



REPORT FOR 1899.

New Town, 18th June, 1900.

SIR

I HAVE the honour to submit herewith the Annual Report of the Charitable Grants Department for the year 1899.

Out-door Relief, &c.

Return A shows the expenditure under items 1 to 7, inclusive of Section 16 of the Estimates, from which it will be seen that the expenditure was £56 2s. 7d. less than the amount voted. The expenditure under Item 6, "Maintenance of Deaf, Dumb, and Blind, &c.," exceeded, by the sum of £7 3s. 9d., the amount provided on the Estimates, and this excess had to be provided upon a Supplementary Estimate.

During the year the sums of 5s. for out-door relief, &c., and £10 16s. for transport and funeral expenses of paupers, on account of the year 1898, were paid. These amounts were provided for by Supplementary Estimates, the Votes for that year having lapsed.

The repayments for the year were £53 13s. 5d. from the collectors, and £8 19s. 4d. from the Imperial Government, leaving a net cost of £32+1 4s. 8d., or £166 7s. 10d. less than in 1898.

Deaf, Dumb, and Blind.

Return B shows the number of deaf, dumb, and blind persons who have been maintained during the year at the expense of the Government.

During the year two girls, who were being maintained in the New South Wales Institution for the Deaf, Dumb, and Blind, were returned to the Colony. Another girl, who was for some years past an inmate of a blind institute in Sydney, was returned to the Colony, and was admitted to the Tasmanian Institute for the Blind. A blind boy, who was discharged from the local blind institution in 1897 for misconduct, was re-admitted during the year, and soon after again discharged; and a blind boy, who was returned from Victoria in 1898, was discharged during the year for misconduct.

There are now two persons being maintained in institutions in New South Wales, and five in the local institution.

The expenditure for the year under this head was £306 5s. 3d., or £68 19s. 5d. less than in 1898.

Appended are extracts from reports relative to the pupils in New South Wales.

Out-door Relief (including the two Cities).

Return C shows the comparative expenditure for the past 10 years, and shows a decrease, compared with 1898, of £567 11s. 3d., though it is but fair to add that the expenditure in 1898 was swollen by the sums paid to the Hobart Benevolent Society for increased price of bread, and to Launceston Benevolent Society for amount expended on the unemployed. Allowing for this, there was a decrease in 1899 of £18 1s. 5d.

Charitable Institutions.

Return D shows the daily average number of inmates maintained in the New Town Charitable Institution and the Launceston Benevolent Asylum during the last 10 years, by which it will be seen that the number of paupers are yearly decreasing.

Out-door Relief in Country Districts.

Return E shows the actual money expended on out-door relief, medical attendance on paupers in country districts, and temporary provision for tramps. It will be observed that the cost per head, based on the estimated population for 1898, was $5\frac{1}{2}d$. in municipal, and $2\frac{1}{4}d$. in police districts, or an average cost of $3\frac{3}{4}d$. per head. This is something less than the cost in 1898.

I wish to thank the Commissioner of Police for the great assistance rendered by the Police Department in conducting inquiries into applications for relief in country districts, which has been performed with much care and despatch.

Imperial Claims.

The amount charged to the Imperial Government for repayment of the cost of maintenance of paupers in the various institutions, and in receipt of out-door relief during the year, was £738 19s. 2d.

Staff.

On the 1st January, 1899, I had the honour of being appointed Administrator of Charitable Grants. All other appointments remain as hitherto.

The former, who is blind, is 17 years of age, and is a bright, intelligent girl. She has made good progress in school, and her conduct has been excellent. I understand she has been expecting to leave. She will be sent home to her parents at Evandale.

The report, with regard to Florence Cullen, is not so good; she is rather rough and troublesome, and not very intelligent.

The other pupil from your Colony, George Peters (blind), will go home to his parents for the holidays as usual. He is very anxious to return to school, and we shall be glad to have him back again for another term. He is a smart, intelligent, well-behaved lad, and is making excellent progress with his lessons.
