151 Mr *Ferguson* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) the findings of the Productivity Commission's interim report into horizontal fiscal equalisation and GST distribution;
 - (b) the Productivity Commission's conclusion that the 2018 GST reforms are not operating efficiently, effectively or as intended, and have weakened horizontal fiscal equalisation; and
 - (c) that a resolution was unanimously passed by the House of Assembly on 27 March 2026 that called for a return to full horizontal fiscal equalisation and the pre-2018 GST distribution arrangements.
- (2) Recognises that GST revenue is a critical component of Tasmania's finances, supporting the delivery of hospitals, schools, policing, roads and other essential public services.
- (3) Reaffirms Tasmania's long-standing position that the GST distribution system should return to the pre-2018 arrangements, which fully equalised the fiscal capacity of the states and territories.
- (4) Endorses the Productivity Commission's second preferred reform option, which would restore the pre-2018 system of full horizontal fiscal equalisation while allowing the Australian Government to provide direct and transparent assistance to jurisdictions affected by dominant-state effects.
- (5) Calls on the Australian Government and the Australian Parliament to restore a GST distribution system that fully equalises the fiscal capacity of the states and territories and to ensure Tasmania's capacity to deliver essential services is not diminished. (3 September 2026)

152 Mr *Vermey* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the fire at the Tungatinah Power Station in the Central Highlands and the significant damage sustained by the facility.
- (2) Acknowledges that there were no injuries and no evacuations required as a result of the incident.
- (3) Commends the efforts of the Tasmania Fire Service, Tasmania Police, State Emergency Service volunteers, Hydro Tasmania and TasNetworks personnel who responded swiftly and professionally to the emergency.
- (4) Recognises that at the height of the response, 25 crews and approximately 45 personnel were involved in managing this complex incident.
- (5) Further notes:—
 - (a) the impact on residents of the Tarraleah and surrounding communities who experienced power outages; and

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- (b) advice from Hydro Tasmania and TasNetworks that Tasmania's overall electricity supply remains secure, with sufficient generation and network capacity available to maintain reliable supply across the state.
- (6) Further recognises the importance of the state's hydro-electric assets to Tasmania's renewable energy system and economic prosperity.
- (7) Supports the continued work of the emergency services, Hydro Tasmania and TasNetworks to restore services, assess damage and facilitate the safe repair of the facility. (8 September 2026)

153 Mr *Di Falco* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises Tasmania's farmers, fishers, growers and producers for their significant contribution to our state, our economy and our regional communities.
- (2) Celebrates the outstanding quality and diversity of food and produce grown, raised, caught and made across Tasmania.
- (3) Acknowledges the hard work, resilience and dedication of Tasmanian producers, particularly during periods of challenging seasonal and market conditions.
- (4) Further recognises the important role Tasmanian produce plays in our state's identity and reputation both nationally and internationally.
- (5) Encourages Tasmanians to support local producers and businesses by choosing Tasmanian produce wherever possible.
- (6) Thanks Tasmania's farmers, fishers, growers and producers for the contribution they make to our state and proudly celebrates the people behind Tasmania's world class produce. (8 September 2026)

154 Ms *Finlay* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) Hydro Tasmania operates an ageing generation fleet, with many assets more than 40-60 years old;
 - (b) Hydro Tasmania's 2016 Asset Management Plan said its investment program represented the minimum sustainable level required to maintain prudent risk and warned there was little capacity for further deferral;
 - (c) the Asset Management Plan warned that reducing refurbishment and renewal investment would increase reliability, revenue and duty-of-care risks; and
 - (d) successive governments have received substantial dividends, tax-equivalent payments and other returns from Hydro Tasmania.
- (2) Orders the Government to table a formal response to Hydro Tasmania's 2016 Asset Management Plan, on or before 27 October 2026, with regard to:—
 - (a) the planning and delivery against the budget of Hydro Tasmania's risk management, asset maintenance, refurbishment and asset-renewal programs since 2014;
 - (b) the timeliness, scope and delivery of planned maintenance works during that period; and
 - (c) the impact of the Government's dividend policy on Hydro Tasmania's financial performance and capacity to deliver the Asset Management Plan. (8 September 2026)

155 Mr *Winter* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) TT-Line's Spirit of Tasmania replacement project has blown out by more than \$700 million;
 - (b) the Liberal Government has already bailed out the company with \$581 million in taxpayer money;
 - (c) TASCORP has:—
 - (i) told the Parliamentary Standing Committee of Public Accounts that TT-Line is expected to remain in debt until 2052;
 - (ii) said TT-Line's debt burden is likely to constrain its future capital investment; and

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- (iii) not yet concluded its assessment of TT-Line's long-term financial sustainability.
- (d) the Auditor-General found that TT-Line is insolvent; and
- (e) the Australian Securities and Investments Commission (ASIC) has sought updated information from TT-Line's auditor.
- (2) Calls on the Government to guarantee that passenger fares, vehicle fares and freight charges will not be increased to service TT-Line's debt.
- (3) Recognises that Tasmanians should not be forced to pay for the Liberals' mismanagement of the Spirit of Tasmania replacement project through higher fares, further bailouts, or cuts to services. (8 September 2026)

