

#### REPORT BY THE COMMANDANT.

#### Head Quarters, Hobart, 14th June, 1893.

SIR, I HAVE the honour to submit the Annual Report.

#### Land Defences.

Since the date of my last Report (11th July, 1892), the water laid on to the electric light engine-room has been carried through the communicating gallery into the Alexandra battery. The 5-inch B.L. gun in the Alexandra redoubt was dismounted for alterations to the recoil cylinder. The work has now been completed by the battery artificer, and the gun remounted, and working very satisfactorily.

A four-roomed cottage has been erected by Mr. Garth on his land between the Alexandra battery and the Derwent. If this land is not purchased by the Government, steps should be taken to prevent the erection of any buildings that would in any way interfere with the fire of the guns between the battery and the sea. In the event of war it would be necessary to remove this building. In case of a premature explosion at practice the building is in a dangerous position.

The Military Adviser (Colonel Harman, R.A.,) having recommended that the two 6-inch B.L. guns mounted in the Alexandra battery should not be fired until chase-hooped, I, on the 16th December, 1892, and on the 15th January, 1893, recommended that they should be sent to England for this purpose. The guns are now practically out of action.

In my Report for 1891 I drew particular attention to the fact that the land in rear of the Kangaroo Bluff battery was being fenced off into allotments, and in my 1892 Report that building material was being deposited on one of the allotments. I recommended—" On no account should any more buildings be allowed to be erected in rear of the battery, and this land should be purchased by the Government without delay." A two-storied brick house has now been erected within one hundred yards of the battery.

With regard to the Defence of the Tamar, I regret that, as there is an unexpended balance for this purpose, the recommendation of the Australian Defence Committee has not been carried out. (See Commandant's Report, 11th July, 1892.)

#### Torpedo Boat and Whitehead Torpedoes.

Report from Capt. Parker, R.N., marked A., will be found in the Appendix.

#### Permanent Artillery.

I regret that, in consequence of financial depression and the large reduction in the amount voted for defence purposes, a reduction in the numbers of the Permanent Force was necessary, but trust that, as soon as the circumstances of the Colony admit of it, the strength of the corps will be increased.

On the 10th September, 1892, the Government House and Magazine Guard was discontinued, and the duties taken over by the Territorial Police.

Sergeant-Major Robertson, R.A., returned to England in March last, on completion of his engagement.

During the past year 3 N.C. officers and 10 gunners were discharged, and one gunner deserted. The present strength of the corps is 1 quartermaster-sergeant, 1 sergeant, 1 corporal, 1 bom-

bardier, and 9 gunners.

#### Launceston Artillery.

The strength of this corps on the 1st June, 1893, was 85 of all ranks (an increase of 13 since 1st June, 1892), and cadets, 5.

On the 31st December, 1892, seventy-four of all ranks, and 16 cadets, classified as efficients.

The usual quarterly inspections have been held. On each occasion the attendance was excellent, the turn-out smart, and the drill good. I cannot speak too highly of the feeling of *esprit de corps* that exists, and the zeal displayed by all ranks in the performance of their duties.

On the 5th November, 1892, the corps proceeded by steamer Wybia to Low Heads to carry out the annual gun practice, and encamped there until the 9th. The usual guards were mounted, and the ordinary duties in Camp strictly carried out.

On Sunday, the 6th, Divine Service was held in the Parish Church.

On the 7th the corps was exercised at gun-drill, &c., and working parties sent out to erect targets, &c., for the practice.

On the 8th and 9th practice was carried out. 10 rounds of common shell and 10 shrapnel were fired from each of the 12-pr. B.L. guns, and the same number of rounds from the 25 inch R.M.L. guns.

On the afternoon of the 8th the men were exercised with M.H. ball in battle-firing.

At 3 P.M. on the 9th the main body re-embarked in the s.s. Wybia for Launceston, leaving a party to strike Camp and embark guns, &c.

Total strength in Camp-3 officers, 1 warrant officer, 7 sergeants, and 46 rank and file.

Surgeon-Major Gutteridge, Launceston Rifle Regiment, was in medical charge.

Since the date of my last Report twelve cadets have been transferred to the corps.

#### Southern Tasmanian Artillery.

The strength of this corps on the 1st June, 1893, was 69 of all ranks. On the 31st December, 1892, 53 were classified as efficients.

