



I observe in to-day's "Mercury" that Mr. W. J. Connell has been declared elected as a Member for Wilmett in this House to take the place of the Honourable Edward Mulcahy who has become a Member of the Senate in the Parliament of the Commonwealth after a General Election and after Bye-Elections the Writs have hitherto always been transmitted to me as the person authorised by the Governor to swear Members and in this way I am officially informed of Members being duly elected. Mr. Connell has been declared elected under a new procedure and no fresh Writ has been issued. I have written to the Honourable the Chief Secretary suggesting that in this and similar cases the Returning Officer's Declaration, after having been before His Excellency, may be forwarded to me as my authority for swearing the Member.

In the meantime, however, I have the honour to request the opinion of the Crown Law Officer as to whether I will be justified in paying the new Member ^{before} until he has been sworn. I understand that the House is not likely to meet again until after the General Election and it has been our constant practice hitherto to only swear new Members during a sitting of the House and this usage seems to obtain in the House of Commons. "May" 12th ed page 150 says "Members may take and subscribe the oath at any time during the sitting of the House". On the other hand, the Constitution Act, 1856 c. 17, Section 26 merely says "No Member . . . of the House of Assembly shall be permitted to act or vote therein . . . until he shall have taken and subscribed before the Governor . . . or before some person authorized by such Governor to administer to the oath . . .". It does not seem to me to imply or allow that two

Oath might be taken by a Member, say in the Clerk's Room or at Government House, if it be held that a Member should take the Oath before being paid, unless I am authorised by Crown Law Opinion to swear the New Member in my Room, he would be penalised to the extent of perhaps six months' payment which would be a great hardship.

My own opinion is that while I consider that it is desirable, ordinarily to swear Members before they are paid, as "The Payment of Members Act, 1813", passed long after the provision in "The Constitution Act" to which I have referred, is silent on the subject, that I am justified in paying the New Member from the sum on which he succeeded to the seat vacated by Mr. Mulcahy notwithstanding that he may not have taken the Oath prescribed by law. I shall however be glad to be fortified with Crown Law Opinion on the subject for my guidance.

My dear Sir,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 8th instant in reference to the bringing in this Session of a Private Bill.

I am sending you in separate packet a copy of the Standing Orders of the House, and on page 74 thereof you will find the Rules relating to Private Bills. The first thing is the advertising the intention to bring in the Bill (S.O. No. 279) and as the Session is so far advanced, if you decide to go on this Session you will have to include in your Petition (See S.O. No. 289) a clause that Standing Order No. 279 or part of it may be suspended assigning reasons, such as that it would be most detrimental to the interests of the Promoter if the Bill were postponed till next Session or some other argument. I think however that I should point out that the House is likely to suspend the Standing Orders in regard to Private Bills. Though the Standing Orders mention two sums of £50 each as being to be paid into the Treasury, the usual practice and the more convenient one, is for £100 to be paid in, and any balance remaining, if any, is refunded. I am also sending you a copy of a Report of a Private Bill, as it contains the Petition, and I think this may be useful to you as a model for the present case (page 14). The total cost of that Inquiry was a little over £75, but I expect the cost of printing has gone up since 1911.


