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Hi,

We are NBT operators and work West Coast and avid hikers.

We are writing with respect to next Iconic Walk.

The Tyndalls area is a very special place for many and the Tasmanian Aboriginal Community.

The Tyndall Range and nearby area records high rainfall areas, rain occurs on more than 200 days a year on average, making it one of Tasmania's wettest regions.

This is a Wild and unforgiving place.

West Coast generally seeing rain on most months and many days per month, even outside winter.

Dry lightning events that occur without enough rain to dampen the ground are happening on the wet West Coast.

In recent decades, there have been notable instances where thunderstorms with dry lightning have sparked bushfires in western and northwest parts of the state think 2019 fires, especially during unusually dry and hot summer spells. Thousands of lightning strikes — many dry — have been recorded during some events, igniting bushfires in wilderness areas and peat soils.

The level of hiking resues has also risen and lack of knowledge of hikers is evident. This area lacks visibility in the mountains most of the year.

This area is unsuitable for the next iconic walk development location and needs to be moved somewhere more suitable.
