REPORT FOR 1884.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



H.M. Penal Establishment, Hobart, 30th January, 1885.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to furnish the Annual Report and Returns for this Establishment for the year 1884.

The expenditure was larger than the previous year, owing to the provision made for an Acting-Superintendent during the absence on leave of Mr. Atkins, rent to Warders, &c.; the total increase under the head of salaries and allowances being £393 3s 6d.

The exceptionally high price of meat and potatoes during the last half of the year caused an addition of £174 16s. 6d. to the expenditure. There was also an increase for repairs and alterations to buildings, new hose for fire-plugs, &c.

The practice hitherto adopted of charging to January account the wheat supplied during the preceding December was departed from by the Colonial Storekeeper, and the cost of that item for December, 1883, and December, 1884, caused an apparent increase of £177 10s. 9d. in the expenditure for the latter year.

Cash payments received were less than the previous year by £876 18s. 5d., attributable in a great measure to the difficulty in obtaining a sufficient supply of stone for the stone-crusher, and the loss of time in enclosing ground in the Queen's Domain, laying down tramway, &c. for the future supply and delivery of road metal.

The value of labour performed by male prisoners was less than 1883 by £118 14s., chiefly accounted for by the smaller amount to the credit of earnings by the Park-street gang and prisoners employed as Wardsmen, &c. within the buildings.

The earnings of tailors were £112 12s. 9d. as against £86 18s. 7d. in 1883 (*vide* Return No. 3), and that of shoemakers £664 2s. 7d., being an increase on the previous year of £76 19s. 6d. (*vide* Return No. 4).

The number of prisoners convicted at Superior Courts and received during the year was 25, being 7 less than in 1883.

The number of prisoners convicted at Inferior Courts received during the year was 489, being 77 more than in 1883.

The average daily strength was 126, as against 129 in 1883, or a decrease of 3 per diem.

The cost per head, taking credit for cash payments, value of labour for which no payment was received, and value of stores in hand, was £23 12s. 7d., the increase being accounted for by the additional expenditure as previously explained, and the diminution in number of prisoners.

In the female branch the average daily strength was 28, as against 34 for 1883; the cost per head, taking credit for cash payments to Treasury, labour for which no payment was received, and stores in hand, was £5 2s. 2d.

Owing to the advanced age of the majority of female prisoners, and the absence of skilled laundresses, nearly the whole of the washing for private families was discontinued, the greater portion of the available strength being required in the public wash-yard,—hence the reduction in cash receipts, which were £25 19s. 4d. less than in 1883; and the value of labour for which no payment was received was less by £15 11s. 7d.

Advantage will be taken when possible to reduce the cost of management, which is unavoidably large owing to the supervision necessary to prevent the escape of prisoners employed outside the prison and from such parts of the building as are insecure.

Satisfactory progress was made by prisoners attending school; several who could neither read nor write when received have made fair advancement in these attainments, and acquired a knowledge of arithmetic which must prove beneficial to them in the future.

I am indebted to the officers for the assistance rendered in the maintenance of discipline and for the zealous performance of their duties. The conduct of the subordinates, with one exception, has been good.

The conduct of the prisoners, with few exceptions, has been satisfactory.
