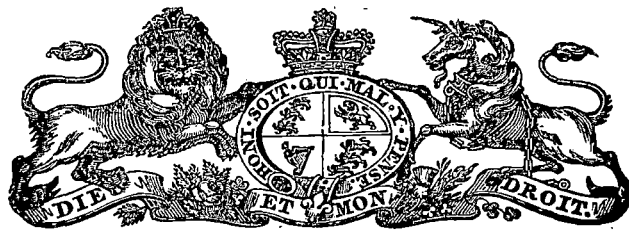

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

1. The Council of the University of Tasmania, in conformity with the provisions of "The Tasmanian University Act," has the honour to report for the information of Your Excellency in Council the Proceedings of the University for the year 1893.

Buildings.

2. As stated in the Annual Report for 1892, an Act was passed in the last month of that year vesting in the University the property previously known as the High School of Hobart; thereupon steps were taken to repair and improve the buildings so as to adapt them for use in University teaching, and to provide a Physical Laboratory and apparatus for instruction in Experimental Physics. This necessary work was completed by the time notified as the first day of the First Term, viz., March 15th.

Lectures.

3. On that date the Lecturers, who had arrived and reported themselves to the Council in January, and had held several preliminary meetings and consultations, commenced work with six students, a number which compares favourably with that obtained by either the Melbourne or the Sydney University at starting, and even for some little time afterwards.

In the month of April Mr. W. F. Ward was appointed Instructor of Chemistry, and gave throughout the year instruction to two Undergraduates on the subjects of the First Year Course in the Laboratory of the Hobart Technical School, which has been recognised by the University.

The number of Lectures given at the University was a little more than forty, weekly, and the number of Students in the Third Term at Hobart was nineteen.

Launceston Students.

4. Besides lecturing to the Hobart Students, the Lecturers also visited Launceston, one every week, to give assistance and direction in the course of their studies to Students preparing themselves there for University Examinations. These visits were made to serve a double purpose. On the evening of arrival each Lecturer delivered one of a course of Extension Lectures, and on the following day met the University Students, of these the number in the Third Term was nine.

Extension Lectures.

5. The subjects of the two courses of Extension Lectures given during the year were:—
 “The Literature of the Age of Anne,” by the Lecturer in Classics and English Literature; and
 “Electricity, Past, Present, and Future,” by the Lecturer in Mathematics and Physics.

The average attendance was as follows:—

English Literature Course—Hobart, 45; Launceston, 25.

Electricity Course—Hobart, 65; Launceston, 9.

Donations.

6. The inauguration of University teaching afforded an opportunity to the gentlemen whose names are below mentioned of giving practical expression to their sympathy with and appreciation of the object in view by the following donations:—The Hon. W. Crosby, £100; the Hon. J. Gibson, two sums of £50 each; the donation in each case being applicable to the Building Fund. Mr. F. M. Young gave a steam engine, valued at £120, for use in the Physical Laboratory; and Mr. E. S. Ross lent a valuable dynamo of his own construction.

Sir R. Dry Prize.

7. Regulations were passed during the year to the effect that there should be appropriated annually, from the income of the Dry Scholarship Fund, a sum of £10 for a prize, to be called “The Sir Richard Dry Prize,” which should be awarded, under the conditions laid down in the regulations, to the candidate who, at the Senior Public Examination, passed the best examination in modern languages, including English.

Giblin Memorial Fund.

8. The Committee of the Giblin Memorial Fund having during the year transferred all the available funds to the Council of the University, it is under contemplation to apply them in some similar way in order to perpetuate, in connection with the higher education of the Colony, the name desired to be held in memory.

The Leake Bequests.

9. A Committee of the Council has held several meetings with a view to formulating a practical scheme for securing to the University the moneys bequeathed by the late Mr. Arthur Leake, amounting to £30,000, for promoting the study of Painting, Sculpture, and Astronomy. Owing to the absence in England of one of the trustees of the will, Mr. C. J. Barclay, they have been precluded from making any definite progress in the matter. Mr. Barclay having now returned, draft proposals have been submitted by the Committee to him and his co-trustee, Mr. C. H. Elliston, for their consideration.

The Senate.

10. During the year the Senate held a number of meetings for the revision of its Standing Orders, and for the consideration of the several Statutes, Regulations, and Amendments thereof submitted for approval by the Council.

The dates of the meetings were:—March 10th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 17th, 28th; April 13th and 20th; May 4th; July 6th and 24th; and November 1st.

The Rev. R. D. Poulett-Harris, M.A., whose term of office expired on the 31st October, was for the fourth time elected Warden.

The Council.

