

## PENAL ESTABLISHMENT, LAUNCESTON.

REPORT FOR 1875.

Laid upon the Table by Mr. Crowther, and ordered by the Council to be printed, October 4, 1876.



Penal Establishment, Launceston, 25th September, 1876.

SIR

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith the following Returns, showing the cost of maintenance, &c. of the Penal Establishment, Launceston, for the year ending 31st December, 1875:—

- No. 1.—Return showing net cost per head of all Prisoners, Invalids, and Children in the Establishment to be £17 10s. 8d. It is impossible to distinguish the net cost in each department, owing to the arrangements of the buildings.
  - No. 2.—Return of the number of Women and Children received and discharged.
    - No. 3.—Return of the number of Prisoners received and discharged at the Gaol for Males.
- No. 4.—Return of the number of Prisoners received and discharged at the House of Correction for Males.
- No. 5.—Return of the number of Prisoners, with their respective sentences, remaining on the 1st January, 1875, and received during the year.
  - No. 6.—Return showing the number and average age at death of Women.
  - No. 7.—Return showing the number and average age at death of Male Prisoners.
  - No. 8.—Return of Boots and Shoes made and repaired in the Male House of Correction.
  - No. 9.—Return showing the quantity of Linseed raised for medicinal purposes.
  - No. 10.—Return showing the quantity of Produce raised for feeding purposes, &c.
- No. 11.—Return showing the quantity and value of Milk and Vegetables raised in aid of rations. Out of the amount of £60 12s. 9d. debited to the Invalid Depôt only £49 5s. 11d. has been actually charged.
- No. 12.—Return showing the number of Male Prisoners employed at the Invalid Depôt during the year. It will be observed that no credit has been taken for this item; my reason for not doing so being that I considered the labour supplied by the Invalids to the grounds attached to this Establishment equivalent for the value of the same. This is also my reason for not taking credit for the whole of the Milk and Vegetables, as shown in Return No. 11.

Officers.—The conduct of the Officers has been satisfactory.

Prisoners.—The conduct of the Prisoners generally has been fair. No serious offence was recorded during the year. In only eight cases was it necessary to bring prisoners to trial before the Police Magistrate for breach of the regulations.

Visitors.—I have the gratification to annex a copy of a minute recorded by His Excellency the Governor on the occasion of his first visit to the Establishment, and I also append the Minutes of the Sheriff and Visiting Justices, these being the only ones obtained during the year, as no Private Visitors' Book was kept.