The annual training of the corps in the Forts commenced on the 1st October and concluded on the 18th November, 1892. One battery attended on Monday and Thursday evenings, and the other on Tuesday and Friday. On alternate Saturday afternoons both batteries attended. The hours occupied in the evenings were from 7.30 to 10 o'clock, and on Saturday afternoons from 2.30 to 6 o'clock. The Alexandra and Bluff Forts were used on alternate weeks for evening drills, and, on Saturdays, the Alexandra. The men received pay at the rate of 2s. for each evening and 3s. for each Saturday afternoon, but no gunner could earn more than  $\pounds 2$ . Officers received no pay. The object of the training,—viz., to get the men together continuously at drill in the Forts,—was fully realised.

The usual quarterly inspections were held. The musters were fair. The men turned out well, and the drill was good. All ranks take an interest in their work.

The Commanding Officer (Major Evans) is as zealous and energetic as ever in the performance of all duties and in his endeavours to recruit the corps up to its establishment, but it is 153 under. (See Reports for 1891 and 1892).

Bombardier Ashton A. St. Hill was appointed a Provisional Lieutenant on the 17th November, 1892.

#### Tasmanian Torpedo Corps.

Strength on the 1st June, 1893, 66 of all ranks. Classed as efficients on the 31st December, 1892, 59.

The usual quarterly inspections have been held. The attendance has been fair, and the turnout good. The corps has greatly improved in handling their arms and company drill, and the signallers are fairly expert in transmitting and receiving messages both with lamps and flags.

The annual training commenced on the 15th October, and was concluded on the 10th December, 1892.

#### Tasmanian Rifle Regiment.

Strength on the 1st June, 1893, 140, including the Garrison Band. Efficients for the year ending 31st December, 1892, including Garrison Band, 106.

The usual quarterly inspections have been held. The musters on each occasion were only moderate. The corps is composed chiefly of young men, and it is necessary that company officers should devote more time to the training of their men, both on the drill ground and rifle range.

There has been an improvement in the attendance and drill during the last two months, and the corps is now making satisfactory progress, and a better feeling appears to exist in all ranks. Recruiting has also improved, 20 men having enrolled since the 1st January, 1893. The abolition of an annual camp of exercise is most detrimental to the infantry, as it is impossible to train an infantry soldier to his work in the field with night drills only, and daylight parades can only be obtained in the cities when payment is made for attendance.

#### Launceston Rifle Regiment.

Strength on the 1st June, 1893, including the Band, 115. Only 67 of all ranks, including Band, were classed as efficients on 31st December, 1892. I regret having again to draw attention to the large number of non-efficients in this Regiment. I trust the Commanding Officer has now weeded out all paper men, and that the result of the present year's efficiency will be more satisfactory.

Great difficulty is experienced in getting the majority of men in this corps to attend on the rifle range for the Musketry Course, and company officers are inclined to leave this most important part of an infantry soldier's training entirely to the Instructor, on the plea that they cannot spare the time. It is desirable that, before gentlemen accept commissions in the Force, that they feel confident that they can devote the requisite time for the satisfactory fulfilment of the duties they undertake.

The usual quarterly inspections have been held, the muster on each occasion poor; those that did attend turned out smartly, and the drill was, as a rule, good. The Cadet Corps attached to this Regiment now numbers 50; 33 rendered themselves efficient last year.

Changes in Officers :-- Captain R. J. Sadler to Unattached List. Provisional Lieutenant A. J. Douglas resigned.

#### Auxiliary Force.

Strength on the 31st December, 1893, was 1260; of this number 939 made themselves efficient for 1892.

To be classed as an efficient a man must (in addition to Musketry Course) attend 14 drills.

The average number of drills attended by efficients for 1892 was 23.45. The detachments at Hastings and New Norfolk have been disbanded, the Don and Cleveland detachments discontinued, and men enrolled transferred respectively to Devonport and Campbell Town.

Applications have been received for the formation of new detachments, but with the reduced amount voted it is impossible to entertain them. I am strongly of opinion that any increase to numbers, or detachments, should be made along the line of railway, and not in out-of-the-way Districts, expensive to administer and difficult to mobilise in time of necessity.

The Force now consists of forty-one detachments, scattered all over the Colony, and the further proposed reduction in the Defence vote for 1894 will, if carried out, necessitate the discharge of two Instructors.