156 Mr *Winter* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Government:—
 - (a) has already committed millions of dollars of taxpayer funds to establishing TasInsure; and
 - (b) is yet to demonstrate how its revised TasInsure model will deliver the promised \$250 annual saving for households or 20 per cent saving for businesses.
- (2) Calls on the Government to publish, before committing further taxpayer funds to TasInsure:—
 - (a) independent modelling demonstrating how TasInsure will reduce:—
 - (i) household insurance costs by \$250 a year;
 - (ii) business insurance costs by 20 per cent; and
 - (iii) grocery prices.
 - (b) the full establishment and ongoing operating costs of TasInsure;
 - (c) the financial risks and liabilities borne by Tasmanian taxpayers; and
 - (d) the measurable benefits TasInsure will provide beyond existing government and private insurance arrangements.
- (3) Agrees that, after 13 years of Liberal waste, Tasmanians should not be asked to fund another expensive bureaucracy without proof it will deliver. (8 September 2026)

157 Mr *Winter* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP, promised Tasmanian households would save \$250 a year on their insurance through TasInsure;
 - (b) more than a year after making that promise, Tasmanians are still waiting for those savings; and
 - (c) the Government has abandoned its original plan for TasInsure to directly provide home and contents insurance.
- (2) Calls on the Premier to:—
 - (a) guarantee that TasInsure will still deliver the promised \$250 annual saving for Tasmanian households; and
 - (b) state when Tasmanians will begin receiving that saving. (8 September 2026)

158 Ms *Burnet* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) in 2018, the State Government issued Planning Directive 6, significantly curtailing local government's ability to regulate short-stay accommodation;
 - (b) the Tasmanian Planning Commission's assessment of the draft Directive flagged data availability shortcomings and recommended the Government monitor and review its impact on the housing market to inform future modifications; and
 - (c) in 2019, the Government introduced the Short Stay Accommodation Act 2019, stating it would improve understanding of short-stay accommodation's impact on the housing market.
- (2) Acknowledges:—
 - (a) the Government has failed to review the impact of short-stay accommodation on the housing market;
 - (b) the Act fails to provide effective data to monitor this impact at the local government level;

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- (c) whole-home short-stay accommodation properties requiring a permit have grown significantly, from 1,950 in June 2019 to 3,671 in June 2026; and
 - (d) this growth is affecting housing affordability and amenity in local government areas across the state.
- (3) Recognises Tasmania is in a housing crisis, with rental vacancies consistently below 1 per cent and rents surging beyond many residents' means.
 - (4) Calls on the State Government to urgently review the Short Stay Accommodation Act 2019 and the impact of short-stay accommodation on the housing market, invite public submissions, and table a final report with reform recommendations within six months. (8 September 2026)

159 Ms Burnet to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) the WorkCover Board Tasmania is a statutory body established under the Workers Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 1988, with important statutory functions including monitoring the operation and effectiveness of Tasmania's workers compensation scheme, and to make recommendations in relation to reform of the workers compensation system in Tasmania; and
 - (b) the 2021 Independent Statutory Review of the WorkCover Board comprehensively examined the Board's structure, governance, functions and relationship with WorkSafe Tasmania and recommended that:—
 - (i) the Board's Chair be independent of the Department of Justice; and
 - (ii) that consideration be given to increasing Board membership to accommodate the workload and a broader range of skills and expertise, including work health and safety, financial expertise and public administration.
- (2) Notes with concern that the Government has failed to act on those recommendations.
- (3) Further notes the WorkerCover Board is overseeing an extensive independent review of Tasmania's workers rehabilitation and compensation scheme, examining the scheme's legislative framework, governance, administration, performance and future direction.
- (4) Calls on the Government to implement the outstanding 2021 WorkCover Board Review recommendations concerning an independent Board Chair and expanded membership, skills and expertise within six months to ensure the Board is appropriately constituted to oversee and respond to the findings of the current scheme review. (8 September 2026)

160 Mr George to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) Animals Australia has lodged formal complaints with Biosecurity Tasmania alleging widespread, systemic and ongoing contraventions of sections 6, 7, 8 and 9 of the Animal Welfare Act 1993 arising from Tasmania's salmon farming industry, involving farmed Atlantic salmon and wildlife;
 - (b) the Animal Welfare Act 1993 applies to farmed salmon and affected wildlife, and that no special exemption from Tasmania's animal welfare laws exists for the salmon farming industry; and
 - (c) the allegations include mass mortality events involving millions of salmon, including:—
 - (i) four million premature deaths during 2025;
 - (ii) confinement in warming, low-oxygen and disease-prone waters;
 - (iii) failures to treat or humanely euthanise sick, injured and dying salmon, including live salmon placed in mortality bins; and
 - (iv) dolphin entanglements and deaths, seal confinement and injuries, and seabird entrapments and deaths.
- (2) Notes with serious concern records show these animal welfare issues have been known to the Tasmanian Government for years, without clear evidence of meaningful enforcement.

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- (3) Calls on the Tasmanian Government to ensure Biosecurity Tasmania immediately commences a formal, independent, comprehensive and properly resourced investigation into both complaints.
- (4) Calls for enforcement action, including prosecution, wherever evidence establishes offences.
- (5) Calls on the Minister for Primary Industries and Water to report at the House's next sitting on 27 October 2026 whether investigations have commenced, their scope and status, and any findings, enforcement action or prosecution decisions. (8 September 2026)
