

TASMANIAN HIGHWAY LIGHTS IN BANKS' AND BASS'S STRAITS.

Correspondence between the Honorable the Colonial Secretary and the Marine Board on the Re-adjustment of the Contributions from the adjacent Colonies to the Maintenance of the Highway or Ocean Lights situated on Tasmanian Territory.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Treasurer, and ordered by the House to be printed, 8 August, 1865.

I HAVE the honor to forward to you herewith, for the information of the Marine Board, a copy of the Report of the late Inter-colonial Conference on Australian Highway or Ocean Light-houses, together with a copy of a letter I have addressed to the Colonial Secretary of New South Wales on the same subject, dated 12th ultimo.

The figures added in ink in the right hand margin of Tables A and B, appended to the Report of the Conference, represent the estimated aggregate Tonnage of Shipping employed in the trade of the several Colonies passing the Tasmanian and other Light-houses during the year 1863.

These figures have been compiled by the Department of Trade and Customs of Victoria from Returns furnished for the use of the Conference.

I also forward you a copy of a Tabular Statement which I have caused to be prepared, showing the relative proportions of the cost of the maintenance of the Light-houses therein named justly chargeable to the several Colonies of Victoria, New South Wales, and Tasmania, calculated upon the estimated aggregate Tonnage of each Colony benefited by those establishments.

I intend to propose to the Governments of the several Colonies above indicated, that the Tasmanian Light-houses should for the future be maintained by joint contributions based upon these estimates of Tonnage for 1863.

The Government would be glad to receive from the Marine Board any observations they may feel disposed to offer upon a subject of so much importance to the Shipping and Commercial interests, as well as to the Public Revenue of the Colony.

SIR, I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th ultimo, enclosing copy of Report of the Australian Conference on Light-houses, copy of a letter addressed to the Secretary of New South Wales, and statement of "Proportionate Cost" of certain Light-houses to be defrayed by the three Colonies, New South Wales, Victoria, and Tasmania.

All these documents have been carefully considered by the Marine Board; and, in compliance with the request of the Government, I beg to make the following observations as the result of their deliberations on the important questions referred to in your letter.

The statement of the "proportionate cost for the maintenance of certain Light-houses," namely, Kent's Group, King's Island, Swan and Goose Islands, proves, when the calculations are carried a step further, that if the Resolutions adopted by the Conference of February, 1864, had been carried

into effect, the saving to Tasmania on the Light-houses above named would have amounted to upwards of £1300 per annum,—an amount sufficient to warrant the Marine Board in reducing by at least thirty per cent. the heavy charge levied on sailing vessels for Light dues. From this amount, however, would have to be deducted the sum which Tasmania would be called upon to pay Victoria and New South Wales as her contribution towards the maintenance of the Light-houses on Cape Otway, Wilson's Promontory, Gabo, Cape Schank, Cape St. George, and South Head.

It is impossible for me to calculate exactly what the contribution of Tasmania would be, because I am not aware what these Light-houses cost annually; but a calculation sufficiently accurate for all practical purposes may be arrived at by assuming that each of these Light-houses costs the same as King's Island, (£861), by far the best in Tasmania. I know some of them cost more, others may cost less. On this basis the amount to be paid by this Colony on account of the five Light-houses named is £151 5s. per annum, as shown by enclosed statement marked A., so that the net saving to Tasmania by the plan agreed to at the Conference would be £1217 11s. Id.

I enclose another statement marked B., showing the part of this sum to be charged to Victoria and New South Wales respectively; from which it will be seen that the share of the former is \pounds 1121 18s. 6d., while that of the latter is only \pounds 95 12s. 7d.

It is, therefore, a matter of not much importance in a monetary point of view whether New South Wales consents to any new arrangement that may be proposed by the Government or not; but it is of great importance to establish the principle that the cost of maintaining the chief Lighthouses in the Straits shall be borne on equitable proportions by the Colonies deriving benefit from the same.

It is satisfactory that "the Government of Victoria fully admits the injustice of the existing arrangements," and "is willing to accede to any reasonable suggestion for the re-adjustment of the proportionate contributions of the Colonies to the support of the Light-houses now under consideration." The scheme of distribution proposed by the Conference held in Melbourne in February, 1864, is the most equitable that could be devised; but is open to this objection, that it is too complicated to work well.

I have therefore to submit for the consideration of the Government another scheme of distribution, which is equally fair and just to all the Colonies interested, and has the advantage of being simple and easy of application.

This scheme is explained in the statement enclosed marked C.

You will observe that I suggest two modes of apportioning the cost of the Light-houses in Banks' Straits, (Goose Island and Swan Island): by the first, Tasmania will have to pay a fair proportion of the cost of these Lights; by the second, she will be called upon to pay twice as much as she ought to do.

I recommend the Government to adopt the second plan; for this reason—that the additional contribution thereby imposed upon Tasmania is more than an equivalent, and may be set off against her share of the cost of the Light-houses on Wilson's Promontory, Cape Schank, &c., which she would have to pay if the scheme of the Conference had been carried out.

Sir,

SINCE writing to you on the 1st instant regarding the Light-house question, it has occurred to me that the "Scheme of Distribution" (marked C.) which was submitted for the consideration of the Government may be improved in one respect.

In that scheme it is proposed that Tasmania shall not contribute any thing towards the maintenance of King's Island Light, but shall contribute twice as much as her share towards the Lights on Goose and Swan Islands. I now suggest that it would be better if the additional contribution to be borne by Tasmania, in consideration of her being relieved of all charges in respect of Lights in Victoria and New South Wales, should be made on account of King's Island Light, and not on account of those in Banks' Straits, (as shown in annexed Statement).

I RETURN the Correspondence relating to the Light-houses which you were kind enough to send for my perusal.

It is satisfactory to know that the Government of Victoria admit that "the sum contributed by Tasmania towards the maintenance of the four Lights alluded to by you is excessive."

Two objections are taken by the Government of Victoria to the scheme submitted by you for the equitable settlement of the question. The most important of these objections is, that the scheme is one-sided. While Tasmania is to be relieved of a large portion of the expense of four important

Lights on her own territory, no provision is made with regard to her contribution towards the Lights in Victoria and New South Wales named in the margin.^{*} The objection is unanswerable. The amount, however, at issue is very triffing, as will be seen by a reference to my letter of 1st February.

The other objection is, that the Government of Victoria should not be asked to agree to any scheme to which the other Colonial Governments are not parties. I have no copy of the "Proceedings of the Conference of 1864," and am therefore unable to ascertain how, or to what extent, the interests of Victoria are affected by South Australia being left out of the question. But as New South Wales has been asked to contribute to our Light-houses in the same proportion as Victoria, it can be no reason for the latter to refuse doing what is admitted to be right because New South Wales may, perhaps, refuse to do the same. If New South Wales will not contribute more than she has hitherto done, the loss falls, not on Victoria, but on this Colony.

From 1858 to 1863 the amount paid by Victoria towards the maintenance of Tasmanian Light-houses was £3247 13s. 9d. According to your scheme the amount would have been £11,209 0s. 2d. Assuming, therefore, that your scheme is right in principle, this Colony, during six years, has paid about £7000 more than she ought to have done in the maintenance of Light-houses,—to say nothing of the fact that she contributed several thousand pounds more than her fair share towards the building of King's Island Light.
