

ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Management for the Year 1895.

SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honor to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during the past year.

Sixteen Board and eighty-nine Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

The Board of Management desires to express its sincere regret at the loss sustained by the death of Dr. E. O. Giblin, who for eight years was a member of the honorary medical staff of the Hospital.

The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff by the frequent donations of fruit, flowers, books, periodicals, and the daily papers.

The absence of a special operating-room in connection with the Hospital has long been experienced, and regarded by the Board as a defect, but, owing to the want of funds available for the construction of such a building, the Board was powerless in the matter. By the munificent bequest of the late Mr. Joseph Solomon of £1000 to the Hospital Board of Management the means were provided, and the required special accommodation for the performance of surgical operations is now nearly completed.

On 14th December, 1894, the Government completed an arrangement with the Hospital Board of Management whereby the Board agreed to accept the sole control and management of the Institution "for a lump sum of £5875 and such fees as could be collected." The result of this arrangement cannot prove else but most gratifying to the Government, inasmuch as this year's expenditure is nearly £1100 below the average expenditure of the past 15 years, and the Board of Management is pleased to be in a position to hand back to the Government the sum of £321, being the unexpended balance of the Grant-in-aid.

During 1894, 1185 In-door patients were treated; this year 1188 cases were treated; the number of deaths in each year being the same, viz., 93. The average stay of patients in Hospital was 25 days, as against 26 days in 1894. Of the 1188 cases treated in the Hospital a large percentage came from the country districts, and out of the total number treated 950 were found to be pauper cases.

In the Out-patients' department a marked decrease is noticeable in the total number of attendances during the year: in 1894, 5699 cases were dealt with; this year they amounted to 5054, being a decrease of 645. The diminution in the number of orders and prescriptions received at the dispensary from the Government Medical Officer, Dr. Smart, is equally worthy of remark, as the following figures will show:—In 1894, 1384 orders and 3354 prescriptions were received, as against 634 orders and 1046 prescriptions this year.

The Board of Management has much pleasure in recording their appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Officers have discharged their onerous duties during the year, and as will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been successfully performed.

The Board also desires to record its high appreciation of the continued zeal and ability with which Dr. Smart has conducted the multifrom duties devolving on him in his capacity as Chairman of the Board and Visiting Committee, his valuable services now extending over a period of 18 years.

In 1894 the gross annual cost of each occupied bed was £74 14s. 9½d., and for this year £74 6s. 0½d. The actual cash collections in 1894 amounted to £670 15s. 10d.; the collections for this year amounted to £544 5s. 9d., being a decrease of £126 10s. 1d. The gross expenditure for the year 1895 as compared with 1894 shows that a saving of £275 11s. has been effected, notwith-

standing the fact that this year duty has been paid on all imported goods, &c. required for the Hospital service. The fees remaining on the books for collection at 31st December amounted to £74 15s. It has not been necessary to recommend any fees for remission this year.
