

ANNUAL REPORT for 1876.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Report of the Launceston General Hospital for the year 1876.

The past year has been characterised by an alteration in the working of the Institution, in consequence of the resignation of Dr. J. L. Miller as Chief Medical Officer, and the appointment of Dr. R. W. Murphy, formerly House Surgeon, as Surgeon Superintendent, with a supplementary staff of Honorary Medical Officers, consisting of Drs. Wigan, Maddox, and Hardy, the change having taken effect on the 1st of July last.

The proceedings of the past year, otherwise than in this respect, have been uniformly quiet, and nothing has transpired worthy of report.

The numbers of admissions slightly exceeded that of the previous year, but the daily average number in the Hospital, viz. 56%, was a fraction less.

There was a considerable diminution in the number of Outdoor Patients, mainly due to refusal to supply many cases applying who were well able to pay for advice and medicine elsewhere,—information as to their means having been obtained through the instrumentality of the Superintendent of Police.

There was likewise an increase in the number of Patients admitted paying fees.

There were admitted during 1876, 418 Patients, of whom 295 were males and 123 were females.

There had remained at the close of the previous year 50 Patients, so that the total number treated in 1876 was 468 Patients; and of these 352 were discharged cured or relieved, 65 died, and 51 remained under treatment.

The average age of those who died was 50 years, and many of them were admitted in a state beyond any treatment, others again only surviving a few hours after admission.

Of the Patients admitted, 98 were Self-supporting, 4 were wholly or in part chargeable to Imperial Funds, and 366 were Colonial Paupers.

The sum of £249 14s. was received from or on account of Self-supporting Patients during the year.
