 - (7) Further acknowledges the Custodial Inspector's 'Lockdowns Review 2021' highlighted the basic human right of Tasmanian prisoners to spend at least one hour per day outside their cell is routinely not being met.
 - (8) Further notes the Review found that staff shortages heavily impact the time prisoners are able to spend out of their cells and in December 2020 were the cause of approximately one-third of all lockdowns.
 - (9) Calls on the Government to:—

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- (a) immediately address understaffing issues in prisons, at Ombudsman Tasmania and in child safety to ensure it is meeting its obligations to people under its care.
- (b) release terms of reference for the inquiry into the Public Trustee within seven days. (29 June 2021)

13 Dr Broad to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Marine and Safety Tasmania (MAST) now requires that person in a rowing shell must wear an approved life jacket unless accompanied by a powered craft which is at all times within 200 metres of the rowing shell and is carrying sufficient Level 50 life jackets (or higher) for each person on the rowing shell.
- (2) Further notes that wearing a life jacket in a rowing shell is completely impractical and will:—
 - (a) restrict movement;
 - (b) cause discomfort;
 - (c) inhibit rowers getting back into a capsized boat; and
 - (d) is not required anywhere else in Australia.
- (3) Further notes that it is impossible for most coaching craft to carry the required number of life jackets when coaching multiple crews.
- (4) Further notes that enforcing the Regulations during regattas is impractical and would require umpires following an eights race at Lake Barrington to carry life jackets for eight crews or 72 life jackets in total.
- (5) Further notes that rowing shells have sealed compartments and can be classified as floatation devices.
- (6) Further notes that rowing clubs and schools are very conscious about safety.
- (7) Further notes that there have been no drownings from rowers capsizing rowing shells in at least the last 50 years, if ever.
- (8) Calls on the Government to exempt a person in a rowing shell from any requirement to wear an approved life jacket. (29 June 2021)

14 Mr Street to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that despite the challenges of the 2020, Tasmania's economy continues to grow.
- (2) Further notes that across a range of economic indicators, our economic performance is strengthening.
- (3) Recognises that State Final Demand is now 2.9 per cent higher than before the Pandemic.
- (4) Acknowledges international demand is at record highs, with exports 4.3 per cent higher than the 2020, bucking the national trend.
- (5) Further notes the confidence in business investment with the March 2021 quarter figures showing it is now 6.4 per cent higher 2020.
- (6) Further recognises that this included the highest annual growth in equipment, plant and machinery in the country, increasing 49 per cent over the year.
- (7) Further notes dwelling approvals are at 3,952 over the 12-months to April 2021 – the highest number in more than a quarter of a century.
- (8) Further notes that, as the economy is strengthening, confidence is returning to the Tasmanian community with retail trade 24.5 per cent higher than April 2020.
- (9) Further acknowledges that our economy is growing strongly and our recovery is well underway. (29 June 2021)

15 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Motor Neurone Disease (MND) affects over 420,000 people globally with over 140,000 people diagnosed with MND each year, which is more than 380 new cases every day.
- (2) Further notes that over 2,000 Australians are living with MND, including more than 40 Tasmanians, with MND Australia reporting more than 2 people per day die from MND.
- (3) Further notes that “The Big Freeze 7 at the G” at the MCG fundraiser, coordinated by FightMND, in 2021 raised a record \$14.6 million allowing more funds to be made available for research into finding an eventual cure for MND.

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- (4) Thanks Neale Daniher, football great and former Essendon and Melbourne player - as well as coach of Melbourne Football Club from 1998 to 2007 - for his courage in living with MND and supporting fundraising efforts for research and advocacy.
- (5) Recognises that 21 June 2021 was MND Global Day, a global day of recognition for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) and MND—a disease that affects every country on the globe.
- (6) Congratulates and thanks both MND Australia and MND Tasmania, who for more than twenty years, have proved an effective advocate, promoted optimal care and support options for those living with MND and tirelessly raised funds for research into the cause and, ultimately, cure for MND. (29 June 2021)

16 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Hydro Tasmania has been named as a finalist for the 2021 Clean Energy Council Awards in the Community Engagement category for their COVID-19 Recovery Program to assist Tasmanian communities in overcoming the challenges associated with the pandemic.
- (2) Further notes that Hydro Tasmania's program had two phases: the Sustain phase reassured Tasmanians that essential energy generation would continue, while the Recovery phase partnered with community organisations to deliver initiatives to assist hard-hit sectors and vulnerable groups.
- (3) Acknowledges that the program enabled community organisations to help more people affected by the pandemic and delivered a range of positive community initiatives across Tasmania.
- (4) Further notes that the 2021 Clean Energy Council Awards will be presented on 13 July 2021 at the 2021 Australian Clean Energy Summit. (29 June 2021)
