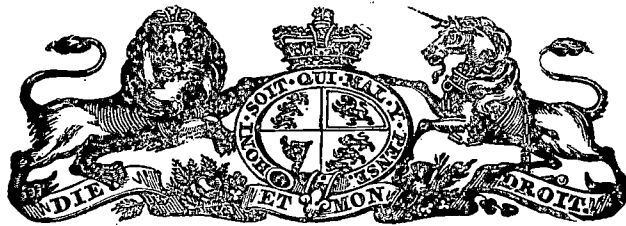

ANNUAL REPORT of the BRICKFIELDS PAUPER ESTABLISHMENT for 1874.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward to the Government the Annual Report of the Brickfields Pauper Establishment for the year ending December 31st, 1874.

The expenses are a little higher than the previous year, owing to the increased price of meat, &c.

With regard to the labour performed by the Inmates, I have to state that the work from Colville to Stoke and adjacent streets is finished. The men are now engaged in Park-street, and some progress has also been made in this locality: at the same time the work of the Institution has not been neglected.

The conduct of the Inmates on the whole has been good.

His Excellency the late Governor and other gentlemen have supplied newspapers and a few books for the Library, and also visited the Institution, to whom thanks are due for their kindness.

Religious instruction has been imparted by the different Ministers of Religion to the Inmates in a regular and satisfactory manner.

In January, 1874, the Board of Management were superseded by a Board of Visitors, but no meeting took place; and only one visit made by a Member during the year, who recorded in the Visiting Book as follows:—

“The discipline of this Establishment is, in my opinion, as thoroughly maintained as it is possible; and it would be difficult to find reasonable fault in the general management.
