

REPORT FOR 1893.

The total expenditure was £205 0s. 5d., as against £207 6s. 4d. for 1892; the cost per head, viz., £25 17s. 8d., being a decrease of £1 10s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$. compared with the previous year. This decrease would have been greater had a sum of £15 been included in the expenditure for the year 1892 for Medicines and Medical Attendance, which I find was inadvertently omitted. The reduction in the cost per head is chiefly attributable to the increase in the daily average and to a saving effected in the salary of the Enquiring Officer.

The highest number of inmates at any one time was 10, The lowest number was 5.

A large amount of sewing was done for the Charitable Institution and the Gaol.

The patients were, on the whole, well conducted, and attended to in a kind and skilful manner by the Nurse.

One case calls for special attention, viz., that of a patient who was bedridden the whole of the year, and who it is feared will never recover, although only 25 years of age. She has been detained in this Hospital for 1053 days since first admitted (26th March, 1889); the last period of continuous detention extending from May, 1892, to the present time.

Mrs. G. Soltau and Miss Shoobridge occasionally visited the patients with a view of inducing them to lead better lives, and it is to be hoped that the praiseworthy efforts of these ladies were successful.
