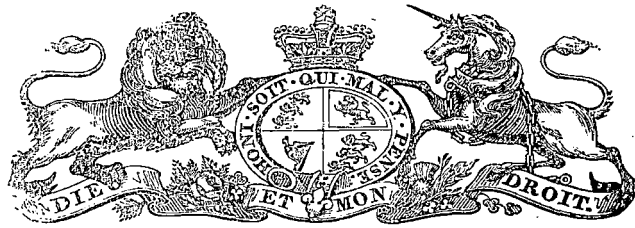


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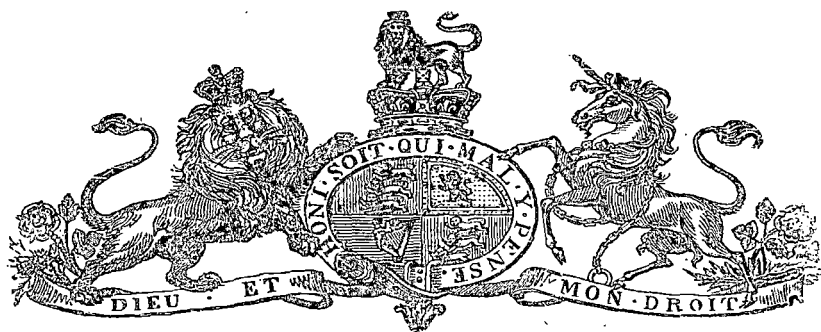

REPORT FOR 1893.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



ST. LUKE'S RAGGED SCHOOL.

Hobart, 29th March, 1894.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward a Report of St. Luke's Ragged School for the year 1893.

This School is yet conducted by the Sisters of Charity, assisted by a Paid Monitress.

The school hours are from half-past nine in the morning to half-past three in the afternoon, with the exception of one half-hour each day, at noon, for lunch.

The average number on the Rolls for the year was—Boys, 62 ; Girls, 70 : total, 132.

The average daily attendance—Boys, 39 ; Girls, 43 : total, 82.

The School was examined as usual by the Senior Inspector, Mr. Rule, on the 12th and 13th of December last ; and during the year the School has been thoroughly renovated and repaired ; the yard has been levelled and drained, and the paths asphalted.

ST. LUKE'S FREE SCHOOL, HOBART.

REPORT ON THE ANNUAL EXAMINATION, 1893.

Examined 12th and 13th December, 1893. Present—44 boys ; 47 girls ; total, 91.

CLASS I.—*Lower (including Infants)*.—Boys, 35, girls, 23 ; total, 58. In the same class in the previous year, 26 ; new scholars, 32.

The work was found generally satisfactory. The number up to the full work in three subjects was 21.

CLASS I.—*Upper*.—Boys, 2 ; girls, 8 ; total, 10. In the lower division in the previous year, 5 ; new scholars, 5.

All passed in three subjects, 8 with credit ; work generally good.

CLASS II.—Boys, 5 ; girls, 6 ; total, 11. In the lower class the previous year, 8 ; new scholars, 3.

All passed with credit in Reading and Writing. In Arithmetic all passed, 8 with credit ; work generally good.

CLASS III.—Boy, 1 ; girls, 6 ; total, 7. All were in a lower class in the previous year.

In Reading all passed, 6 with credit ; in Writing all passed, 3 with credit ; in Arithmetic all passed, 2 with credit ; work generally good.

CLASS IV.—1 girl. In a lower class the previous year, 1.

Passed barely in all three subjects.

CLASS V. Boy, 1 ; girls, 3 ; total 4. All were in a lower class in the previous year.

All passed in three subjects, 3 with credit in Reading. The Writing was fair ; the Arithmetic moderate.

The progress of 48 was found traceable. That of 20 had been good, that of 12 fair, that of 11 moderate, that of 5 slow.

The work of the School on the whole is satisfactory.
