



### REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1893.

---

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management, giving particulars regarding the government, condition, and cost of the above-named Hospital for the year 1893.

1. Messrs. Edgell, Farrelly, and Dr. Hallowes retired from the Board of Management during the month of December, and were unanimously re-elected.

2. Thirteen Board and fifty-three Committee meetings were held during the year.

3. The number of cases of typhoid fever treated in the Hospital during the past year is forty-nine (49), as compared with fifty-one (51) so treated in 1892, a considerable diminution as compared with the numbers so treated in 1890-91. The deaths from typhoid fever in 1893 numbered four (4).

The number of cases of diphtheria shows an increase of twelve (12) on the previous year, the numbers being, for 1892 fifteen (15) cases with two (2) deaths, and for 1893 twenty-seven (27) cases with one (1) death.

The need of a separate building for the treatment of cases of diphtheria, scarlatina, and septic diseases has been severely felt. A separate building will not only enable the treatment to be carried out more safely, but also more economically. A site has been selected and approved, and plans prepared for a suitable building.

4. The work done by the Honorary Dental Surgeons has been a valuable help to the poorer classes; no less than thirteen hundred and fifty-nine (1359) cases were treated during the past year. It is gratifying to note that many of the operations are of a conservative character.

Regulations and curriculum for the guidance of students of the Dental Department have been approved and adopted by the Dental and Hospital Boards.

5. Regular courses of lectures and demonstrations have been delivered during the past year by the Surgeon-Superintendent on Physiology, and by the Lady Superintendent on Nursing.

Examinations have been held on the subjects lectured on, and in the practical work of the Wards.

During the year seven (7) nurses have gained the certificate as "Trained Nurse," in accordance with the regulations prescribing the course's and attendance on lectures, &c.

The course of training has now been extended to three years, which will materially contribute to the thoroughness of the training and the efficiency of the nursing staff.

The health of the nursing staff has been exceptionally good, and quite justifies the demand made last year for additional accommodation, which resulted in the renovation and furnishing of Weymouth's house, thus allowing the re-arrangement of the Nurses' Home.

6. The attention of Wardens of Country Districts should again be called to the practice of sending chronic invalids to the Hospital instead of sending them direct to the Depôt for Invalids.

7. The Board of Management desires to express its sincere regret at the loss sustained by the death of Messrs. A. W. Birchall and B. P. Farrelly, who for many years faithfully served as Members of the Board, and took a personal interest in the welfare of the inmates of the Hospital at all times.

8. Mr. R. L. Parker was elected a Member of the Board of Management, taking the place of Mr. A. W. Birchall, deceased.

9. Dr. Charles Parker was elected House Surgeon on November 14th, *vice* Dr. Jermyn, resigned. Mr. Pousty was elected Honorary Galvanist.

10. The Surgeon-Superintendent, on the recommendation of the Board of Management, was relieved of the duties of Health Officer for the Port of Launceston in July last.

11. The following improvements have been carried out:—

Wood and coal-shed has been erected.

Garden laid out and vegetables planted.

Clay bank has been repaired and retained by a stone wall.

Wards 7 and 9 and Sisters' Room have been renovated and repainted.

The new Operating Room has proved to be a great boon, and in every way satisfies the requirements of the Institution.

2. The quality of the provisions supplied to the Hospital has on the whole been good.

13. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff.

During the year several performances were given by private individuals and companies for the benefit and entertainment of the patients and staff.

14. The Hospital is indebted to the pupils of the Launceston Ladies' College for a handsome donation to the Children's Ward.

15. The thanks of the Board are also due to the members of the Honorary Consulting Staff for their attendance when called upon at the Hospital.

16. Two medical students have attended the practice of medicine at the Hospital during the past year.

17. On the whole the Hospital and its management may be looked upon as in a more complete state than at any previous period since it has been under the care and control of the Board.

18. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
