

TASMANIAN DEFENCE FORCE.

REPORT BY CAPTAIN PARKER, R.N.

The Barracks, Hobart, 7th April, 1896.

IN forwarding the Annual Report on the Tasmanian Defence Force for the year 1895, I beg to inform you that the total strength on the 31st December was 1234 officers and men, of whom 850 (68.8 per cent.) had made themselves "efficient" for the year (Appendices A. to D.)

Tasmanian Permanent Artillery.

Strength on 31st December, 10 of all ranks. One gunner, whose time expired in December, was discharged, as it was found that his place could be filled by a man from the Store Department, who was available in consequence of the amalgamation in April of the Military Stores with the Defence Department.

Launceston Artillery.

Strength on 31st December, 81 of all ranks. Between 8th and 11th November, the usual Camp of Exercise of this Corps was held at Low Heads under Major Hon. G. Collins; 49 of all ranks were present, and were exercised in the Infantry Attack and in shell-firing from the 12-pr. B.L. and 7-pr. M.L. guns; 45 rounds of common and shrapnell shell were fired, at a range of 2725 yards. The practice was excellent, notwithstanding a high wind on the afternoon of 9th. On the 10th a Church Parade was held, at which the Rev. J. T. Wilson officiated. I inspected the men and attended the firing on 11th, and the men returned to Launceston that evening.

men and attended the firing on 11th, and the men returned to Launceston that evening. Dr. Louis Saenger Holmes, of Launceston, kindly volunteered his services as surgeon on this occasion, and was on 25th November appointed Surgeon to the Corps.

Southern Tasmanian Artillery.

Strength on 31st December, 56 of all ranks. The annual training of this Corps was carried out under Major Evans on five Saturday afternoons between 5th October and 30th November. Practice took place on 2nd November, from Alexandra Battery, and on 16th November from the Bluff Battery. 33 rounds were fired from the 5in. B.L., 7 in. R.M.L. 80-pr. R.M.L. and 6-pr. Q.F. guns. The firing was very good, and the men worked with a will, and were attentive to their duties. I attended on 5th October, and at the firings on 2nd and 16th November.

Mr. Theophilus Hastings Parker was appointed a provisional Lieutenant of this Corps on 24th April, and Lieutenant A. A. St. Hill, having passed the necessary qualifying examinations for a commission in the Imperial Army, was on the 28th December gazetted Lieutenant of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment.

Tasmanian Torpedo Corps.

Strength on 31st December, 58 of all ranks.

This Corps during 1894 was at a very low ebb, but it has increased 45 per cent. in numbers during 1895, and is rapidly improving.

Mr. Arthur Charles Parker was appointed provisional Lieutenant on 15th July. Lieutenant Parker has raised a "Whitehead" section to take over the torpedo boat and to work her. With Ministerial sanction, charge of the boat was given to him on 28th March, 1896. Some few drills have already taken place, and I hope in my next Report to be able to say that the Colony possesses an efficient officer and crew for the torpedo boat.

Tasmanian Rifle Regiment.

Strength of this Corps on 31st December, 100 of all ranks. Surgeon-Major E. O. Giblin, M.D., died on 27th December, and was buried with military honors.

- Launceston Rifle Regiment.

Strength of this Corps on 31st December, 149 of all ranks, including 40 cadets.

On the 9th, 10th, and 11th November a Camp of Exercise was held by Major Martin for this Regiment, at Strathroy, near Launceston; permission to use the ground was given by C. Grubb, Esq. A total of 116 of all ranks attended. They marched from Launceston at 2.30 P.M. on 9th, and prepared their camp. On 10th a Church Parade was held, at which the Rev. C. G. Wilkinson officiated. On 11th, Company Drill, and the Infantry Attack, with blank cartridge, were practised, and in the evening the men marched home. 33 men of the Auxiliary Force, detachments from the Dorset, Meander, and West Devon Companies, under Captain C. J. L. Smith and Lieutenant F. K. Miller, also attended, and did good work; Lieutenant Colonel Room (R.), also gave his services. A cyclist section of the Launceston Rifle Regiment, under Lieutenant Chapman (the first in Tasmania), was organised for this Camp, and was very useful. I inspected the men in Luunceston and was very useful. I inspected the men in Launceston, and marched out to Camp with them.

