TASMANIA

228 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that the 156th Annual Westbury Agricultural Show, the third oldest continually run Show in Tasmania, was held on Saturday 9 November 2019, at the Westbury Showground.
- (2) Appreciates the Westbury Show emphasises a family-friendly, community-oriented event with plenty of fun activities on offer, including displays of alpacas, cattle, yard dogs, show dogs and other animals, horse-riding, arts and crafts displays, exhibitions, music and entertainment, pet parade, pet lamb and dog jumping competitions, taiko drummers, bullock team demonstrations, the ever popular kids corner with all activities free and gourmet food options.
- (3) Further recognises the generous donation of \$3,297.00 to the 2019 Westbury Show's charity of choice the Royal Flying Doctors Service.
- (4) Acknowledges the Show's continuing appeal can be attributed to the support of the community and the hard work and effort of volunteers, including the Show committee headed by President Kevin Lattin, Co-Secretaries Shannon Barwick and Deb Matthews and other key personnel.
- (5) Congratulates the Westbury Agricultural Society and its members, organisers, donors, judges, exhibitors, sponsors, volunteers and the local community that helped to create another terrific event this year. (12 November 2019)
- **229** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises the 39th Tasmanian Craft Fair was held from 1-4 November 2019 and hosted more than 100 stallholders, exhibitors and vendors in the picturesque town of Deloraine, attracting an estimated 20,000 visitors.
 - (2) Notes that this annual event provides an opportunity for artists and craftsmen and women from across Tasmania, the mainland states and overseas, to showcase their artisanal work.
 - (3) Congratulates the 2019 award winners:—
 - (a) Premiers Award for Excellence:-
 - (i) First Prize -- Billy Tarrant, custom guitar marker;
 - (ii) Second Prize Matthew Sloane;
 - (b) Best Working Exhibit Award David R Herring Timber Products;
 - (c) Stand Presentation Award Map Journal (Susan Stevens);
 - (d) First Time Exhibitor Award John Stewart Ceramics; and
 - (e) Providores Award Smoked Salt Tasmania (Miffy McTaggart).
 - (3) Acknowledges the support of the 1,600 volunteers, local community and visitors that helped make the 2019 Craft Fair the most successful to date.
 - (4) Further congratulates the Craft Fair Director Lesley Dare, the Rotary Club of Deloraine including President Stephanie Johnston, and other committee members on

their tireless efforts to deliver this iconic event in regional Tasmania. (12 November 2019)

- 231 Mr *Tucker* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that Tasmania is well-prepared for the upcoming bushfire season.
 - (2) Recognises that a crucial element of this bushfire preparedness is an appropriately funded fuel reduction strategy, such as the Hodgman majority Liberal Government's \$55 million Strategic Fuel Reduction program, which has reduced relative bushfire risk across Tasmania.
 - (3) Notes that, in 2011, the Labor-Green Government cabinet deferred a decision on a considerably expanded burning program, which left Tasmania with no strategic fuel management plan.
 - (4) Further recognises that by not acting back then, Labor and the Greens allowed fuel loads across Tasmania to increase, thereby allowed bushfire risk to increase. (12 November 2019)
- 232 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises the significance of the recent visit of two of China's icebreakers, 'Xue Long' and 'Xue Long 2' to Hobart, as it cements Tasmania's status as the world's leading Antarctic gateway for both sea and air.
 - (2) Acknowledges our State has a unique competitive advantage due to proximity to Antarctica and the Hodgman Liberal Government is capitalising on this to grow the value of this important sector.
 - (3) Notes our Antarctic sector currently employs more than 850 Tasmanians and value adds an enormous \$186 million into the Tasmanian economy each year.
 - (4) Further recognises international icebreaker port calls can each inject up to \$1 million into our economy, and importantly reinforces our place as a global Antarctic gateway.
 - (5) Further notes Tasmania's growing reputation as a port call for the Antarctic exploration sector also supports an array of international scientific partnerships and attracts hundreds expeditioners from across the globe.
 - (6) Further recognises Tasmanian small businesses are providing a wide range of goods and services to visiting Antarctic vessels, including local shipping agents, providores, welders and engineering firms.
 - (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government for their commitment to ensure Antarctic collaborations continue to grow, create more jobs and benefits our economy by supporting the Tasmanian Polar Network, the Integrated Marine Observing System and the Southern Ocean Observing System, the Commission for the Conservation of Antarctic Marine Living Resources. (12 November 2019)
- 233 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that Labor's political games help no one.
 - (2) Recognises the Honourable Member for Franklin, Mr O'Byrne's continual disingenuous and tacky political point scoring attempts should be called out for what they are.
 - (3) Understands that while the Labor Party continues whingeing, the Hodgman Liberal Government is focused on delivering our long term plan and it is working.
 - (4) Further recognises Tasmania's economy is surging ahead and continues to go from strength to strength, with CommSec's State of the States Report, ranking Tasmania's economy second in the Nation.
 - (5) Further acknowledges that under the former failed Economic Development Minister, Mr O'Byrne, and his Labor comrades, Tasmania was ranked dead last on all eight measures in CommSec's State of the States Report.
 - (6) Notes that under Mr O'Byrne's economic management two thirds of Tasmanian businesses thought the Government was working against them, and 10,000 jobs were lost. As a result, Tasmanians left the State in droves.
 - (7) Further recognises the Labor-Green Opposition clearly cannot be trusted to manage the Tasmanian economy or the State Budget.

