

## *REPORT of the BOARD OF EDUCATION for the Year 1866.*

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*To His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, C.B., Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Island of Tasmania and its Dependencies.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY..

1. WE, the Members of the Board of Education, Tasmania, have the honor to submit the following Report of our proceedings during the past year.

2. *Number of Schools in operation.*—At the termination of the year 1865, there were 102 Schools in actual operation. The total number of distinct children at any time on the Rolls for that year was 8294; the average number on the Rolls from month to month was 5357; the average daily attendance was 4074. During the year 1866 there were 101 Schools in operation; *the total number of distinct children on the Rolls* for the year was 8198; *the average number on the Rolls* from month to month was 5159, and *the average daily attendance* 3930.\*

3. *Average Number of Pupils per School.*—Taking the total number of distinct children appearing at any time on the Rolls for the year 1866 as 8198, we have for the 101 Schools in operation an average for each School of 81·16; while, if we take the average number only appearing on the Rolls as 5159, we get an average for each School of 51·08, and taking the average daily attendance as 3930, the average number of children in daily attendance at each School appears to be 38·91. The average daily attendance as compared with the average number on the Rolls amounted to 76·17 per cent.

4. As compared with the year 1865 the number of Schools has decreased by one; the total number of children on the rolls by 96; the average number on the rolls by 198; and the average daily attendance by 144. This decrease is chiefly observable in the Districts of Hobart and Glamorgan: in the former case it may be fairly explained by departures from the Colony; in the last it is attributable to temporary difficulties which have since been either removed or are in course of removal.

5. In the Districts of Launceston, Selby, and Brighton there has been a considerable accession of children.

6. *Progress of Schools.*—The progress of the Schools conducted in connection with the Board since the establishment of the present system of Public Instruction is shown in the following Table:—

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\*(I.) By the *total number of children on the Rolls during the year* is meant the gross aggregate of distinct individual children whose names have appeared on the School Rolls at any time during the entire year.

(II.) By the *average number of children* on the Rolls during the year is meant the mean or average of the several numbers appearing on the Rolls throughout the year, and which, in point of fact, vary from week to week and from month to month.

(III.) By the *average daily attendance* of children during the year is meant the mean or average of the numbers found in *actual attendance*—not on the Rolls merely, but present in their classes from day to day during the year.

10. *Schools brought into operation, and Schools closed, in 1866.*—Three Schools were opened during the year; namely,—

Bridgenorth, District of Selby.  
White Hills, District of Selby.  
Bracknell, District of Westbury.

The Schools at Wynyard and Breadalbane were reduced in consequence either of the small attendance of Scholars or the inefficiency of the Teachers; two other Schools were closed temporarily for want of Teachers, but have since been re-opened.

11. *Building Grants.*—We have appropriated the sum of £262 13s. 4d. in aid of the erection of School-houses at the following places:—

The above grants are chargeable against the Loans Bill, 23 Vict. No. 41. In addition to the sums expended or appropriated as above, we have paid £410 6s. 5d. out of the General Vote for Education towards the repair of School-houses.

12. *Grant for Education*.—The total sum expended out of the Parliamentary Vote of £12,000 for Education for the year 1866 amounted to £11,337 18s. 0d. The appropriation of this money is exhibited in detail in Appendices B. and C., and may be briefly recapitulated as follows:—

In addition to the above amount the sum of £1070 18s. 11d., chargeable against the Establishment, was paid on account of Administration and Inspection.

13. *Cost of Instruction*.—The School Fees paid in aid of Teachers' Salaries amounted to £3887 12s. 2d., being at the rate of 19s. 9½d. per head for each child in daily attendance. The

average amount of Government aid per Scholar is returned at £2 17s. 7½d. per head. Adding the cost of Administration and Inspection, the charge will be £3 3s. 0½d., or 1s. 5¼d. less than the cost of the previous year. The gross sum divided by the average number on the Rolls from month to month would amount to £2 8s. 0½d., divided by the total number of Scholars on the Rolls at any time during the year it would not exceed £1 10s. 2¾d. per head.