11. His Honor the Chief Justice, Sir W. Lambert Dobson, having consented to be re-nominated for the office of Chancellor, was, on the expiration of his term of office in September, 1893, unanimously elected Chancellor for a further term of three years from the 21st of that month.

On the 16th January the Rev. George Clarke was unanimously re-elected Vice-Chancellor.

During the year the following vacancies occurred and were filled up as below stated.

Mr. F. J. Young having, to the regret of the Council, resigned his seat, was succeeded by Mr. H. C. Kingsmill, Government Meteorologist, on an election by Members of the Legislative Council; and in the place of Mr. W. F. Ward, who vacated his seat on being appointed University Instructor in Chemistry, Mr. R. M. Johnston, Government Statistician, was elected by the Senate.

The following seven Members, whose term of office, under Section 3 of the “Tasmanian University Act,” expired on the last day of the year 1893, were re-elected, (Nos. 1-4) by the Members of the Houses of Parliament, and (Nos. 5-7) by the Senate, on the 20th September and 7th October respectively:—

Junior Public Examination.

15. The Third Examination under the Regulations for the Junior Public Examinations was held at Hobart and Launceston in the month of June, under the following Examiners:—In English, Latin, and Greek, Mr. W. H. Williams, M.A.; in French and German, the Rev. R. D. Poulett-Harris, M.A.; in English History, Dr. W. J. Brown, M.A., LL.D.; in Algebra, Geometry, and Elementary Science, Mr. A. M'Aulay, M.A.; in Geography and Arithmetic, Mr. C. J. H. Chepmell, M.A.; in Drawing, Mr. W. H. Jones.

Out of forty-one candidates, of whom eleven were girls, thirty-five passed; thirteen being placed in the First Class, and twenty-two in the Second, as shown in the Appendix.

Senior Public Examination.

17. The Third Examination under the Regulations for the Senior Public Examination began at Hobart and Launceston on Thursday, the 8th, and ended on Friday, the 16th June. The Examiners were:—In English Language and Literature, Latin and Greek, Mr. W. H. Williams, M.A.; French and German, the Rev. R. D. Poulett-Harris, M.A.; English History, Dr. W. J. Brown, M.A., LL.D.; Algebra, Geometry, Plane Trigonometry, and Applied Mathematics, Mr. A. M'Aulay, M.A.; Geography and Arithmetic, Mr. C. J. H. Chepmell, M.A.; Elementary Chemistry, Mr. W. F. Ward, A.R.S.M.; Physical Geography and Geology, Mr. A. Montgomery, M.A.; Drawing, Mr. W. H. Jones.

Twenty-eight candidates presented themselves, of whom twenty-three succeeded in satisfying the Examiners. Of these, as will be seen from the Appendix, nine were placed in the First Class, four in the Second, and ten in the Third.

On the recommendation of the Board of Examiners prizes were awarded to the following candidates in the subjects specified:—

The "Sir Richard Dry" prize, of £10, for Modern Languages, including English, was awarded to Maude Ethel Leggett.

University Scholarships.

18. On the Report of the Board of Examiners for the Senior Public Examination, two University Scholarships, each of the value of £50 per annum, tenable for three years from the 1st July, 1893, were awarded, as follows:—One to Harold Sprent Nicholas, for the best examination in the subjects of Groups I. and II., and one to Ernest William Turner for the best examination in the subjects of Groups III. and IV.

Examinations for Degrees.

19. In the month of December there were held First and Second Examinations for the Degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science, and First Examination for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws. The Examiners were the Lecturers of the University, with the following coadjutors:—Professor H. Laurie, LL.D., and Monsieur Maurice, B. ès L., both of Melbourne, who examined in "Logic" and "French Language and Literature" respectively.

The examination took place in the principal hall of the University Buildings under the superintendence of the Chairman of the Board of Lecturers.

Eleven undergraduates presented themselves, of whom three were from Launceston, one being a lady; all except two satisfied the Examiners. The detailed Class List is appended to the Report.

Statutes and Regulations.

20. The under-mentioned Regulations and Amendments and additions to Statutes and Regulations having been made by the Council and approved by the Senate, were allowed and countersigned by the Governor in Council, agreeably to the provisions of "The Tasmanian University Act," on the dates below specified :—

Finance.

22. The sum of £4000 fixed by Law for payment out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund to the Council of the University was, as stated in last year's Report, reduced by special legislation to £3000 for the year 1893. The financial outlook of the Colony has occasioned the adoption of similar measures again, and the consequent reduction of the appropriation for the year 1894 to the same sum of £3000. The Council can only express its regret at the necessity for the measure and its hope that it may be found possible, when framing the Estimates for 1895, to leave the provision of £4000 per annum, made in "The Tasmanian University Act," intact.

The audited Account of the Income and Expenditure of the University is appended to the Report.