- (8) Further understands our plan is working to grow the economy, create jobs, invest in essential services, keep Tasmanians safe and protect our way of life.
- (9) Condemns Labor for having no policies of their own, no economic plan they can point to, and their repeated demonstrated inability to say what they would do differently. (12 November 2019)
- 234 Mrs *Rylah* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government recently released findings from feedback on the Bass Highway, Wynyard to Marrawah Corridor Strategy.
 - (2) Recognises the release of the report is a milestone in the project, with \$35.72 million to be spent on North West roads including the Bass highway west of Wynyard.
 - (3) Understands the feedback stressed the importance of future proofing the highway to support both business and tourism growth and to make it suitable for a mix of heavy vehicles, cars, cyclists and pedestrians.
 - (4) Highlights a total of 239 pieces of feedback or comments were received which will provide local knowledge and insight into the planning and prioritising of upgrades, maintenance and road design.
 - (5) Considers the report highlighted road shoulder and widening, improvements to intersections, road alignment, line marking, signage, management of hazards such as overgrown vegetation, lighting and drainage, and provision of overtaking opportunities as suggested priorities.
 - (6) Acknowledges these important projects will make the highway a safer and more pleasant drive for the many locals and tourists as well as deliver freight efficiencies for this important freight corridor.
 - (7) Congratulates the Hodgman Liberal Government on their commitment record investment to the planned upgrades and the Corridor Strategy will be released later in 2019 with a timeframe for delivery. (12 November 2019)
- 237 Ms *Woodruff* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Supports the findings of the New South Wales Deputy State Coroner, Harriet Grahame, in the joint inquest into deaths arising at music festivals.
 - (2) Agrees that substantial evidence, endorsed by the medical fraternity, shows pill testing at festivals improves safety, and high visibility policing at festivals puts lives at risk.
 - (3) Accepts that Pill Testing will save lives.
 - (4) Calls on the Minister for Health, Hon. Sarah Courtney MP and Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, Hon. Mark Shelton MP, to work together to develop a pill testing framework for Tasmanian festivals this summer. (12 November 2019)
- 238 Ms O'Connor to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges that in 2015 the Liberal and Labor Parties both voted against the Greens' 'Criminal Code Amendment (Misconduct in Public Office) Bill 2015', and that both parties relied on the argument that there are existing offences that suitably cover misconduct in public office.
 - (2) Notes that since 2015, the Integrity Commission has identified numerous examples of misconduct, including in the reports:—
 - (a) an investigation into a complaint of an alleged conflict of interest against senior executive officers of TasTAFE;
 - (b) a summary report of an own motion investigation into an alleged conflict of interest and improper use of position by a manager in the Department of Education; and
 - (c) report of three investigations relating to Glenorchy City Council.
 - (3) Further notes that no successful prosecutions have occurred in relation to these reports.
 - (4) Observes that proposed reform 42 in the Local Government Legislation review paper to create an offence for "maladministration" to apply to Local Government.

- (5) Further notes that misconduct and maladministration are very similar, and agrees there is no legal or practical difference between misconduct or maladministration in State and Local Governments.
- (6) Agrees it is hypocritical to pursue new laws for misconduct in Local Government and reject laws that apply to other public offices.
- (7) Supports the introduction of an offence of misconduct in public office, to apply to all individuals holding public office in Tasmania. (13 November 2019)

239 The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—

- (1) Marks the official opening on 1 November 2019 of the Cradle Coast Future Energy Hub, the one stop shop for information on Tasmania's exciting energy future.
- (2) Acknowledges this collaborative initiative of the Cradle Coast Authority, TasNetworks and Hydro Tasmania to create an energy hub to engage with the locals and regional stakeholders, provide information and to listen to community feedback.
- (3) Notes the intention of other renewable energy developers to make use of the Cradle Coast Future Energy Hub to expand the communities' access to information and updates on a broad range of energy initiatives.
- (4) Encourages community members to access the Energy Hub, ask questions and provide feedback about the opportunities that exist in the North West and West Coast regions of Tasmania.
- (5) Further acknowledges that renewable energy development is one of Tasmania's greatest economic opportunity for the next decade, with our Battery of the Nation and second interconnector projects set to create thousands of jobs and inject billions into the Tasmanian economy over the coming years.
- (6) Further acknowledges the Government's Tasmania-First Energy Policy, which is focussed on delivering Tasmanian residents and businesses amongst the lowest regulated electricity prices in the Nation and being 100 per cent self-sufficient in renewables by 2022. (13 November 2019)

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.
- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.

- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs *Rylah*)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:-" and inserting instead:

- "(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio." (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.

- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

9 Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.
- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania's businesses are now measured as the most confident in the nation, that Tasmania has the best business conditions in the nation and that Tasmanian small businesses are the powerhouse of our economy.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Shadow Treasurer, Hon. David O'Byrne MP's public admission this week that, after five and a half years in Opposition, Labor still has no vision or plan.
