

New Town, 31st May, 1900.

SIR, I HAVE the honour to submit the Annual Report of the New Town Charitable Institution for the year 1899.

Strength.

The number of inmates on the books during the year was-Males, 389; females, 265; total, 654.

The number in the Institution, including children, on 31st December was 361, or 65 less than in 1898.

The highest number of inmates at any one time was 428, and the lowest 360. Compared with 1898, this shows a decrease of 79 and 63 respectively. The average daily number during the year was 406.08, a decrease of 64.38 compared

Admissions.

The number admitted was 228, a decrease of 57 as compared with 1898.

Discharges.

The number discharged was 200, as against 198 in 1898.

Mortality.

The deaths during the year numbered 95, or 14.53 per cent., as against 131, or 17.35 per cent. in 1898. The average age of those who died was 74 years, the maximum age being 97, and the minimum 49 years. 30 averaged over 80 years of age, and the average age of the oldest 18 was 89 years. Fuller particulars under this head will be found in Return C. in the Appendices.

Expenditure.

The gross expenditure for the year was £4481 18s. 9d., or £1153 1s. 8d. less than in 1898. The gross expenditure for the year was £4401 10s. 9a., or £1155 (s. ca. less than in 1090. The receipts were £487 1s. 6d., as against 459 6s. 7d. in 1898. The net expenditure was £3994 17s. 3d., or £1180 16s. 7d. less than in 1898. The cost per head on gross expenditure was £11 0s. 9d., and on net expenditure £9 16s. 9d., or 18s. 9d. and £1 3s. 3d. less respectively than in 1898. The claim made against the Imperial Government for maintenance of paupers in the New

Town Charitable Institution chargeable to the Imperial funds was $\pounds 242$ 19s. 7d; if credit were taken for this amount, the net cost would be reduced to $\pounds 9$ 4s. 9d., or 6d. per diem.

Repairs.

Although a comparatively small sum has been expended upon repairs, yet extensive renovations and repairs have been executed by inmate labour, with the assistance of the working overseer and the warders. In the male depôt each ward has had an extensive overhaul, paint of woodwork burnt off and repainted, walls scraped and recoloured, window-frames cleaned and repainted, fireplaces repaired, &c. In the female depôt all the wards have been frequently swept down and paint-work renovated. The kitchen also has been renovated.

Fuel Supply,

In consequence of the infirm condition of the inmates, it was found necessary to purchase a steam engine and saw-bench to cut firewood for the Institution. It has proved very satisfactory and of great service.

Diet.

Extensive alterations have been made in the dietary scale of the inmates, and have given great The bill of fare is as follows :----satisfaction.

Breakfast each day.-Gruel, tea, bread.

Tea each day.-Bread and tea

Dinner. — Monday, Wednesday, Friday—Curried meat and rice, tea, and bread. Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday— Boiled meat, soup, vegetables, and bread.

Sunday-Irish stew, tea, and bread.

All hospital patients receive butter on Monday. Wednesday, and Friday, and jam on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday; and in the ordinary dining halls a basin of sweet dripping is supplied daily. In the hospital wards on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, the dinners are baked in rotation of wards. Milk is now issued in the tea to all inmates.

Garden.

Garden operations were carried on as far as possible; but through the declining strength of the inmates they have been somewhat curtailed ; nevertheless, the inmates succeeded in raising vegetables to the value of £36 15s. 4d. for their own use, while a quantity, valued at £27 17s. 6d., was sold to private individuals.

Religious Services.

The spiritual wants of the inmates have been well attended to by the Ven. Archdeacon Whitington, Rev. J. Babington, Rev. Father Gilleran, Rev. Father O'Reilly, and Rev. W. Perry. Hart. The Sisters of Charity, Flower Mission Ladies, Ladies' Visiting Committee, Christian Endeavour Seciety, Salvation Army, and many other friends, take an interest in the old folks, and spend hours reading to and talking with them, which is, certainly, a very great comfort to the aged.

Visitors.

The Institution throughout the year has been inspected by a very large number of visitors, who have recorded their remarks in the visitors' book, open in all cases to each visitor; and it is gratify, ing to know that their remarks have been favourable. It may be as well here to state that the Institution is open daily to visitors, and may be inspected at any hour.

Entertainments, Treats, &c.

Arthur; St. Mary's Brass Band; Filibusters' Band; Hobart Choral Society; St. John's Juvenile Minstrels; Butchers' Variety Co.; Mr. T. Mitchell and friends; Mr Shirley and friends; Miss Seager and friends; Messrs. Eltham, Lovett, and others; dramatic entertainments, New Town

Comedy Co.; Mr. Hudspeth and friends. On Christmas Day and Queen's Birthday the usual treat of plum-pudding and roast beef was given by the Government, and on the former day the Cascade Brewery Company and Mr. Blake generously contributed a hogshead of beer and a barrel of beer respectively; the Hon. J. Watchorn, M.L.C., sent 5 gallons of ale and pipes and tobacco for the sick; wine from an unknown doncr; the Hon. F. W. Piesse, M.L.C., £1 for extras. The Ven. Archdeacon Whitington's appeal for subscriptions to furnish tobacco for inmates was liberally responded to, and each inmate received two figs of tobacco, for which they expressed much gratitude.

Honorary Dentist.

On the 10th July Mr. Robert Sharp, dentist, Collins-street, was appointed honorary dentist to the Institution, and has devoted much attention to his duties.

Lying-in Home.

Full particulars under this head will be found in the annexed Return marked E., showing a decrease of 10 cases as compared with 1898.

Library.

I wish to record the gratitude of the inmates to the proprietors of the Mercury, Tasmanian News, Church News, and Monitor for free copies of their publications during the year; also the Committee of the New Town Library for Illustrated London News; the Hon. F. W. Piesse, M.L.C., and Mr. G. R. Miller, for various parcels of newspapers.

Staff.

On the 1st January, 1899, I was appointed to the charge of the Institution, and Mr. J. Connolly was promoted to Assistant-Superintendent. One wardsman was dismissed, and Mr. T. Porter appointed in his place.