14. *Income of Teachers.*—We have received Returns of the emoluments of 98 Teachers who were employed during the whole year, from which we have collected the following results:—

The above deductions have reference to the income which is derivable by Teachers in connection with their Schools, and do not include sums received for private tuition.

15. *Exhibitions to Superior Schools.*—In the month of June we caused an examination to be held of Candidates for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools; and, on the recommendation of the Revds. A. Davenport and R. D. Harris, the Examiners, we awarded Exhibitions of the value of £16 13s. 4d. per annum, tenable for four years from the 1st July, 1866, to each of the undermentioned Candidates:—

John T. M'Donald, aged 10 years, Public School, Elizabeth-street, Launceston.

Alfred C. Bonner, aged 12 years, ditto.

Henry Trowbridge, aged 12 years, ditto, Sandy Bay.

John Sparrow, aged 12 years, ditto, Elizabeth-street, Launceston.

16. The Examiners, in closing their Report, observe: “A scrutiny of the work, as exhibited in detail in the Table of Marks, will show that the results of this Examination are in a high degree satisfactory. Comparing them with those of former years, we find a number of marks obtained by the foremost competitor larger than any assigned heretofore. Or, to contrast them with the results of last year only, it appears that the first ten boys then obtained each, on an average, 456 marks: the average number of the first ten this year is 653; the highest number being then 720, as compared with 923 in this year's Table. The increase in the number of competitors is also very striking. A larger number offered themselves than at any previous Examination, and more than twice as many as at that of last year. These results, in our opinion, reflect much credit on the Masters whose Scholars have so honorably distinguished themselves.”

17. The Report of the Inspector of Schools is annexed. In consequence of Mr. Stephens's long and serious illness no Schools were visited between the months of August and November, 1866, when we made arrangements by which our Secretary was enabled to devote a portion of his time to the work of inspection. Mr. Burgess was thus employed from the 14th November to the 24th December, during which period he examined and reported upon 27 of the Schools situate in the Northern and Eastern Districts of the Colony, and also, in conjunction with the Rev. R. D. Harris, conducted the Annual Examination of the Pupil Teachers. We desire to bear testimony to the zeal and efficiency with which Mr. Burgess performed those duties.

*GENERAL REPORT upon Inspection of Public Schools in Tasmania, during a portion of the Year ended 31st December, 1866, by T. STEPHENS, Esq., M.A., Inspector of Schools.*

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*Hobart Town, 3rd June, 1867.*

GENTLEMEN,

I HAVE the honor to present my General Report for part of the year ended 31st December, 1866.

During the months of January, February, March, part of May, June, July, and part of August, I paid 71 visits to Schools in operation. My range of travelling during this period extended over three-fourths of the settled portion of the Island, embracing the whole of the Northern Districts, from Circular Head on the north west (distant about 280 miles from Hobart Town) to Scottsdale on the north east; the Midland Districts; the East Coast as far south as Little Swanport; and various parts of the Districts lying more immediately around Hobart Town. The distance travelled, including journeys undertaken for the purpose of reporting on applications for the establishment of Schools, was a little over 2000 miles; and the time occupied in travelling, examination of Schools, or other public business during my absence from headquarters, exceeded an average of 9 hours per diem. In the latter half of the year a long and serious illness interrupted my work, and prevented me from carrying out the arrangements which I had made for the inspection of a number of Schools in the Southern Districts.