Lieutenant G. D. Gould was promoted to the rank of Captain on 24th June, and Mr. Thomas Kildea was appointed provisional Lieutenant on 4th November.

Auxiliary Force.

Strength on 31st December, 787 of all ranks.

During the year every detachment of this Force has been visited, most of them twice over, by either myself or Major Wallack. I have made 33 visits during the year, Major Wallack made 27. The two Instructors, Sergt.-Major Hardy, R.E., and Sergt.-Major Martini, L.A., have made between them 52 visits, making a total of 112 visits to 36 detachments. Major Wallack held a class at Launceston between 2nd and 14th December for Officers and N. C. Officers, at which 19 attended, and 7 received certificates of competency. A detachment of 33 men, including two officers, attended at the Strathroy Camp on 9th, 10th, and 11th November, and a detachment from Brighton -Lieutenant Gatty and 11 men-were present at the sham fight at Hobart on November 18th.

There have been no deaths or resignations of officers during the year. One officer, Lieutenant J. B. Wardlaw, who had formerly belonged to the Force, has rejoined it. During the year the Kingston detachment had been disbanded, and the Mathinna detachment (Cornwall Co.) was raised by Lieutenant Wardlaw, who was appointed to command it on 7th August. I append a table giving my opinion of the state of the various detachments (Appendix E.)

General.

Church Parades were held at Launceston on 19th May, and at Hobart on 17th November.

The Queen's Birthday Review was held at the Barracks on 24th May, in presence of His Excellency the Governor, the usual Parade Ground in the Domain being occupied by the Exhibition Buildings. The four usual Quarterly Inspections were also held.

On 18th November a Sham Fight took place at Alexandra Battery. All the Southern Division were present, and a small detachment of Auxiliaries under Lieutenant Gatty. The general idea was that a hostile cruiser was off the mouth of the Derwent, able to put on shore 100 men, and that she would try to pass Alexandra Battery during the diversion caused by the attack of her landing party. The cruiser was represented by a small steamer. Major Evans, S.T.A., com-manded at Alexandra, Captain Henry, T.T.C., commanded the attack. Lieut.-Col. Davies, Major Wallack, and Captain Bennison were Umpires with the various parties, and I was the Umpire-in-chief. It was held by the Umpires that the cruiser was discovered by the search-lights, and that the land attack on the Battery failed. It is regretted that a casualty occurred here, Corporal Gore, T.A.E. being wounded in the one by a side first tee part him. T.A.F., being wounded in the eye by a rifle fired too near him.

I have arranged to give two drills per quarter to the Volunteer Force, North and South, in addition to the Quarterly Inspection. These drills were carried out in February, April, July, August, and October.

Guards were provided-At Hobart, 31st January, opening of the Federal Council. At Launceston, 2nd February, to receive His Excellency the Governor of New South Wales. At Hobart, 15th May, at the closing of the Exhibition. At Hobart, 24th May, Queen's Birthday At Levee. At Hobart, 25th June, opening of Parliament.

The Torpedo Boat was placed in the water on Sth December. Four very satisfactory runs were made in her in 1895, one being to New Norfolk and back, and four have been made since. She is now hauled up to repaint her bottom. She is in perfectly good condition, and all the better for the use made of her.

On 1st April the Military Stores were handed over to the Defence Department, and since that date I have carried out the duties of Superientendent of Stores and Inspector of Explosives in addition to the Defence work.

Discipline.

The discipline of the Force has been very good. One serious crime only came before me. A Sergeant in charge of a detachment of Auxiliary Force allowed the public money in his command to be distributed among the men as shooting prizes, taking nearly a quarter of it himself, and neglected to inform me of the facts when I ordered him to return the funds of the corps. I reported the matter, with the result that the Law Officers took proceedings, and the man is now a bankrupt.

