

TERRITORIAL POLICE:

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1891.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.

(No. 78.)



Police Department, Commissioner's Office, Hobart, 30th July, 1892.

Sir,
I have the honor to submit my Annual Report upon the Territorial Police for the year 1891.

I visited the several Districts for the purpose of inspection and the transaction of official business as follows:—The Selby District six times, the Mersey and Latrobe Districts three times, the Emu Bay District twice, the Macquarie District (West Coast) once, the George Town District once, the Portland District once, the Franklin District once, and the Ringarooma District once. Since the close of the year I have visited Selby four times, Mersey and Latrobe, Emu Bay, Macquarie, Franklin, George Town, and Ringarooma each once. I regret my visits during the year were not as frequent as I should have wished. I was unable for various reasons to leave town, and frequently found myself compelled to defer or abandon contemplated inspections.

The Superintendents are to be generally commended for their efficient and careful performance of duty, and for the good order in which the head stations and such of the out-stations as I was enabled to visit were found. The want of a more liberal provision for maintenance and repair is still very perceptible in some places. The books and records, which are somewhat elaborate, were carefully and accurately kept.

The following new stations were established during the year, some of which were referred to in my last Report:—In the District of New Town at Mount Stuart, a suburb of Hobart and an established Town Board, a cottage has been rented and a Constable placed there. At Glebe Town, also a suburb of Hobart, and having a Town Board, a cottage has been rented and a Senior Constable placed in charge, but not necessitating a new appointment or increase of the staff. One room at this station is used as an office by the Constables in this division of the District. Macquarie District.—The residence and office for a Sub-Inspector at Zeehan, and also the cottage and watchhouse there, referred to in my last Report, have been built on the reserve near the Railway Station. The latter is occupied for the purpose for which it was built, but the former has been handed over temporarily to the Mines and Magisterial Departments pending the erection of their buildings. A station has been established at Argenton, a new town at the junction of the two railways from some of the mines and the Strahan-Zeehan Railway. A temporary hut was erected for the Constable, which was occupied until recently, but a section in a more suitable position has now been secured, and a cottage standing upon it, held under residence licence, purchased from the owner for the permanent station. A station has also been erected at Dundas, with cells and other requisite accommodation, and two Constables stationed there. Since the close of the year a new watch-house, consisting of a four-room cottage, commodious day-room, cells, and yard, has been erected at West Strahan, in close proximity to the Court House. An office for the Superintendent is being built at the same place. Mersey District.—An additional Constable was stationed at Ulverstone, and a convenient cottage rented for his use, the increased population of the town, and its growing importance rendered one Constable insufficient for its protection. Emu Bay.—A new station has been erected at Heazlewood, ten mi

The stations at the Lisle Gold Field and Lebrina were closed during the year, and the Constables withdrawn and transferred to other places. The stations are both in the Selby District, and it will probably be necessary to establish another station between the two, at one of the most convenient points on the Launceston-Scottsdale Railway Line, near the Denison and Golconda Gold Fields. The opening of the Railway from Strahan to Zeehan had the effect of stopping traffic and the landing of goods as Reminé, and the station there was closed and the Constable withdrawn and transferred to another place in February last.

The District of Macquarie assumed such importance during the year that it was found necessary to appoint more Constables. Reference was made to this in my last Report. The total strength of the District now is—one Superintendent, one Sergeant, and ten Constables. The appointment of the Officer who had charge of the District, and who was Acting Superintendent in 1891, to the position of Superintendent, was confirmed on the 1st January last; and the senior Constable in charge at Zeehan was at the same time promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Provision was made in the Estimates for this year for a Sub-Inspector, but the appointment has not yet been made. I visited the District in February last. I rode through from Waratah to Strahan, and visited the several mining centres. The number of Police in the District is now, I think, sufficient for present requirements; and the opening of the Railways from Strahan to Zeehan and Zeehan to Dundas has greatly facilitated the performance of their duty. The partial collapse of mining speculation and dealing in shares, aiding largely in the present disorganisation of business, and leading to the exodus of many from the Silver Fields, has had the effect of increasing the work of the Police to a considerable extent. General good order, however, prevails. The prospect which is now opening of a more genuine attention to practical mining operations, with the use of machinery and with facilities for transit, and less devotion to the allurements of the scrip market, is encouraging, and will soon give impetus to extended mining settlement throughout the District. There appear to be fresh discoveries of mineral deposit through the whole extent of country between Dundas and Waratah, and other police stations, will, it is very likely, be soon required as the centres of population become defined.

The principal increase in the population of the Colony, exclusive of the two cities, has, during the last ten or eleven years, been in the Territorial Police Districts, owing to the fact that they have not been so long settled, and are not so fully developed as others, and further almost the whole of the mineral lands and unalienated agricultural lands are within them. This increase and the extension of mining and agricultural settlement naturally led to the necessity for the establishment of new police stations, and since the close of 1885 eighteen have been opened, with 25 men, one of whom is a Superintendent and one a Sub-Inspector. In some parts of the Colony it has been found practicable to reduce the number of Officers and Constables and to transfer the men to the new stations, so that there has been an actual increase in the numbers of nine only, the number in the Department in 1885 being 115, and at the present moment 124.

Thirteen persons selected from the register of applicants were appointed Constables during the year to fill vacancies and new stations, as follows:—

Three of these men had served in the Permanent Artillery of the Colony, others had had some Police experience, and some were young men, natives of the Colony, who had had no previous training. The selection of young men of the class who would naturally be expected to look upon the Police Force as a source of permanent employment is seriously impeded by the difficulty experienced in giving them any systematic instruction and training, to which I have more fully referred in previous Reports.

The increase in the pay of the officers and men for "length of good service" has had a most beneficial effect, and acts as a strong encouragement to all in the service. It has removed the dissatisfaction which so naturally existed when men only just appointed received the same pay as those who had been in the service for very many years.

It appears unnecessary to refer to subjects fully dealt with in my Report for 1890, and which is printed as Parliamentary Paper, No. 58, Session 1891, beyond drawing attention to them in that Report. They are—The Licensing Act, the recent Act to amend the Law of Evidence, the opposition to the Laws for the protection of Fish, the increased work of the Department, and the failure of some officers of the Municipal Police to furnish reports of crimes and offences.

The offices of the Commissioner and Clerical Staff, and the head-quarters of the Superintendent of New Town and Queenborough were removed on 30th July, 1891, from the premises occupied for several years at Lower Macquarie street, to premises in Barrack Square.

The amount paid to members of the Force who retired during the year was £77 3s. 11d., and the amount of rewards given was £17.

I append the usual Return showing the strength and distribution of the Police during the year, together with some particulars of other offices held and duties performed by them. The Return of Offences attached shows a slight increase over the two preceding years, which is to be clearly traced to the increase of population, and is not out of proportion to it. This is particularly noticeable in the Macquarie District, where the excitement connected with the mines attracted, as it usually does, many objectionable characters.