The fifth Class of Instruction for Officers and N.C. Officers commenced at Hobart on the 16th May, and terminated on the 26th. Eight Officers and 30 N.C. Officers attended, many at personal inconvenience and pecuniary loss. The Officers received (with the exception of one, who, having attended two previous classes, received nothing) 5s. per diem and travelling expenses; N.C. Officers, travelling expenses only, and were quartered and rationed in Barracks.

The strictest discipline was maintained, and all submitted cheerfully and willingly to it. I cannot speak too highly of zeal for their work displayed by all.

Two Officers and 17 N.C. Officers passed the necessary examination for confirmation in their appointments, and one N.C. Officer passed the qualifying examination for appointment as Lieutenant. Major Wallack was placed in command. I desire to record my thanks to him for the excellent work performed, and his indefatigable endeavours to render the class as efficient as possible. The two Instructors, Sergeant-Majors Welsh and Costello, are deserving of commendation for the cheerful and willing manner in which they devoted their spare time in imparting extra instruction to all deserving it. Captain Jones, Quarter-master Auxiliary Force, had charge of the Commissariat, and gave every satisfaction.

I held two very successful daylight inspections, viz. —Midland Rifle Company, near Ross, on the 14th December, 1892, 64 of all ranks being present, and Mersey and West Devon Companies at Devonport East on the 1st April, 1893, 80 present. Major Wallack's report on the class of instruction will be found in the Appendix. (No. 64.)

#### General.

On the 10th April, 1893, circulars were sent out to officers, corps, and detachments notifying that "the alarm" would be given within the next three weeks. At 1 o'clock P.M. on the 20th April, telegrams were despatched to all country corps, and at 7 P.M. the alarm signals were given at Hobart and Launceston. At 8 o'clock P.M. on that night 908 men under arms, and of that number (exclusive of Hobart) 448 were paraded at railway stations. The result was very satis-The Auxiliary Force responded most enthusiastically to the call. factory.

A Church Parade was held at Hobart on Sunday, 21st May. The Rev. J. B. Woollnough officiated. The Church Parade at Launceston had to be postponed in consequence of the inclemency of the weather. The usual Queen's Birthday Parades were held at Hobart and Launceston on At Hobart 300 (including 24 Hutchins School Cadets) were present; at Launceston the 24th May. 187 (including 32 Cadets).

Martini-Henri ball ammunition was issued free to both Hobart and Launceston Police for Musketry Course, 1892.

From the Staff Adjutant to the Commandant.

#### Head Quarters Office, Hobart, May 27th, 1893.

SIR, I HAVE the honor to submit the following Report on the Class of Instruction for Officers and Non-commissioned Officers of the Auxiliary Force, which terminated at the Barracks yesterday.

The hours of parade were 9 A.M. to 12 noon, 2·15 P.M. to 4·15 P.M., and 7·30 P.M. to 9 P.M.

The Non-commissioned Officers were, as usual, provided with accommodation in the Barracks, three rooms being set apart for them.

The Class commenced on May 16th; when 3 Officers and 6 Non-commissioned Officers commenced work; others kept on arriving till the 19th; the total number being 8 Officers and 30 Non-commissioned Officers.

The course of instruction was carried out on the same lines as in previous Classes, and all ranks were well grounded in Squad and Company Drill, Manual and Firing Exercises, Theoretical Principles of Musketry, Guard Mounting, &c.

Lectures were given in the evening on Discipline by the Commandant, and on Drill, Musketry, and the Regulations of the Force, by myself.

The strictest discipline was enforced, and the cheerful way the members of the Class submitted to it was most satisfactory. The average attendance of each member at the class was ten days,—a great improvement on past years.

On Thursday, the 25th instant, I marched the Class to the Rifle Range, and put all ranks through the new Individual Attack and the Section Attack, as laid down in the Imperial Musketry Instructions for 1892. Both practices were carried out in a satisfactory manner.

On the 24th the Class took part in the Review held in honor of Her Majesty's Birthday.

I forward herewith Returns which show the work done by the members, and which also give the dates of the arrival and departure of each.

Two Officers and seventeen Non-commissioned Officers passed satisfactory examinations for confirmation in their respective ranks. I enclose certificates for issue to them.

In conclusion, I desire to bring to your special notice the excellent work in connection with this Class performed by Sergeant-Major Welsh and Sergeant-Major Costello. These warrant officers, in addition to the long hours on parade, devoted nearly the whole of their off-time to coaching up the Non-commissioned Officers for their examinations.