The casualty to Corporal Gore was due to disobedience of orders; and as the man who actually inflicted the injury could not be identified, I punished the section to which he belonged. But men get excited even at sham fights, and this accident was largely due to want of practice.

get excited even at sham fights, and this accident was largely due to want of practice. There has been difficulty during the year in getting back uniforms and other Government property from men who have left the Force. This has occurred mainly among the Auxiliary Force, and is due partly to a mistaken notion that the uniforms, &c. become the property of the men to whom they are issued. To correct this I caused an Order (Appendix F.) to be read to the men, showing them the true state of the law. But it was, nevertheless, necessary to direct two prosecutions for detaining Government property, one at Derby, the other at Huonville. In both cases the magistrates convicted, and at Huonville a fine was inflicted. It is hoped this will put a stop to the evil.

There has been no case either of drunkenness or insubordination during the year, and the minor offences—viz., men improperly dressed, not saluting officers, &c.—would disappear in a very short time if the men were more together in larger bodies.

On the other hand, I find a most excellent spirit in the Force. The men are most willing, and only want encouragement and practice to become a very efficient body. They give up their time to go to Camps; in some cases they pay money out of their own pockets to keep themselves while at Camp, the Government allowance not being enough to provide food. In the Auxiliary Force it is not at all uncommon for men to walk 4 or 5 miles to attend a drill. Men are sometimes found who walk 10 miles, and on one occasion at Avoca a man attended 11 drills out of a possible 15, walking a distance of 16 miles each way to do so.

Finance.

I was directed when framing the Estimates for 1895 to provide only "for keeping up a nucleus of the Force for one year." This was done, and for two years—1895 and 1896—the cost of "Land Defences" has been only £3367 per annum. But it is not possible any longer to go on with this small sum. The Auxiliary Force have had no capitation allowance for three years, and by Regulation their clothing is only supposed to last for two. The cost of ammunition to the men has lately been reduced from 6s. 9d. per 100 rounds to 5s. per 100 rounds, an excellent step, but the difference in price must be met from the Estimates. The Tasmanian Rifle Association has now been without a Government grant for two years, and is at the end of its funds. Also, one thing I have learnt during my period of command is, that nothing does the men so much good and brings them under control so quickly as getting them together in a Camp. I find this can be done very cheaply if the Camps are not too large and are local. Three or four small Camps at different spots are cheaper, and seem to answer better than one large Camp.

To provide for these various events I have asked for $\pounds 4000$ for the service of Land Defences for 1897. This is an increase of only $\pounds 633$ on the present Estimates, and I trust it will be granted. The Estimates are annexed.

HEAD QUARTERS ORDER.

At one convenient Parade every Six months, Officers Commanding Corps and Detachments are to read publicly to those then assembled some portions of the following Acts of Parliament; viz :--49 Victoria, No. 16 53 Victoria, No. 36 57 Victoria, No. 18 Officers Commanding Corps and Detachments are to read The Acts governing the Defence Force.

Officers Commanding Corps and Detachment are at liberty to choose such portions of these Acts as they may think best, but the following Sections are always to be read in the order given :-

Act 49 Victoria, No. 16 : Section 4. Act 53 Victoria, No. 36 : Sections 19, 23. Act 49 Victoria, No. 16 : Sections 43, 45, 84, 85. It is to be explained to the men that the clothing and accourtements issued to them do not become their own property, and that for wearing them at improper times, or for neglecting to return them to the Commanding Officer before leaving the District, or at the end of their service, they are liable to a fine not exceeding £5.

After one warning thus given, Officers Commanding Corps and Detachments are to fine their men Ten Shillings for the first offence against these Sections, giving them a certain reasonable time to pay the fine. If it is not paid they are then to proceed against them under Section 86 of the Act 49 Vict. No. 16. These prosecutions, however, must take place within Six months of the offence.

The reading of these Acts is to be conducted with due ceremony and respect, the men being under arms and brought to attention; and for the purposes of this Order the first Six months will commence on 1st July, 1895.