I might on this occasion be excused, under any circumstances, from entering at length into the topics which are usually embraced by an Inspector's Report; but, had no other impediment intervened, I could have done little more than repeat what has already been stated in my former Reports. Upon reviewing the notes taken during the past 6 years, I am unable to trace any appreciable improvement in the real work of education. So far as external evidences of progress are concerned, there is no ground for dissatisfaction. The increase in the number of Schools and the attendance of children have kept pace, as far as could reasonably be expected, with the increase and dispersion of the population. The good Schools, a very small minority, have for the most part maintained their former degree of efficiency, and here and there an inferior Teacher has given place to a competent successor. But looking at the condition of Public Education as a whole, I cannot yet report that, either as regards the internal economy of Schools, or the qualifications of Teachers, the progress which has been made since the reduction of the Grant is entitled to be regarded as satisfactory. It is not to be expected that the small salaries which are now usually offered will attract persons who are qualified for the work by previous training or education; nor is it surprising, however much the fact may be regretted, that of those who now offer themselves as candidates for employment the majority are unable to pass satisfactorily an examination in the elementary branches of instruction. What I chiefly deplore is that so little is done by Teachers after appointment, either to remedy defects in their own education, or to bring their Schools up to a reasonable standard of efficiency. This defect may be readily traced to the absence of those inducements which are ordinarily provided to stimulate exertion and progress; and the obvious remedy is the introduction of a system of classification of Teachers, based upon the principles which are indicated by the existing Rules and Regulations. The value of a Teacher's work differs from that of other trades and professions in its being more essentially dependent upon voluntary exertion and inherent zeal; and the experience of all countries has abundantly proved that a graduated scale of salaries, proportioned to the various grades of efficiency, and providing for the promotion and increased remuneration of the industrious Teacher, is the most important feature in any system of Public Education.

I have now examined under the new Programme of Instruction the whole of the Public Schools, with three or four exceptions, and am glad to report that it is likely to answer the end which I had in view when I recommended its introduction to the Board. Some few of the Teachers, either through negligence or ignorance, had neglected to attend to the instructions laid down for their guidance, but the majority have gladly welcomed them as furnishing definite information respecting the various degrees of proficiency which are expected to be maintained in the several classes of a Public School. Attention to the Programme will not supply the want of necessary qualifications in the Teacher, or bring a School into a state of efficiency, but in connection with other measures it may materially aid in accomplishing these objects, and in remedying the chief defects which now exist in our educational system.

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*REPORT of the Deputy Inspector of Schools for 1866.*

Hobart Town, 27th August, 1867.

SIR,

1. I HAVE the honor to submit, for the information of the Board, the tabulated results of Inspection work performed by me in the Northern, North-eastern, and Eastern Districts of the Colony, during the months of November and December, 1866.

2. Twenty-seven Schools were visited in all. Twenty Schools were examined according to standards; the remainder were cases of simple inspection. The number present at examination was 1038: in nearly every instance it was in excess of the average daily attendance, a fact which speaks well for the general accuracy of the School Registers. 596 children, exclusive of Infant Classes, were presented for examination, of whom 464 passed in Reading, 357 in Writing, and 210 in Arithmetic.

3. The following table exhibits the number examined in each standard, and the per-cent of passes in each of the three elementary subjects:—

5. These tables tell their own tale, and I am unwilling to comment upon them until I shall have had the experience of another year. Arithmetic, it will be seen, is the weakest subject.

6. Ten years and upwards have elapsed since I was actively employed in the visitation of Schools. Comparing my present with past impressions, I cannot but congratulate the Board on the general improvement which has taken place, both as regards discipline and instruction. Recollecting, as I do, the deficiencies of so many of the former Teachers, I record my testimony to the higher qualifications, the improved tone, and steady conduct of those now in charge of our Primary Schools, and to the active and faithful fulfilment of their duties. Here and there there may be exceptions; but as a body they fully deserve, and in most instances, I am happy to add, they enjoy, in their several Districts the confidence and respect of all whose good opinion is worth having. My own relations with them have been of the most agreeable character. I thank them for the kind and cordial spirit in which they invariably received me, and for the consideration they showed to my inexperience in working out for the first time the new system of examination.
