Notices of Motion tabled prior to 17 March are published in the Motion Paper.

- 60** Mr *Bayley* to move—That the House orders the Government to table, before the end of the next sitting day, the total capital costs for the Tasmanian Player Carded Gaming Platform. (17 March 2026)
- 61** Ms *Haddad* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the Government's stated intention to abolish the Tasmanian Industrial Commission (TIC) and transfer its functions to the Tasmanian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (TasCAT).
 - (2) Recognises the TIC has long served as the independent arbiter of workplace disputes in Tasmania, particularly for public sector employees.
 - (3) Acknowledges the specialised industrial expertise held by TIC Commissioners, the Registrar and staff in resolving workplace disputes, making and varying industrial instruments, interpreting awards and agreements, and protecting the rights of Tasmanian workers.
 - (4) Expresses concern that the proposed abolition of the TIC risks the loss of this specialised and highly valued industrial expertise and institutional knowledge.
 - (5) Further notes that:—
 - (a) TasCAT is already facing significant resourcing pressures and increasing caseloads;
 - (b) at the federal level, industrial relations matters remain the responsibility of the Fair Work Commission rather than being absorbed into administrative tribunals; and
 - (c) other state jurisdictions also maintain their separate tribunals and commissions for these functions.
 - (6) Expresses further concern that public sector employees, unions, workers and other key stakeholders were not consulted prior to the Government's plans being revealed during the budget session.
 - (7) Calls on:—
 - (a) the Attorney-General to explain why he has failed to consult on this significant decision with workers, unions and other affected stakeholders;
 - (b) the Government to release their costings and planning on this proposed change; and
 - (c) the Government to reverse this decision and retain the TIC in full. (17 March 2026)
- 63** Ms *Dow* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) the Premier's announcement that the Department of State Growth will be dismantled and replaced by a new entity branded 'Building Tasmania'; and
 - (b) that the Government has confirmed that 250 jobs will be cut from the Department as part of this restructure.

- (2) Expresses concern that public servants and department heads were given little notice or detail about the proposed changes prior to the announcement.
- (3) Further notes that the Government has failed to provide clarity about which roles will be cut and how the restructure will affect the delivery of infrastructure, housing and economic development projects.
- (1) Expresses further concern that cutting 250 jobs risks undermining the state's capacity to plan and deliver major projects on time and on budget.
- (2) Calls on the Government to explain which roles will be cut, what modelling has been undertaken on the impact of the job losses, and how the restructure will improve outcomes for Tasmanians. (17 March 2026)

64 Mr *Willie* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) teachers in Tasmanian public schools have imposed a total and indefinite ban on administering the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests as part of escalating industrial action; and
 - (b) significant Commonwealth school funding arrangements increasingly rely on literacy and numeracy targets that are partly measured through NAPLAN results.
- (2) Expresses concern that the ban on administering NAPLAN tests risks disruption to statewide testing and may affect the data used to assess educational outcomes in Tasmanian schools.
- (3) Acknowledges that teachers, educators and support staff have raised serious concerns about workload, workplace conditions and unresolved enterprise bargaining negotiations.
- (4) Calls the Minister for Education to listen to her workforce, resolve the dispute, and ensure Tasmanian schools and students are not disadvantaged. (18 March 2026)

65 Mr *Willie* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) in 2025, the Liberal Government cut 12 TasTAFE courses, and 18 staff; and
 - (b) another \$45 million in cuts will be made over the next four years.
- (2) Recognises the critical role TasTAFE plays in training the workers that Tasmania's economy relies on, including in trades, agriculture, health, technology and the creative industries.
- (3) Acknowledges that Tasmania is currently facing skills shortages across a number of key industries and that strong vocational education and training pathways are essential to addressing those shortages.
- (4) Expresses concern that further cuts to courses or staff at TasTAFE risks reducing opportunities for Tasmanians to gain the skills and qualifications needed to build their future in this state.
- (5) Further notes that TasTAFE staff and students are facing significant uncertainty about the future of courses, jobs and training opportunities.
- (6) Calls on:—
 - (a) the Minister for Skills and Jobs to outline exactly where the \$45 million in savings will come from, including which courses will be cut and how many staff will lose their jobs; and
 - (b) the Government to ensure Tasmania's vocational education and training system is strengthened rather than weakened at a time when the state needs more skilled workers, not fewer. (18 March 2026)
